

Navy-Office, October 19, 1780.

THE Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy give Notice, that all Bills registered on the Course of the Navy, for the Months of January, February, and March, 1779, are ordered to be paid in Money and Exchequer Bills; about One Third of which will be paid in Exchequer Bills, and the rest in Money, as nearly as the same can be complied with, that such Persons as are possessed thereof may bring them to this Office, to be assigned on the Treasurer of the Navy for Payment.

THE Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy do hereby give Notice, that they are ready to treat for Ships of 200 Tons and upwards, to serve as Transports and Victuallers. To be manned in the Proportion of five Men and a Boy to every 100 Tons Measurement, and furnished with three Cables of 120 Fathoms each. Ships now at the Out-Ports in the English Channel will be allowed a certain Number of Days Pay for coming to a King's Yard, if they sail from the Port where they are by a certain Day, (which will be ascertained at the Treaty) and they are found fit for the Service; which Allowance may be known by applying at the Clerk of the Acts Office in this Office.

Those at Bristol and Liverpool will be surveyed, measured and valued by the Overseers of the King's Ships building at those Ports, in the best Manner they can, subject to a Resurvey, Measurement and Valuation at the first King's Port they arrive at; and if found proper Ships will enter into Pay the Day they sail from those Ports for Cork or Plymouth, to which Places they are to proceed at the Risque of the Owners; if taken or destroyed by the Enemy; but from their Arrival at either of those Ports to be at the Risque of Government from the Enemy.
