Admiralty-Office, October 14, 1780. Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir Peter Parker, Commander in Chief of His Majelly's Ships at Jamaica, to Mr. Stephens, dated Port Rort Royal the 13th of August, 1780.

APTAIN Cornwallis arrived the 20th of I aft Month, with the Lion, Sultan, Hector, Ruby, and Briftol, from convoying the Trade through the Gulph of Florida. By the inclofed Copy of a Letter from Capt. Cornwallis, we fup-pofe the Squadron he fell in with were French from Europe, bound to fome Part of America, under the Command of Monf. Terney. Captain Cornwallis difplayed on this Occasion his usual Spirit and Con-duct. The Behaviour of the French cannot be otherwise accounted for than by their having fome very particular Object in View.

In the Evening of the 1ft Infant, Rear-Admiral, Rowley and Commodore Walfingham arrived with Ten Sail of the Line, and the Barbadoes Brig.

Lion, off Cape Francois, July 14, 1780. SIR,

O N the 9th of June, the Convoy having paft through the Gulph of Florida, and got as far to the Northward as 29: 30, Captain Inglis made the Signal to feparate; we parted Company accordingly, and proceeded on, purfuant to your Orders, with the Lion, Sultan, Hector, Briftol, Ruby, and Niger. On the 20th, being then in the Latitude 30: 18 North Longitude, made from Cape Florida 11: 47 E. the Wind at S. S. E. flanding to the Eaftward. At One P. M. the Niger a head made the Signal for Four Sail in the N. E. I made the Signal for a general Chace; we foon perceived they were a Convoy flanding across us to the N. N. W. but upon their feeing us, they hauled up towards us ; fome large Ships firetching a-head of the reft, particularly Two that were much a head ; who, as foon as the Hector and Niger came near them, wore, and edged down to join the others. About Half paft Four, being pretty near, and perceiving Seven Two-deck Ships drawing into a Line, befides fome others that were with the Convoy, and fome Fri-gates, I made the Signal for the Line a head upon the Starboard Tack, the Enemy being upon the Larboard Tack, their Convoy about Two or Three Miles upon their Starboard Quarters, and fome Two-deck Ships and Frigates carrying a Press of Sail to join the other Seven; the Ruby was fo far to Leeward, that the Enemy would have weathered her; fhe was therefore obliged to tack: I then made the Signal to wear, and form the Line upon the Larboard Tack, the fame the Enemy were upon, and edged down to fupport the Ruby, and prevent their Weathermost Ships getting between her and us. The Enemy kept edging off, and forming their Line, but did not fire, although with-

AT the Court at St. James's, the 13th of Oc- in Gun-fhot. About Half paft Five o'Clock, per-tober, 1780, to Leeward to enable the Ruby, who was upon our Lee-Bow, to join us, I made her Signal to tack : The Enemy then holfted their Colours; and began to fire : Their Leading Ship had a Broad Pendant; and their Third Ship, which commanded, and was a-breaft of the Lion, a Flag at the Mizen-top mafthead: All the other Ships holfted common White Pendants. As foon as the Ruby had fetched into the Rear of our Line and tacked, the Enemy's Headmoft Ship tacked, and the reft in Succeffion, keeping their Line; and those leading upon the Starboard; that led before upon the Larboard Tack; they fired as they passed our Ships, but at a great Distance. When they got the Length of our Rear, about Seven o'Clock in the Evening, they bore up, and joined their Convoy.

This Fleet I believe confilted of 14 Men of War, 10 or 11 of which were Two-deck Ships, and 3 or 4 Frigates : The reft were Merchant Ships, or Transports; a Cutter, and an Armed Ame-rican Brig; the whole we reckoned from 44 to 47 Sail.

As foon as it was dark we brought too, and enquired of those, that had been nearest the Enemy's Convoy, their Force; which nearly agreed with the Opinion we had formed on Board the Lion. Wé food on to the Southward under our Topfails and Forefail all Night; and in the Morning they were not to be feen. A Random Shot killed the Coxfwain, and wounded a Marine, on Board the Lion : One Man was wounded on Board the Briftol : The Ruby, by paffing between the two Lines, was more exposed to the Enemy's Fire than the other Ships; fhe had One Man killed, and Three wounded, One of whom is fince dead; her Jib-boom was fliot away; a Shot through the Slings of her Fore-yard; that will I believe require her having a new one; is the only Damage of Confequence received By any of the Ships.

The whole of this is a Matter of finall Importance; but I thought it my Duty to inform you of every Particular, for Feat of Milreprefentations, as the Enemy are fometimes not very correct in their Accounts.

We flattered ourfelves at first, that it was was a Convoy under the Care of the Four Line of Battle Ships we met the last Cruize with fome Frigates; am fure it was the fincere Wish of my Brother Cap-tains, and every one of our little Squadron: But I ain to lament my ill Fortune, that after having been entrufted by you with the Command of Five fuch Ships, and a Frigate, that I should again meet the Enemy fo ftrong, as to prevent our being able to attempt any Thing against them. 1 am, &c. Justify my troubling your Lordhip with the following Paticulars.

He failed from Mahon the 20th of last Month, and receiving Advice foon after of the Departure of five French Veffels, all Letters of Marque, from Marfeilles, bound for the West-Indies, determined to go in Quest of them. On the 25th he descried five Sail near the Spanish Coast, which corresponded with his Intelligence; but as they were at a Di-flance, and the Day was far fpent, he judged it prudent not to make a Shew of purfuing them, that he might have a better Chance to fucceed in getting betwixt them and the Land at Night; which he had the good Fortune to effect. He found him-felf at Day-light next Morning off Cape de Gat, and about two Leagues from the five Ships that were together, and formed in a Line to receive him. At Half paft Six, when he was within Gun-fhot, they hoifted French Colours, and discharged their Broadsides. Captain Moor bore down upon them, and, though they continued their Fire without Interruption, referved his till he was within Piftol. thot of the largest, which struck after an Engage-Without ment of three Quarters of an Hour. flopping to fend any of his People on Board, he proceeded to engage the Second, and took her, after a short Resistance. He left an Officer and seven Men in this Prize, with Orders to look after the former; 'till he returned from purfuing the the former, this he returned from particing the three remaining Veffels, which he observed were making Sail to get away. He came up with and took two of them; the other escaped. The largest Ship is called *les Deux Freres*, pierced for Twenty Guns, mounting Fourteen Six Pounders, and Big for the Man efficience of more set of in and Fifty-five Men, (Fifteen of whom got off in a Boat;) the Second *l'Univere*, (the Captain of which was killed) pierced for 18 Guns, carries Twelve Four-Pounders and 41 Men, little inferior in Size to the Deux Freres; the Third, the Zephir, (formerly His Majefty's Sloop) pierced for 14 Guns, mounting 10 Three-Pounders, and Thirty-two Men; the Fourth, the Nancy, a Pink of Two Six Pounders, Two Two-Pounders, and 18 Men. They got all fafe into this Bay on the 29th of last Month, about Ten o'Clock at Night. They got
