sicily are, as we are informed, in a very ill condition, and feem to grow daily worse and worse, and on the other side the French increase in strength. They are now going to besiege Casanea, From Dalmasia we are told, that General Cornaro was safely arrived there, The Marquis de Fuentes, who hath resided here some time as Ambassador of the Crown of Spain, has taken his leave of the Senate, in order to his departure from hence, being appointed to go and reside in the same quality in England. There are Letters from Constantinopie, which speak of an appearance of an agreement between the Port and the Moscovites, concerning the Ukraine, the latter being enclined to part with some places, they at present possess, rather than to engage in a War during the minority of their Caar.

Vicana, June 27. The States affembled here have given the Emperor a very confiderable Sum of Mony for the raising of Forces to be employed against the Rebels of Hungary, whither feveral Regiments are already ordered to march, the Emperor having resolved to have an Army of 15000 men in those parts, to be commanded by General Cobs.

Conenhagen, July 3. The Letters we receive from the Camp before Malmoe give us an account, that the Besiegers advance very successfully; That the Duke of Croy had caused two Ravelins, which were on the fide of his quarters, to beattacked, which after a fharp fifpure, and the lofs of many men, were bosh taken. Yesterday in the morning the Besieged made a Sally upon the quarters of General Bibo, and did conficerable execution. The Suedish Army hath received a reinforcement of 2000 men, and is at present encamped within a League and half from Malmoe, which, it's believed, they will endeavor to relieve. Last night the Befieged begun first ro make use of their Batteries. We have certain advice, that the Suedes Fleet, confifting in 36 Men of War, is at Sea, and that it has been feen off of Bornholm; whereupon our Fleet is likewife pur to Sea, under the command of Admiral Fuels. We expect with some imparience the arrival of the Dutch Squadron from Holtund.

Hamburg, July 6. From Berlin we have an account, that the Elector of Brandenburg was gone from thence to the Army, which was to hold a general Redezvous at a place called schwer; which done, they will march directly to Stetin, and begin the slege of it, for which very great preparations have been made. From Denmark they write, that the Suedes seemed resolved to accempt to relieve Malmoe; in the fiege of which, though the Danes were pretty well advanced, yet it was not withour great loss of men, which, it's thought; the Suedes will make advantage of, and defer executing their delign as long as the condition of the place will permit, that they may come upon the Danes when weakned and rived with the Siege. It was believed that the Suedes Pleet being disappointed of those nine ships, which were panes in the Belt, would not have been able to come to Sta; but at prefent we are convinced of the contrary; for we have certain advice, that it is at present abroad, consisting in near 40 fail. From Colberg we are told, that 8 Suedes Men of War were come before that place, with intention to have furprized several Merchantmen that lay in the Road there; but they having been timely advertifed thereof, faved themfelves.

Straiburg, June 28. The 26 instant the Regiment of the Duke of Wirtenberg passed through this City, on its march to join the Troops of the Circles commanded by the Duke of Saxe Eysmach, who continues at

Benfelt, in expectation of the Attillery be has fent for from Philipsburg. The Sieur de Mondar is still posted with the Troops under his command near Schleftads.

Ditte, July 2. Two days finee we were told that the Troops of the Circles commanded by the Duke of Saze Exfenseh, were marched from Benfelt towards Kastenistic, and that the French thereupon retired from Schiefiadt; and this afternoon we have advice, that the said Troops are advanced to Colmar, and that they are making preparation to lay a Bridge over the Rhine above Brisc, that the Imperial Troops which continue as yes in Brisgon, may pass it and joint the said Body.

Cologne, July 4. The Ofnabrug Troops have now entirely quitted this Dioces, and are marched towards
