

*Sicily* are, as we are informed, in a very ill condition, and seem to grow daily worse and worse, and on the other side the French increase in strength. They are now going to besiege *Caranea*, From *Dalmatia* we are told, that General *Cornaro* was safely arrived there. The Marquis de *Fuentes*, who hath resided here some time as Ambassador of the Crown of *Spain*, has taken his leave of the Senate, in order to his departure from hence, being appointed to go and reside in the same quality in *England*. There are Letters from *Constantinople*, which speak of an appearance of an agreement between the *Port* and the *Moscovites*, concerning the *Ukraine*, the latter being inclined to part with some places, they at present possess, rather than to engage in a War during the minority of their *Czar*.

*Vienna*, June 27. The States assembled here have given the Emperor a very considerable Sum of Money for the raising of Forces to be employed against the Rebels of *Hungary*, whither several Regiments are already ordered to march, the Emperor having resolved to have an Army of 15000 men in those parts, to be commanded by General *Cobz*.

*Copenhagen*, July 3. The Letters we receive from the Camp before *Malmoe* give us an account, that the Besiegers advance very successfully; That the Duke of *Croy* had caused two Ravelins, which were on the side of his quarters, to be attacked, which after a sharp dispute, and the loss of many men, were both taken. Yesterday in the morning the Besieged made a Sally upon the quarters of General *Bido*, and did considerable execution. The Swedish Army hath received a reinforcement of 2000 men, and is at present encamped within a League and half from *Malmoe*, which, it's believed, they will endeavor to relieve. Last night the Besieged begun first to make use of their Batteries. We have certain advice, that the Swedish Fleet, consisting in 36 Men of War, is at Sea, and that it has been seen off of *Bornholm*; whereupon our Fleet is likewise put to Sea, under the command of Admiral *Fuets*. We expect with some impatience the arrival of the Dutch Squadron from *Holland*.

*Hamburg*, July 6. From *Berlin* we have an account, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* was gone from thence to the Army, which was to hold a general Redezvous at a place called *Schwer*; which done, they will march directly to *Stetin*, and begin the Siege of it, for which very great preparations have been made. From *Danzick* they write, that the Swedes seemed resolved to attempt to relieve *Malmoe*; in the siege of which, though the Danes were pretty well advanced, yet it was not without great loss of men, which, it's thought, the Swedes will make advantage of, and defer executing their design as long as the condition of the place will permit, that they may come upon the Danes when weakened and tired with the Siege. It was believed that the Swedish Fleet being disappointed of those nine ships, which were to come from *Gottenburg*, and were attacked by the Danes in the *Belt*, would not have been able to come to Sea; but at present we are convinced of the contrary; for we have certain advice, that it is at present abroad, consisting in near 40 sail. From *Colberg* we are told, that 8 Swedish Men of War were come before that place, with intention to have surprized several Merchantmen that lay in the Road there; but they having been timely advertised thereof, saved themselves.

*Strasbourg*, June 28. The 26 instant the Regiment of the Duke of *Wirtemberg* passed through this City, on its march to join the Troops of the *Circles* commanded by the Duke of *Saxe Eysnach*, who continues at

*Benfels*, in expectation of the Artillery he has sent for from *Philipsburg*. The *Sieur de Monlar* is still posted with the Troops under his command near *Schlestadt*.

*Dittw*, July 2. Two days since we were told that the Troops of the *Circles* commanded by the Duke of *Saxe Eysnach*, were marched from *Benfels* towards *Kassenholz*, and that the French thereupon retired from *Schlestadt*; and this afternoon we have advice, that the said Troops are advanced to *Colmar*, and that they are making preparation to lay a Bridge over the *Rhine* above *Brisac*, that the Imperial Troops which continue as yet in *Brisgow*, may pass it and join the said Body.

*Cologne*, July 4. The *Osnabrug* Troops have now entirely quitted this Diocesis, and are marched towards the *Meuse*, which they have passed ere this.

*Hague*, July 9. The States of *Holland* have not as yet come to any final resolution in the affairs of *Orvingen* and the *Ommelanden*, the Deputies of the Towns desiring liberty first to consult their Principals therein. We have Letters from *Amstwerp*, which give us an account, that our Army was marched to *Marykirk* near *Gbaunt*, from whence it would remove again as this day, in order to the entering upon some action. From *Amsterdam* they tell us, that yesterday five East India ships arrived in the *Taxel*, of which three are belonging to *Amsterdam*, and the other two to *Horne* and *Embrayssin*.

*Paris*, July 10. Our last Letters from the *Mareschal de Cœqui's* Army, are of the 6th instant, when the Imperial Army continued encamped between *Metz* and *Thionville*, and ours near them, having the *Moselle* between them. It is said that the Enemy have a scarcity of Provision in their Camp, and that our parties do daily take many of their Foragers. From *Alsace* we are told, That the Duke of *Saxe Eysnach* not being longer able to subsist with the Troops under his command at *Benfels*, was advanced to *Colmar*; that it was not certainly known what his design was, some imagining he would march towards *Lorain* to join the Imperial Army, others believing he would go and block up *Brisac*, which they seemed to have the more ground for, seeing the Duke of *Saxe* had given orders for the preparing materials to make a Bridge, as was said, over the *Rhine* at *Newburg*, which is a little above *Brisac*. From *Flanders* we have an account, that the Prince of *Orange* was marched, and that he was encamped at *Marykirk*, not far from *Gbaunt*. The Count d' *Elbee* is, we hear, arrived with the Squadron under his command from the *West Indies* at *Brest*, where eight Men of War lie ready to put to Sea, upon what expedition we know not. The 6th instant the Count de *Mailly* Envoy Extraordinary of the King of *Poland*, took his leave of their Majesties, in order to his return home.

*Dartmouth*, July 1. Yesterday arrived here a small Vessel from *Coscaque*, the Master reports, that he met at Sea seven French Men of War, mounted from 70 to 80 Guns each, but knows not whether they were bound.
