HEREAS it hath been represented to Us, that a great Number of Persons, in Consequence of Advertisements or Hand Bills inciting them thereto, did, on Friday last the Second of this Instant June, as-femble in a Riotous and Tumultuous Manner in Saint George's Fields, in the County of Surry, from whence they proceeded in several Bodies to Palace-Yard, Westminster, surrounded both Houses of Parliament, and possessed themselves of the Avenues to the same, (the said Houses of Parliament Leing then fitting) where they continued in a Riotous and Tumultuous Manner, committing great Outrages and Violence against several of Our Subjects, and feloniously taking Money from them; after which, in the Evening of the same Day, they insulted and attacked the Houses of some of the Publick Minifters of Foreign Princes and States, residing at Our Court, and broke into, spoiled, and set Fire to Chapels, which in every civilized Country are allowed to fuch Publick Ministers for the free Exercife of the Religion of their Country, to the great Scandal and Offence of all truly pious and good Protestants; We therefore, in order that the Re-proach of so frantick and atrocious an Outrage against the Precepts of Religion, as well as the Obligations of all Laws, may not remain a Difgrace to Our Kingdom, but may be confined to the Authors, Abettors, and Perpetrators of the faid Outrage, and that they may be brought to speedy and condign Punishment, and that such dangerous and wicked Practices may hereafter be prevented, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish and declare Our Resolu-tion to put the Laws in Force against such Offences: And We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other Our loving Subjects, to be aiding and affilling to the utmost of their Power in suppressing such illegal and tumultuous Assemblies, and in detecting, apprehending, and bringing to Juftice the Persons concerned in assembling or insligating the same, and guilty of any of the Violences above mentioned: And for the better Detection of the Persons who were concerned in the Outrages committed at the Houses of the said Publick Ministers, We are graciously pleased to promise, that if any Person shall discover any other Person or Persons who, directly or indirectly, were concerned in pulling down, or beginning to pull down, or in fetting.

Fire to the Chapel of any Publick Minister, so as that the Person or Persons discovered may be prosecuted for the same, such Discoverer shall have and receive, as a Reward, upon Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders, the Sum of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and also Our Gracious Pardon for the

faid Offence, in case the Person making such Discovery shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same, except the Person who first broke into, or began to pull down or set Fire to the said Chapels. And the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer, are hereby required to make Payment of the said Rewards accordingly.

GEORGE R. Hereas a great Number of disorderly Persons have for several Days past assembled themfelves together, in a Riotous and Tumultuous Manner, and have been guilty of many Acts of Treason, Rebellion, and Felony, having formed Designs to break open and destroy the Gaols and Prisons, and to fet loose the Prisoners confined therein, and having actually broke into and fet on Fire the Gaol of Newgate, the King's Bench Prison, and the Prison of the Fleet, and released the Prisoners, and made Attempts on other Gaols and Prisons in and about this Metropolis; and having fet Fire to and pulled down the Dwelling-houses of divers of Our peaceable Subjects, and also set Fire to, burnt and destroyed the Materials thereof, and the Furniture and other Effects found therein; and also taken Money from divers of Our Subjects: We therefore, taking the fame into Our most ferious Confideration, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish and declare Our Resolution, That the Authors, Abettors, and Perpetrators of the faid Offences be profecuted as expeditionly as may be, according to the due Course of Law; and we do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Conflables, and all other Our loving Subjects, to be aiding and affifting to the utmost of their Power, in detecting, apprehending and bringing to Justice the said Offenders. And We are graciously pleased to promise, that if any Person shall discover any other Person or Perfons who are guilty of any of the said Offences, so as that the Person or Persons discovered may be profecuted for the same, such Discoverer shall have and receive, as a Reward, upon Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, the Sum of FIFTY POUNDS, and also Our Gracious Pardon for the said Offence, in Case the Person making such Discovery shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same; and the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer are hereby required to make Payment accordingly of the faid Rewards.

My. Lords, and Gentlemen,
HE Outrages committed by Bands of desperate and abandoned Men, in various Parts fperate and abandoned Men, in various Parts of this Metropolis, broke forth with such Violence into A&s of Felony and Treason, had so far over-borne all Civil Authority, and threatened so direally the immediate Subversion of all Legal Power, the Destruction of all Property, and the Confusion of every Order in the State, that I found Myself obliged, by every Tie of Duty and Affection to People, to suppress, in every Part, those rebellious Insurrections, and to provide for the Public Safety, by the most effectual and immediate Application of the Force intrusted to Me by Parliament.

I have directed Copies of the Proclamations issued upon that Occasion to be laid before you.

Proper Orders have been given for bringing the Authors and Abettors of these Insurrections, and the Perpetrators of fuch criminal Acts, to speedy Trial, and to such condign Punishment as the Laws of their Country prescribe, and as the Vindication of Public Justice demands.

Assurances, that I have no other Object but to make the Laws of the Realm, and the Principles of our Excellent Constitution in Church and State, the Rule and Measure of My Conduct; and I shall ever consider it as the first Duty of My Station, and the chief Glory of My Reign, to maintain and preserve the Established Religion of My Kingdoms; and, as far as in Me lies, to secure and to perpetuate the Rights and Liberties of My People.
