While we express on this Occasion our grateful Thanks for the Paternal Care manifested by your Majesty in the wise and effectual Measures employed to quell those daring Commotions;

We humbly beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that, as Magistrates and Citizens highly sensible of the Blessings we enjoy under your mild Government, we shall carefully watch over the Peace of the Community to which we belong; and oppose, with the utmost Vigour, every Attempt against the Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, and that excellent Constitution of which you have ever been the Guardian.

Permit us to express to your Majesty our sincere Congratulations on the Success which has attended your Arms in the Southern Provinces of America; and to hope, that the Blessings which your Majesty's mild and equitable Government must communicate to the Colonies of Georgia and South Carolina, will have a happy Effect in dissolving the Combinations of your Majesty's Subjects who are still in Rebellion; and that Peace and Commerce will soon be restored to that distracted Country, under the Government of the best of Princes.

**W**E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of Lanark, in Council assembled, most humbly

beg Leave to approach the Throne, to testify and declare our unfeigned and inviolable Attachment to your Royal Person and Government.

We acknowledge with the utmost Sincerity of Heart the tender and indulgent Regard you have shewn to all your People from the Beginning of your Reign, and that earnest Desire to make them easy, safe, and happy under Government, however remote from your Royal Person.

Penetrated with these Sentiments, we are truly surprised, and feel the most sincere Concern, that any of our Fellow-Subjects should be so misled by factious and designing Men, as to form themselves, under the Mask of Religion, into illegal Associations, and daringly to appear in formidable Numbers, menace the Legislature, and finally to proceed to the Commission of every Act the most outrageous and violent.

Permit us, Royal Sire, to express our Abhorrence at these violent Outrages, and to give your Majesty the strongest Assurances, that we shall be always ready to concur in every just and necessary Measure for repressing that daring Spirit of Riot and Disobedience, and to enforce a due Submission to the Laws; always considering, that it is one of our most essential Duties to support the Measures of Government, and to maintain inviolate the Supreme Authority of the Legislature of Great Britain over the District in which we reside.

We at the same Time beg Leave to take this Opportunity of congratulating your Majesty on the late Success of your Arms in North America, particularly in the Reduction of the Capital and Province of South Carolina; and do sincerely wish that this important Event may have the Effect to intimidate that desperate Republican Faction, from which has originated the Rebellion in America; that these deluded People may now be induced to return to their Duty and Allegiance, and gratefully feel the Blessings of the mildest Government and most perfect Constitution; and at the same Time be convinced, that their Union with and Dependence upon Great Britain is the most durable Source of their Security and Happiness.

Impressed with the deepest Sentiments of Gratitude for the many Advantages we enjoy under your wise Administration, we desire to repeat the unfeigned Professions of our unalterable Fidelity and Affection to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government; and likewise to express our most sincere and ardent Wishes for the Continuance of the Protestant Succession in your illustrious House; that your Majesty's Reign may be long, happy, and glorious; and that all your Endeavours for restoring Order and good Government, and for supporting the Religious and Civil Rights of your People, may be blessed with the most prosperous Success.
