To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Glasgow, in Common Council assembled.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Glasgow, with Hearts impressed with the firmest Attachment to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Family, beg Leave most humbly to express our Abhorrence and Detestation of those dreadful Acts of Violence and Outrage, which lately threatened the Subversion of all legal Authority, in the Capital of your Majesty's Dominions.

While we express on this Occasion our grateful Thanks for the Paternal Care manifested by your Majesty in the wise and effectual Measures employed to quell those daring Commotions;

We humbly beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that, as Magistrates and Citizens highly sensible of the Blessings we enjoy under your mild Government, we shall carefully watch over the Peace of the Community to which we belong; and oppose, with the utmost Vigour, every Attempt against the Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, and that excellent Constitution of which you have ever been the Guardian.

Permit us to express to your Majesty our sincere Congratulations on the Success which has attended your Arms in the Southern Provinces of America; and to hope, that the Blessings which your Majesty's mild and equitable Government must communicate to the Colonies of Georgia and South Carolina, will have a happy Effect in dissolving the Combinations of your Majesty's Subjects who are still in Rebellion; and that Peace and Commerce will soon be restored to that distracted Country, under the Government of the best of Princes.

Representative in Parliament for the said Town, being introduced by the Lord of His Majesty's Bed-chamber in Waiting: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council of Lanark, in Council assembled.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of Lanark, in Council assembled, most humbly

beg Leave to approach the Throne, to testify and declare our unfeigned and inviolable Attachment to your Royal Person and Government.

We acknowledge with the utmost Sincerity of Heart the tender and indulgent Regard you have shewn to all your People from the Beginning of your Reign, and that earnest Desire to make them easy, safe, and happy under Government, however remote from your Royal Person.

Penetrated with these Sentiments, we are truly surprised, and feel the most sincere Concern, that any of our Fellow-Subjects should be so misled by factious and designing Men, as to form themselves, under the Mask of Religion, into illegal Associations, and daringly to appear in formidable Numbers, menace the Legislature, and finally to proceed to the Commission of every Act the most outrageous and violent.

Permit us, Royal Sire, to express our Abhorrence at these violent Outrages, and to give your Majesty the strongest Assurances, that we shall be always ready to concur in every just and necessary Measure for repressing that daring Spirit of Riot and Disobedience, and to enforce a due Submission to the Laws; always considering, that it is one of our most essential Duties to support the Measures of Government, and to maintain inviolate the Supreme Authority of the Legislature of Great Britain over the District in which we reside.

We at the same Time beg Leave to take this Opportunity of congratulating your Majesty on the late Success of your Arms in North America, particularly in the Reduction of the Capital and Province of South Carolina; and do sincerely wish that this important Event may have the Effect to intimidate that desperate Republican Faction, from which has originated the Rebellion in America; that these deluded People may now be induced to return to their Duty and Allegiance, and gratefully feel the Blessings of the mildest Government and most perfect Constitution; and at the same Time be convinced, that their Union with and Dependence upon Great Britain is the most durable Source of their Security and Happiness.

Impressed with the deepest Sentiments of Gratitude for the many Advantages we enjoy under your wise Administration, we desire to repeat the unfeigned Professions of our unalterable Fidelity and Affection to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government; and likewise to express our most sincere and ardent Wishes for the Continuance of the Protestant Succession in your illustrious House; that your Majesty's Reign may be long, happy, and glorious; and that all your Endeavours for restoring Order and good Government, and for supporting the Religious and Civil Rights of your People, may be blessed with the most prosperous Success.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Macbride, of His Majesty's Ship Bienfaisant, to Mr. Stephens, dated at Sea, August 13, 1780.

S I R,

I WROTE to you, for the Information of their Lordships, on my Arrival at Cork, the Intelligence I had received, and the Steps I intended to take in Consequence. The Charon arrived on the 11th Instant. I sailed with the Convoy next Day, having the Charon, Licorne, and Hussar, in Company. As many of the Convoy still remained, I ordered the Licorne and Hussar to keep off the Harbor's Mouth to haften them, whilst the Bienfaisant and Charon lay-to with those that were out. At Day-light we had drove down as far as the Old Head of Kinsale, when I observed a large Sail in the South East in Chace of some of the Convoy; he was soon chased in Turn, the Charon in Company; the other two Frigates were out of Sight off Cork. About Half past Seven we came up with her. It is something singular, that the Action on both Sides began with Musquetry; he hoisted English Colors, and kept his Fire: I determined to do the same: As we ranged within Pistol-shot, some Conversation passed between us. In this Mode we got so far forward on his Bow, that neither his Bow or our Quarter Guns, would bear. Being certain what the Ship was, I then ordered the Small Arms on the Poop to begin; he returned it, and hoisted her proper Colors. It was some little Time before I could regulate my Sail, and place my Ship: They had determined to board us, and acted so to favor the Design. It was a daring, though unsuccessful Attempt. After an Hour and Ten Minutes smart Action, her Rigging and Sails cut to Pieces, Twenty-one Men killed and Thirty-five Men wounded, she struck, and proved to be the Comte D'Artois, of 64 Guns, upwards of 644 Men, a Private Ship of War commanded by the Chevalier Clonard, a Lieutenant de Vaisseaux, who is slightly wounded in the Action. His Brothers, the one a Colonel, the other Colonel en Second, in the Irish Legion of that Name, are on Board; likewise a Lieutenant Perry of the Monarch; and the People who were taken on Board the Margaritta Prize. The Bienfaisant had Three killed, and Twenty-two wounded; Furniture cut of Course; but the Masts and Yards not materially injured. There was one Man slightly wounded in the Charon. I brought-to, to refit; and the Convoy of Ninety-nine Sail proceeded on with a very fresh and fair Wind. The Licorne is in Company: The steady Gallantry of my Officers and Men did them Honor: I beg in particular to recommend my First Lieutenant Mr. Thomas Lewes to their Lordships Notice.
