A TROCLAMATION. GEORGER.

HEREAS it hath been reprefented to Us, that a great Number of Perfons, in Confequence of Advertifements or Hand Bills inciting them thereto, did, Friday laft the Second of this Inftant June, af-

on Friday last the Second of this Instant June, af-femble in a Riotous and Tumultuous Manner in Saint George's Fields, in the County of Surry, from whence they proceeded in several Bodies to Palace-Yard, Westminiter, surrounded both Houses of Parliament, and possessing the failed themselves of the Avenues to the fame, (the fail Houses of Parliament being then fitting) where they continued in a Riotous and Tumultuous Manner; committing great Outrages and Violence against several of Our Subjects, and felonioufly, taking Money from them; after which, in the Evening of the fame Day, they infulted and attacked the Houfes of fome of the Publick Minifters of Foreign Princes and States, refiding at Our Court, and broke into, fpoiled, and fet Fire to Chapels, which in every civilized Country are al-lowed to fuch Publick Ministers for the free Exercife of the Religion of their Country, to the great Scandal and Offence of all truly pious and good Protestants; We therefore, in order that the Re-proach of fo frantick and atrocious an Outrage against the Precepts of Religion, as well as the Obligations of all Laws, may not remain a Dif-grace to Our Kingdom, but may be confined to the Authors, Abettors, and Perpetrators of the faid Outrage, and that they may be brought to speedy and condign Punishment, and that fuch dangerous and wicked Practices may hereafter be prevented, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish and declare Our Refoluinny Council, to publish and declare Our Ketolu-tion to put the Laws in Force against fuch Offences: And We do hereby enjoin and require all Juttices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Consta-bles; and all other Our loving Subjects, to be aid ingrand affifting to the utmost of their Power in fupprefing fuch illegal and tumultuous Affemblies, and in detecting, apprehending; and bringing to Juf-tice the Perfors concerned in affembling or infliga-ting the fame, and guilty of any of the Violences above mentioned: And for the better Detection of the Perfons who were concerned in the Outrages com-mitted at the Houfes of the faid Publick Ministers, We are graciously pleased to promise, that if any Person shall discover any other Person or Persons who, directly or indirectly, were concerned in pulling down, or beginning to pull down, or in fetting Fire to the Chapel of any Publick Minister, so as that the Person or Persons discovered may be prosecuted for the fame, fuch Discoverer shall have and receive, as a Reward; upon Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders, the Sum of FIVE HUNDRED

POUNDS, and alfo Our Gracious Pardon for the

faid Offence, in cafe the Perfon making fuch Difcovery shall himself be liable to be profecuted for the fame, except the Perfon who first broke into, or began to pull down or fet Fire to the faid Chaptls. And the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer, are hereby required to make Payment of the faid Rewards accordingly.

PROCLAMATION. GEORGER.

HEREAS a great Number of diforderly Perions have affembled themfelves together in a Riotous and Tumultuous Manner, and have been

guilty of many Acts of Treafon and Rebellion, having made an Affault on the Gaol of Newgate, fet loofe the Prifoners confined therein, and fet Fire to and deftroyed the faid Prifon: And whereas Houfes are now pulling down in feveral Parts of Our Cities of London and Weftminfter, and Liberties thereof, and Fires kindled for confuming the Materials and Furniture of the fame, whereby it is become abfolutely neceffary to ufe the moft effectual Means to quiet fuch Diffurbances, to preferve the Lives and Properties of Individuals, and to reflore the Peace of the Country: We therefore, taking the fame into Our moft ferious Confideration, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby flriftly charging and exhorting all Our loving Subjects to preferve the Peace, and to keep themfelves, their Servants and Apprentices, quietly within their refpective Dwellings, to the End that all well-difpofed Perfons may avoid thofe Mifchiefs which the Continuance of tuch riotous Proceedings may bring upon the Guilty : And as it is neceffary, from the Circumftances before-mentioned, to employ the Military Force, with which We are by Law entrufted, for the immediate Supprefilon of fuch Rebellious and Traiterous Attempts, now making againft the Peace and Dignity of Our Crown, and the Safety of the Lives and Properties of Our Subjects, We have therefore iffued the molt direct and effectual Orders to all Our Officers, by an immediate Exertion of their utmoft Force, to reprefs the fame ; of which all Perfons are to take Notice.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Seventh Day of June, One thousand feven hundred and eighty, in the Twentieth Year of Our Reign. GOD Save the KING.
