Briggage rowards Nomeny, and caused the Army to draw up in Bartalia between Glemery and Menicourt; the Right Wing was commanded by the Marquis de Grana, and the Left by the Count de Starenberg. In this Rencounter the Count d'Arc, General of the Artiflery, and the Count of Dietrichstein, Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of Heyster, had their Horses killed under them. Yesterday arrived a great Convoy with Provisions from Treves, and to morrow we expect another from thence.

Luxemburg, June 21. Here are arrived several Deferters from the French Army, who say that many wounded men have been sent to Metz, that the French did the Imperialists great hum with the Battery they placed on the Hill near Morville, who having only sour pieces of Cannon, were forced to retire with some loss and disorder. Yesterday we heard great shooting from the Armies. The Mareschal de Schomberg has not yet join'd Monsieur de Crequi; yesterday he was encamped with 1500 Horse and 1000 Foot between Took and Arlon, expecting more men from Flanders under the Count de Montal, after which he intends to continue his march towards Sedan.

Metz, June 22. The Mareschal de Crequi having refolved to extend the Right Wing of his Army to the Seille, and to possess himself of Poss from whence he might fee the Right Wing of the Imperialifts, caused several Bridges to be laid at Longueville, and the 14 instant marched towards Morville, leaving his Right Wing near Mouffan, to oppose the passage of the Ene-The next day he arrived at Morville, and had a view of the greatest part of the Right Wing of the Imperialifis, who perceiving his motion, advanced in great diligence to possess themselves of a Wood on the Right Wing of our Army, but were prevented by the Marefthal de Crequi, who had before placed there 10 Squadrons of Horse, and three Barralions of Poor; and the rest of the Army being drawn up in Battalia, he gave Orders for the discharging the great Guns : upon which, the Enemies caufed their Artillery to advance, but being not in a condition to play in three hours after, were forced, after some loss, to recire. The next night they repassed the Saille, and encamped at Clemery between No. meny and Port-Sur-Seelle. In this Action, one Lieutenant Colonel, and 40 of the Gardes du Corps were killed, and about 50 wounded. The Mareschal de Crequi had a Horse killed under him by a Musker shor. The Enemies desert in great numbers, and suffer much for Want of Bread and other Provisions. The Mareschal de Crequi has sent several Parties towards Vic, to in--commode them on that fide.

Bruffels, June 25. Since our last we are informed, that the French Army continues still at Ninoue, and that a great Detachment only is marched towards Tubife. Yesterday we had advice, that they marked out a Camp at Gauré betwixe Ghent and Oudenard, and that Their Army would fuddenly move thither. The Prince of Orange continues still encamped at Lokers. Letters from Luxemburg of the 21 fay, that the 15 infant the Impe-Williffs endeavoured to pass the Wood between both Armiles, which the French laving to fortified, that it was . impossible to attack them that way, the Imperialists afzermuch execution done by the Cannon on both fides, retired to their Camp? That the fame night the Mareschal de Crequi murching filently with his whole Arimy, gained an Eminence on the Left Wing of the Impe-'rial Camp over against Noments where they encamped, and that the Imperial Army continued their Camp between Clemery and Port-Sur-Seille; That feveral Perfont of Quality had been killed and wounded in taking a

Redoubt lying between both Camps; That the Marefohal de Crequi had his Horse killed under him in the dispute; and that the Count d'Are, General of the Artillery of the Imperial Army, was dangerously wounded. The Armies continue in fight of one another, and
the Cannon plays very fiercely. Our Governor General having dispatched his affairs at Answerp, and recelved this day 300000 Florins from that City, is expected
here to morrow. Yesterday the Prince of Orange was
to take a general review of his Army.

Hagin, June 25. We do not yet hear that the Ships which are designed for the Baltick, are yet sailed from the Text; but Admiral Tromp hath positive Orders to depart, and the Danifb Envoy who returned lately from thence, is gone thither again to hasten them out. The differences between the Princess of Off-fr fr and the States, are now said to be in a fair way of composure, though the Assembly as Besmin be separated without coming to any determination about them from Flanders we hear, That the Prince of Orang was lately in danger of being surprized by a party of 40 F such Horse, and as many Poor, who, upon intelligence of his going to Assemply, laid an Ambuscade for him: But his Highness having had notice of them on the way, sent some Dragoons to charge them, who with little resistance made them all Prisoners, and among the rest took some Duish Deserters, who are said to have directed them.
