WHereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That in the Night of the 5th of April last past, a House which Lieutenant-Colonel John Crawford,

of Crawfordland, had lately built and finished for the Reception of his Gardener, at Lonsfoot, was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown, and entirely consumed; and that the next Morning two incendiary Letters were discovered near to a Gate in One of the Avenues to his House, of which Letters the following are Copies, viz.

You may be shour to have your life taken from you Before halfe a Yare if you go on in this manre for there is very manie that is in hot Blood against your honour I may say agent William frafer it is not agent you so much but if you Do not stop or rase out that Villin you will get your houses Led to asses about your Logs One bay One you may think to hurt the Countrey bay the Advise of one abonible Hure ane Adoltres woman but you may be shour to have both thers and you Don as you will get a token of very soon so pretent no igoiance that your Blod be upon your own hed:

to Conel Craufort of Crawfordland.

Sir

You in form and Do all the hurt you cane to Contrey but mind and thow full thow will be pothed like a patrage from Bhind a Dik for thy Conduk Diferives it and thy house Lad to Aysses So thy Blod be upon thay own hed for thou art Warnned.

To William Frafer Gardner at Crawfordland.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice, the Person or Persons concerned in burning the said House, or in writing or dropping the said Letters, or either of them, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually set Fire to the said House, or actually wrote the said Letters, or either of them) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
