To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common-Council assembled, beg your Majesty's Permission humbly to approach the Throne; to express our Detestation and Abhorrence of those dreadful Acts of Violence and Outrage, which have lately been committed by a Set of abandoned and desperate Men, who, in the Prosecution of their wicked Purpose, assembled in such Numbers as to overwhelm all Civil Authority, and render the Exertions of the Magistrates ineffectual.

Thus circumstanced, nothing less than that armed Force, with the Direction of which your Majesty is constitutionally entrusted, could have rescued us from the Horrors with which we were surrounded; that Force your Majesty in your great Goodness was most graciously pleased to send to our Protection; and by it's happy Interposition our Properties have been secured from further Depredation, and Peace and Tranquility again restored. — For this your Majesty's paternal Care shewn to your ancient and loyal City of London, we beg to present our most sincere and grateful Thanks; and at the same we assure your Majesty, that every Event which can possibly add to the Happiness of any Branch of your August Family, or give additional Lustre and Dignity to your Crown, will ever be received by us with the most heart-felt Satisfaction.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the High Sheriff and Grand Jury of the County of Southampton, assembled at the Castle at Winchester, for the Assizes held this Day the 25th of July, 1780, beg Leave to offer to your Majesty our most sincere and loyal Congratulations on the Suppression of the late dangerous Tumults and Insurrections, by a necessary and efficacious Exertion of the Military in Aid of the Civil Power.

The Horror with which we regarded these alarming Proceedings of a violent and lawless Rabble; was augmented by the shameful Pretence which they set up of Zeal for the Protestant Religion. We are fully persuaded that your Majesty has nothing more at Heart than to support, as the Bulwark of the Protestant Interest, the Church of England as by Law established: And we hope that all such of your Majesty's Subjects as may have been seduced by the Insinuations of evil-designing Men, are now so far recovered from their Delusion, as to distinguish between Levelling Principles, and Principles of True Religion.

While we lament the Necessity of that Severity which the Sufferings of Individuals and the Public Safety have most justly called for, permit us; at the same Time, to assure your Majesty, that such diabolical Attempts to destroy the Credit and Consequence of the Nation, and such wanton Violation of the Property of Individuals, will never have any other Effect on our Minds, than to incite in us a Spirit of resolute Unanimity to confound and extirpate all future Hopes of the open or secret Abettors of such Proceedings, which tend to the Subversion of all good Order and Government, and to draw down Ruin on our Country.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council of Montrose, in Council assembled.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE beg Leave to approach your Majesty, to express the genuine and unfeigned Sense we entertain of the mild and constitutional Government exercised by your Majesty over every part of your extensive Dominions; and of the peculiar Happiness we, and the rest of our Fellow Subjects, enjoy in consequence of it: Such being the Case, it was with great Concern and Surprise that we beheld some of your Majesty's Subjects, who appear not to have been affected with these Sentiments of Duty and Gratitude, so natural, so just, and becoming. Ignorant, enthusiastick, and intolerant; and perhaps actuated by Motives less excusable than these, they have formed themselves into illegal Associations, daringly appeared in formidable Numbers and hostile Array, menaced the Legislature, and finally proceeded to the Commission of every Act the most outrageous and violent.

Whilst we deplore the extensive and complicated Misery which has arisen from such unequalled and unprovoked Riots, and that any of your Majesty's Subjects should have been guilty of Crimes so atrocious, we at the same Time are happy to observe the wise Councils, the necessary, legal, and effectual Methods pursued by your Majesty for the suppression of the Rioters, the Protection of the innocent, and the Restoration of the Public Tranquility. And we console ourselves with the Hope, that permanent Good may arise from the late Troubles; particularly an universal and just sense of the Necessity of a dutiful Behaviour as Subjects, and of the inestimable Value of publick Order and legal Government.

Happy in this Expectation, with Pleasure we turn our Eyes towards the State of your Majesty's Colonies in North America; and we beg Leave to express before you the Joy we feel from the late distinguished Success of your Majesty's Arms in the Reduction of the Capital and Province of South Carolina. We entertain the Hope, that this important Event will have a doubly good Effect; to intimidate and over-awe the Remains of that desperate and Republican Faction, from which has originated the Rebellion in America, and all the Miseries consequent on it; and to stimulate the Well-affected through all the Colonies to unite in Sentiment and Effort with your Majesty's Servants, for terminating the Reign of Democracy, Tyranny, and Confusion; for accomplishing the Re-union of America with the Parent State, and all the Blessings which flow from its orderly and free Constitution, governed by your Majesty with so much Justice, paternal Care, and Moderation.

We take Leave of your Majesty, requesting, that God, the Author of Order, and whose Power can controul every Event, would grant such effectual Success to your Majesty's Arms as may humble the

Insolence of our Foreign Foes, and constrain them to Peace; that then your Majesty may have the Glory and Happiness of being the Restorer of Publick Tranquillity, Harmony, and Order, to your Kingdoms and Colonies, and to all Europe.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council of the Borough of Plymouth, beg Leave to approach the Throne with our warmest Congratulations on the signal and very important Successes with which it has pleased the Almighty to bless your Majesty's Arms in the Province of South Carolina; a victory, we humbly hope and trust, may be the Means of reducing to Obedience, and a true Sense of their Interest and Happiness, our deluded and rebellious Fellow-Subjects throughout the Continent of America, and again uniting them to this Kingdom in the Bonds of perfect Harmony and lasting Reconciliation.

Permit us, Sir, at the same Time, to express our Abhorrence of the dangerous Riots which have disturbed the Peace of the Metropolis. Conscious of the blessings attending the Establishment of good Order, and due Obedience of the Laws of our happy Constitution, we cannot reflect without Horror and indignation on the late enormous Outrages committed by a Band of lawless and desperate Men, which (but for the Vigilance and Attention to the Security of you People graciously shewn by your Majesty in the Suppression of those Disturbances, and bringing to Trial and condign Punishment the Authors and Abettors of Acts so highly criminal) threatened the Destruction of private Property and Violation of public Justice throughout the Kingdom.

We namely presume to offer our Tribute of sincere and grateful Thanks for the Protection afforded your Subjects, and to assure your Majesty of our firm and inviolable Attachment to your Royal Person, Family, and Government, and that we will readily and faithfully use our utmost Exertions, as Magistrates or Individuals, to preserve Peace and Tranquillity, and resist every Attempt against the Honor and Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, and the Constitution of this Country.

Commodore Johnstone, in his Letter to Mr. Stephens, dated off Lisbon the 7th Instant, gives an Account of His Majesty's Ship the Romney, Captain Home, having, in the Latitude of 45°, fallen in with and taken, after a close Action of Half an Hour, the Artois French Frigate of 40 Guns and 474 Men, commanded by M. Le Febre; in which Action the Romney had three Men wounded, the Artois nine Men killed, and sixteen wounded, and the Sails and Rigging of both Ships much damaged.

The Romney was left in Chace of a Frigate when the Prize parted with her; and the Commodore likewise mentions, that the *Æolus* had, on the 24th of June, in Company with two Privateer Cutters, taken the *Eulalie*, of 18 Guns and 100 Men, bound from Bourdeaux to Port au Prince, laden chiefly with Wine and Flour.

Extract of a Letter from Captain John Harvey, of His Majesty's Ship Panther, to Mr. Stephens, dated Gibraltar Bay, June 8, 1780.

NOTHING material has happened here necessary for their Lordships Information, since Commodore Elliot failed, till the 7th Instant, when, about One in the Morning, His Majesty's Ship Enterprize, whose Captain I directed to moor Northward of the New Mole, to prevent any Attack on the Ships and Vessels here, made the Signal of an Enemy's Approach. Seven Ships or Vessels were immediately perceived to be set on Fire, and coming towards the New Mole. Some of those Fire-Ships drove, and the others were, by the Boats of the Enterprize, St. Fermin and Ordnance Transports, all towed by Two o'Clock to the Southward of the New Mole. The largest went on Shore in Roscia Bay. Four of them drifting towards the Panther; lying off Roscia, her Boats were sent to grapple them, which they soon effected, and towed them on Shore. At Half past Two, discovering two Vessels making towards the Panther, several Guns, with Round and Grape Shot, were fired at them; on which they were set on Fire. The Boats, without Difficulty, in a little Time, towed them clear: One of them, a Brig, got on Shore at Europa Point; the other, a Ship, drove to Sea. Though the Enemy had the most favorable Wind, Weather, &c. for their Purpose, you will please to acquaint their Lordships, not the least Damage has been done to the Shipping, nor had we a single Man hurt. A constant Fire from all the Ships and the Garrison was kept up on the Enemy's Gallies and Boats, which were very numerous; but the Darkness of the Night prevented our discovering what Execution was done. By what remains of the several Vessels, and the Species of Stores and Commodities unconsumed, it is evident no Labour or Expence has been spared in their Equipment. The largest Ship is about 117 Feet in the Keel, had two Tier of Ports, and was about the Size of a 50 Gun Ship. One Ship appeared to be of about 300 Tons, another of about 200, four Brigs, and two small Vessels.

By the Flames of the Fireships we observed several Ships standing off and on the Entrance of the Bay, which at Day-light we found to be the Spanish Rear-Admiral Barcello, in a Ship of the Line, with two Frigates, and several Xebecques and other armed Vessels. They failed in the Night from Algizir, with a View of intercepting any Ship that might have been obliged to go out of the Bay. A Ship of the Line likewise failed the Day before from that Place to the Eastward, as is supposed with
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the same Design. In the Morning the Spanish Admiral, with the Frigates and Xebecs, returned and anchored at Algezir, where he now remains.

I cannot conclude my Letter without requesting that you will be further pleased to inform their Lordships, that the Officers and Company of His Majesty's Ship under my Command behaved with the greatest Steadiness and Resolution, particularly the Officers and People in the Boats, who grappled and towed off the Fireships, notwithstanding the frequent Explosions of Shells, &c. The Behaviour of Captain Leslie, the Officers and Company of His Majesty's Ship Enterprize, was equally exemplary, not only for their Vigilance in discovering and keeping a good Fire on the Enemy, which in a great Measure was the Means of frustrating their Attempt, but likewise for the Activity of their Officers and People in the Boats, towing off the Fireships, &c. Captain Faulknor, of His Majesty's Sloop St. Fermin, then lying in the Mole, likewise gave great Assistance with his Boats. The Officers superintending, Masters and Crews of the Dutton, Nottingham, Friendship, and Union Ordnance Transports, did great Service, not only by keeping up a very smart Fire on the Enemy's Gallies, &c. but also in sending their Boats to assist in towing off the Fireships.

Extract of a Letter from Vice Admiral Lord Shulham to Mr. Stephens, dated Plymouth, July 22, 1780.

THE François, a French Brig, taken by Sir James Wallace, Captain of His Majesty's Ship the Nonfuch, arrived here this Afternoon, and herewith I transmit you the Intelligence given by the Prize Master on board her.

Intelligence.

The Nonfuch being on a Cruise, the 14th Instant, about Ten A. M. discovered a Fleet steering to the Westward, to which she gave Chace, and, on coming up, found it to be a Convoy from Brest, bound to Nantz and Bourdeaux, consisting of 22 Sail, under the Escort of three Frigates, la Bellone, Etourdie, and Lezard, the two former of 36 Guns each, and the latter new pierced for 36 Guns, but only 12 on board. As soon as the Nonfuch came near the Convoy, they all pushed for the Loire; but she soon after captured the François, another Brig and a Sloop, and the Lezard getting a ground on the Blanche Blank, was burnt the next Morning by the Boats of the Nonfuch, having first taken out a great Part of her Stores, which consisted mostly of Cordage, and unbent the Sails from her Yards. At Noon, on the 15th, two Sail were discovered from the Nonfuch, in the Western Quarter, supposed, from their Appearance, to be two Frigates, on which she gave Chace to them, and separated from the François.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, for repealing an Act made in the 19th Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An

"An Act for granting to His Majesty certain Duties on Licences to be taken out by all Persons letting Horses to Hire for Travelling, in the Manner therein mentioned, and certain Duties on all Horses lett to Hire, for the Purposes of Travelling Post, and by Time, and upon certain Carriages therein mentioned; and for granting other Duties in Lieu thereof;" it is Enacted, That from and after the 1st Day of August, 1780, every Person in Great Britain who shall lett to Hire any Horse, for the Purpose of Travelling Post by the Mile, or from Stage to Stage, or being a Person actually letting Horses to Hire, shall lett to Hire for a Day, or any less Period of Time, any Horse for drawing any Coach or other Carriage with Four Wheels, in any Chaise or Chair with Two Wheels, or any other Carriage for which any Duty of Excise is made payable, shall pay Annually the Sum of Five Shillings for a Licence for that Purpose.

And that every Person who shall keep a Diligence or Post-Coach, for the Purpose of conveying in the Inside thereof any Number of Passengers, not exceeding Four; or who shall keep any Coach or other Carriage to be employed as a Public Stage-Coach, shall pay Annually the Sum of Five Shillings for a Licence for that Purpose.

And it is Enacted, That from and after the said 1st of August, 1780, no Person (except those whose Licences have been renewed pursuant to the Act of the former Session of Parliament) shall lett out any Horse for Hire, either by the Mile or Stage, or by the Day or less Period of Time, to draw any Coach or other Carriage with Four Wheels, or any Chaise or Chair with Two Wheels, or any other Carriage upon which any Duty of Excise is made payable, unless such Person shall be authorised to do so by Licence under the Hands and Seals of Two of His Majesty's Commissioners for Managing the Stamp Duties, or some Person authorised by them, upon Pain of Forfeiting, for every Offence, the Sum of Five Pounds.

And it is further Enacted, That no Person (except as before excepted) shall keep a Diligence or Post-Coach, or any other Carriage to be employed as a Public Stage-Coach, without having first obtained a License under the Hands of Two of the said Commissioners, upon Pain to forfeit, for every Time such Carriage shall be so used, the Sum of Five Pounds.

Notice is hereby given to all Postmasters, Innkeepers, Proprietors of Diligences, Stage-Coaches, and others whom it may concern, that Daily Attendance will be given at the Office in Cook's-court near Lincoln's-inn, for the Purpose of granting Licences and taking Bonds under the said Act.—And, to prevent the Confusion and Delay which may happen, if too many Persons attend at the same Time together, it is desired that all those who are liable to these Duties will forthwith apply for their Licences; when they will receive Extracts from the said Act, containing full Instructions and Directions for their Guidance therein.
