### Whiteball, January 6, 1781.

XTRACT of a Letter from General Haldimand, Governor and Commander in Chief Quebec, to Lord George Germain, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; received by His Majefty's Ship Danae.

: Quebec, OZober 25, 1780. HAVE the Honor to acquaint your Lordship, that I have just received an Express from Major Carleton, who commands one of the Detachments mentioned in my Letter to your Lordship of the t7th ultimo.

The Secrecy and Difpatch with which this Detachment penetrated, prevented any Oppolition of Confequence on the Part of the Enemy; and on the 10th and 11 th Infant, the Garrifons of Fort Ann and Fort George furrendered Prifoners of War.

Major Carleton, who has, as well as his Detach-ment, fhewn great Zeal and Activity in this Affair, having fully answered the Purposes for which he was fent, is returned to Crown Point, where he is to remain as long as the Seafon will permit the Veffels to navigate the Lake, in order to draw the Attention of the Enemy.

The Reports, affiduoufly published upon all Oc-casions by the Enemy, of Cruelties committed by the Indians, are notorioufly falle, and propagated merely to exafperate the ignorant and deluded Peo-ple. In this late Inflance, Major Carleton informs ine, they behaved with the greatest Moderation, and did not firip, or in any Respect use ill their Prifoners.

I inclose, for your Lordship's Information, a Lift of the Killed, Wounded, and Priloners.

A Party of 100 Men and Mohawk Indians croffed Lake Champlain, with Major Carleton, to co-ope-rate with Sir John Johnson, who must be, before this Time, upon the Mohawk River; and another Party of 200 Canada Indians, with their proper Officers, under the Command of Lieutenant Hough-

ton of the 53d Regiment, marched at the fame Time towards Connecticut River. They are returned, having brought away 32 Prifoners, without any Lofs, although purfued by a fuperior Force, of which it is thought many were killed.

I every Day'expect to hear of Sir John Johnson's Succels upon the Mohawk River.

P. S. 2 Nov. I have kept this Letter open in Hopes to give your Lordhip an Account of the Party which was fent upon the Mohawk River under the Command of Sir John Johnfon. The Enemy, by Means of Two Oneida Indians who deferted from Niagara, had received Information of an intended Attack upon the Mohawk River, and had prepared accordingly; but this did not prevent his Succefs, though it oscafioned him to meet with great Oppofition. I have just received a Letter from Sir John, wherein he acquaints me, that he had deftroyed the Settlements of Schohary and Stone Ara-bia, and laid Wafte a great Extent of Country. He had feveral Engagements with the Enemy, in which he came off victorious. In one of them, near Stone Arabia, he killed a Colonel Browne, a notorious and active Rebel, with about 100 Officers and Men. The Veffel being under Sail, I have only Time to inclose the Return of the Killed, Wounded, and

Miffing.

I have the Pleafure to acquaint your Lordship, from Sir John's Letter, that I have great Reafon to hope, that many of the Missing will find their Way 10 Olwego or Niagara, as fome Indians and Rangers. well acquainted with the Woods are with them, I

I cannot finish without expressing to your Lordship the perfect Satisfaction which I have from the Zeal, Spirit and Activity, with which Sir John Johnson has conducted this arduous Enterprize.
