The King has been pleased to approve and confirm the Election of the Earl of Salisbury to be High Steward of the Borough of Hertford.

The King has also been pleased to approve and confirm the Election of Francis Burton, Esq; to be Recorder of the Borough of New Woodstock.

*Petersburgh, September 5.* The Empress with the Imperial Family came Yesterday to this Capital from Czarico-Zelo.

*Petersburgh, September 8.* His Royal Highness the Prince of Prussia arrived here on Wednesday Evening, accompanied by General Goertz and M. Vitinghoff.

*Ratisbon, September 17.* On Wednesday Morning last a Fire broke out at Straubing in Lower Bavaria, which in less than Four and Twenty Hours consumed Two large Churches, One Convent, Two or Three Public Edifices, and upwards of One Hundred and Eighty Private Houses, making in all nearly half the Town. The Damage is estimated at upwards of Five Hundred Thousand Pounds.

*Vienna, September 20.* His Imperial Majesty will set out for Bonemia on Monday the 25th Instant, and will be accompanied by Marshal Lacy in his Tour round the new Fortresses in that Kingdom.

*Hague, September 29.* The King of Sweden, by the Name of Count Haga, arrived here on Tuesday last, the 20th Instant. During his short Stay, his Majesty visited every Thing worthy his Curiosity in this Town and Neighbourhood. Expressing a Desire to see the Troops in Garrison here, the Dutch and Swiss Guards, led by his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange in Person, marched Yesterday Morning to the ordinary Place of Exercise, where they were reviewed, and gave great Satisfaction: After which the Prince of Orange gave a Breakfast, under Tents prepared for that Purpose, to his Swedish Majesty, and a very splendid Company. The King was pleased to accept Invitations to Supper from the English and French Ambassadors, and left this Place at Noon To-day, proceeding to visit the other Towns of Holland. After that Excursion, he will go to Loo to see the Princess of Orange; and from thence it is imagined he will return immediately to his own Dominions.

*Hague, October 3.* The King of Sweden was at Harlem on Friday Night. Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, his Majesty made Excursions to see Amsterdam and its Neighbourhood. He goes this Day to Utrecht, will be at Loo To-morrow, and from thence will continue his Journey Home by Land.

The Prince of Orange set out this Morning for Loo to receive His Swedish Majesty.

*Dublin Castle, September 29, 1780.*

An Account being received that Her Majesty was happily delivered of a Prince, the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower, the Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired Three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks; and the Night concluded with every Demonstration of sincere Joy for this happy Event.

**I**N Consequence of an Address from the House of Commons to His Majesty, dated the 6th of July last, praying that He would be graciously pleased to order an Account to be taken of the Losses and Damages which any of His Subjects had sustained by Reason of the late rebellious Insurrections, a Copy of the said Address was transmitted to this Board by the Lords of the Treasury, with Directions to carry the same into Execution, and make a Report thereon to them, in order that it may be laid before Parliament: The Principal Officers of His Majesty's Works have accordingly received the Claims of a considerable Number of Sufferers, and have made a Progress in preparing their Report thereon, as it is possible there may remain still some Sufferers who, from being unacquainted that such Enquiry was making, or from other Causes, have not applied to this Office. Notice is hereby given, that such Persons may forthwith deliver in their Claims to the Secretary of the Board of Works, in order that they may be pro-

perly examined previous to this Report being delivered in to the Lords of the Treasury.

The Officers of His Majesty's Works will meet on Thursday the 12th and 19th Instant, for the above Purposes.

**W**HEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that John Jarvis, a Private Soldier in His Majesty's Forty-ninth Regiment of Foot, stands charged upon the Coroner's Inquest with the wilful Murder of Benjamin Jones, a Drummer in the said Regiment, by inhumanly cutting his Throat with a Knife, in the Parish of Alconbury with Weston, in the County of Huntingdon, on the 19th Day of August last; the Body of the said Benjamin Jones having been found the next Morning, with a bloody Knife lying near it, by the Side of the Great North Road between Alconbury and Bugden; and the Sum of Seven Pounds and upwards, which he had received, in Company with the said John Jarvis, on Account of his Father, a Serjeant in the said Regiment, for Subsistence, being missing:

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the said John Jarvis, and his Accomplices (if any) in the said Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually committed the said Murder) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And His Majesty is hereby farther pleased to promise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person, (except as before excepted) who shall apprehend, or cause to be apprehended, the said John Jarvis, or either of his Accomplices, so that he, she, or they, may be convicted of the Crime aforesaid, to be paid upon such Conviction, by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

And, as a farther Encouragement, His Majesty's Justices assembled at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace at Huntingdon, do hereby promise the additional Reward of TWENTY POUNDS, to any Person, (except as before excepted) who shall apprehend, or cause to be apprehended, the said Murderer, or either of his Accomplices, to be paid upon Conviction by the Treasurer of the said County of Huntingdon.

N. B. The said John Jarvis is about 24 Years of Age, 5 Feet 6 Inches high, of a swarthy Complexion, with black Hair, grey Eyes, having lost one or two Teeth from the Front of his upper Jaw. He wore a red Frock, faced with Green, without any Lace, lined with White, the Button-holes worked with green Twiss, plain white Metal Buttons, no Waistcoat, a Pair of Buckskin Breeches, white Thread Stockings, white narrow-rimmed Shoe-buckles, and a round Hat. He gave out that he was born at Hull in Yorkshire, followed the Business of a Horse Jockey, and enlisted at Huntingdon Races in the Month of July last, about which Time he was acquainted with a Journeyman Blacksmith, who worked at Alconbury, and lately came out of the North with him, and who called him Brother.
