EXTRACT of a Letter from General Hal-
dimand, Governor and Commander in Chief
of His Majesty's Forces in the Province of
Quebec, to Lord George Germain, One of His
Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; received
by His Majesty's Ship Danae.

Quebec, October 25, 1780.

IHAVE the Honor to acquaint your Lordship,
that I have just received an Express from Major
Carleton, who commands one of the Detachments
mentioned in my Letter to your Lordship of the
17th ultimo.

The Secrecy and Dispatch with which this De-
tachment penetrated, prevented any Opposition of
Consequence on the Part of the Enemy; and on
the 10th and 11th Instant, the Garrisons of Fort Ann
and Fort George surrendered Prisoners of War.

Major Carleton, who has, as well as his Detach-
ment, shewn great Zeal and Activity in this Affair,
having fully answered the Purposes for which he was
sent, is returned to Crown Point, where he is to
remain as long as the Season will permit the Vessels
to navigate the Lake, in order to draw the Atten-
tion of the Enemy.

The Reports, assiduously published upon all Oc-
casions by the Enemy, of Cruelties committed by
the Indians, are notoriously false, and propagated
merely to exasperate the ignorant and deluded Peo-
ple. In this late Instance, Major Carleton informs
me, they behaved with the greatest Moderation,
and did not strip, or in any Respect use ill their
Prisoners.

I inclose, for your Lordship's Information, a List
of the Killed, Wounded, and Prisoners.

A Party of 100 Men and Mohawk Indians crossed
Lake Champlain, with Major Carleton, to co-ope-
rate with Sir John Johnson, who must be, before
this Time, upon the Mohawk River; and another
Party of 200 Canada Indians, with their proper
Officers, under the Command of Lieutenant Hough-
ton of the 53d Regiment, marched at the same
Time towards Connecticut River. They are re-
turned, having brought away 32 Prisoners, without
any Loss, although pursued by a superior Force, of
which it is thought many were killed.

I every Day expect to hear of Sir John Johnson's
Success upon the Mohawk River.

P. S. 2 Nov. I have kept this Letter open in
Hopes to give your Lordship an Account of the
Party which was sent upon the Mohawk River under
the Command of Sir John Johnson. The Enemy,
by Means of Two Oneida Indians who deserted
from Niagara, had received Information of an in-
tended Attack upon the Mohawk River, and had
prepared accordingly; but this did not prevent his
Success, though it occasioned him to meet with great
Opposition. I have just received a Letter from Sir
John, wherein he acquaints me, that he had de-
stroyed the Settlements of Schohary and Stone Ara-
bia, and laid Waste a great Extent of Country. He
had several Engagements with the Enemy, in which
he came off victorious. In one of them, near Stone
Arabia, he killed a Colonel Browne, a notorious
and active Rebel, with about 100 Officers and Men.

The Vessel being under Sail, I have only Time
to inclose the Return of the Killed, Wounded, and
Missing.

I have the Pleasure to acquaint your Lordship,
from Sir John's Letter, that I have great Reason to
hope, that many of the Missing will find their Way
to Oswego or Niagara, as some Indians and Rangers
well acquainted with the Woods are with them.

I cannot finish without expressing to your Lordship
the perfect Satisfaction which I have from the Zeal,
Spirit and Activity, with which Sir John Johnson
has conducted this arduous Enterprize.

Dublin Castle, December 30, 1780.

This Morning the Earl of Buckinghamshire, late Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom, embarked on Board His Majesty's Yacht the Dorset, on his Return to England.

His Excellency the Earl of Carlisle, and the Earl of Buckinghamshire, went together from the Castle in a Chariot drawn by Six Horses, and preceded by a leading Coach, and Six, in which were the Officers of State, to the Pigeon House, where Lord Buckinghamshire embarked. They were escorted by a Squadron of Dragoons, and attended by a great Number of Nobility, Persons of Distinction, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, several of the Aldermen and principal Citizens, in their Carriages, followed by a numerous Concourse of People to the Water-side. The Streets were lined by the Regiments of Infantry upon Dublin Duty. The Procession was very grand, and conducted with the utmost Propriety and Order; and in his Passage through the Streets Lord Buckinghamshire received every Demonstration of Respect from the People, who testified their Regard for him by repeated Wishes for his Welfare, and safe Return to England.

Several Barges, filled with Gentlemen of Distinction, attended Lord Buckinghamshire from the Pigeon House to the Yacht, which immediately set Sail with a fair Wind for Parkgate.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant has been pleased to appoint Captain Andrew Corbet and Captain Lord Strathaven to be his Aid de Camps in Ordinary; and Captain Sir James Erskine, Bart. Captain the Honourable Francis North, Captain

Arthur Ormsby, and Lieutenant Richard O'Brien Boyle, to be his Aid de Camps in Extraordinary.

Petersburgh, December 6. Yesterday, being St. Catharine's Day, her Imperial Majesty received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers, and in the Evening there was a Ball at Court, and a Supper at Mons. Narishin's, Master of the Horse, where the Empress was present.
