PROCLAMATION. GEORGE R.

Hereas a great Number of diforderly Perfons have for leveral Days paft affembled themfelves together, in a Riotous and Tumultuous Man ner, and have been guilty of many Acts of Treafon, Rebellion, and Felony, having formed Defigns to break open and deftroy the Gaols and Prifons, and to fet loofe the Prisoners confined therein, and having actually broke into and fet on Fire the Gaol of Newgate, the King's Bench Prison, and the Prison of the Fleet, and releafed the Prisoners, and made Attempts on other Gaols and Prifons in and about this Metropolis; and having fet Fire to and pulled down the Dwelling-houfes of divers of Our peaceable Subjects, and alfo fet Fire to, burnt and de-stroyed the Materials thereof, and the Furniture and other Effects found therein; and also taken Money from divers of Our Subjects : We there-fore, taking the fame into Our most ferious Confideration, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish and declare Our Resolution, That the Authors, Abettors, and Perpetrators of the faid Offences be profecuted as expeditionfly as may be, according to the due Courfe of Law; and we do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Conflables, and all other Our loving Subjects, to be aiding and affifting to the utmost of their Power, in detecting, apprehending and bringing to Justice the faid Offenders. And We are gracioully pleafed to promife, that if any Perfon shall discover any other Perfon or Perfons who are guilty of any of the faid Offences, fo as that the Perfon or Perfons difcovered may be profecuted for the fame, fuch Difcoverer shall have and receive, as a Reward, upon Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders, the Sum of FIFTY, POUNDS, and alfo Our Gracious Pardon for the faid Offence, in Cafe the Perfon making fuch Difcovery shall himself be liable to be profecuted for the fame; and the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer are hereby required to make Payment accordingly of the faid Rewards.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Ninth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and eighty, in the Twentieth Year of Our Reign. GOD Save the KING.

W.flminster, June 19. HIS Day His Majefty came to the Houle of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes feated on the Throne with the ufual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Knight, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Meffage from His Majefty to the Houfe of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majefty was pleafed to give the Royal Affent to

An ASt for raifing a certain Sum of Money, by Loans or Exchequer Bills for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty.

An Act for granting to His Majefly feveral additi-onal Duvies upon certain Goods imported into the Isle of Man; and for better regulating the Trade, and fe-curing the Revenues, of the faid Island.

An AEt to admit to an Entry in this Kingdom, under certain Restrictions, Tobacco imported not airectly from the Place of its Growth or Produce, and for. granting an additional Dury on fuch Tobacco, during the prefent Hiftilities.

An AA to explain an AA of the last Session of Par-

ija; and to declare valid and effectual the Swearingin and Involment of Militia Men, Substitutes, and Vo-lunteers, in Cases where all the Provisions of the several Acts now in Being relative thereto have not been observed; and to indemnify Deputy Lieutenants, Chief Magistrates, and Justices of the Peace, for their Proceedings therein respectively; to declare valid and effectual the Commissions granted by Deputy Lieute-nants, in the Absence of the Lieutenant of any County out of the Kingdom, to Officers commanding Volunteer Companies; and to indimnify Dipúty Lieutenants and Officers who have granted or asted under fuch Commiffions; and to enlarge the Powers of Deputy Lieutenants in certain Cafes.

Manis in certain Cajes. An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Pcor of the Hamlet of Mile End New Town, in the Par sh of Stepney in the County of Middlesex, for pawing, cleanfing, lighting and watching the Streets and other Open Poffages and Places within the faid Hamlet, and removing Nuisances and Annoyances therefrom, and preventing the like for the future; for confolidating the Highway Rates, with other Rates, within the faid Hamlet; and for paving and regulating Great Gurden freet, in the Parify of St. Mary Matfellon, otherwije Whitechapel, in the faid County, and removing a Bar now flanding acruss the same, and other Nuifances and Annoyances therefrom, and preventing the like for the future.

And to Four Private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most Gracious Speech :

My Lords, and Gentlemen, THE Outrages committed by Bands of de-fperate and abandoned Men, in various Parts fperate and abandoned Men, in various Parts of this Metropolis, broke forth with fuch Violence into Acts of Felony and Treafon, had to far over-borne all Civil Authority, and threatened fo directly the immediate Subverfion of all Legal Power, the Destruction of all Property, and the Confusion of every Order in the State, that I found Myself obliged, by every Tie of Duty and Affection to Mv People, to suppress, in every Part, those rebellious Infurrections, and to provide for the Public Safety, by the most effectual and immediate Application of the Force intrusted to Me by Parliament.

I have directed Copies of the Proclamations iffued upon that Occasion to be laid before you.

Proper Orders have been given for bringing the Authors and Abettors of thefe Infurrections, and the Perpetrators of fuch criminal Acts, to fpeedy Trial, and to fuch condign Punishment as the Laws of their Country prescribe, and as the Vindication of Public Justice demands.
