THE following is Extract of a Letter from the Honorable Major-General Vaughan, Com- mander in Chief of His Majesty's Forces in the Lee- ward Islands, to Lord George Germain, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State: Received by the Hornet Sloop of War.

Sandwich, off St. Lucia, Decemb. 22, 1780.

I HAVE the Honor to inform your Lordship, That the Admiral and myself, having many Re- ports made to us of the ruinous State of the Island of St. Vincent, in consequence of the Hurricane, and being ever anxious for the Recovery of any of His Majesty's Possessions, we judged it proper, as the Fleet was going to cruize, to see with what Foundation these Reports were made, and whether any Advantage could be taken of their Situation: We therefore embarked 300 of the Flank Corps, and appeared off the Island on the 15th, and with them landed the Body of Marines, whom I marched Four Miles up the Country, to be able to reconnoitre the Enemy's Works, which, on Viewing, I found so perfectly strong and well fortified, both by Art and Nature, that I am convinced treble our Num- bers would have made it a very doubtful Under- taking. Upon signifying my Opinion to the Ad- miral, it was agreed the Troops should reembark; which they accordingly did on the 17th, without meeting the least Molestation.

Your Lordship may be assured, that on every fa- vourable Opportunity no Exertions in my Power shall be wanting; and I flatter myself that the Pre- cautions observed on the present Occasion will meet with His Majesty's Approbation.

Extract of a Letter from Sir George Brydges Rodney, Bart. K. B. and Commander in Chief of His Ma- jesty's Ships at the Leeward Islands, to Mr. Ste- phens, dated on Board the Sandwich at St. Lucia, December 22, 1780, received by Captain Edwards, of His Majesty's Sloop the Hornet.

IN my last Dispatches sent by the Anna Theresâ Pacquet on the 13th Instant, I acquainted their Lordships, that General Vaughan and myself in- tended to undertake an Enterprize which we flat- tered ourselves might be attended with Success.

On the 14th Instant we sailed from Gros Ilet Bay, in Hopes of being able to land the Troops on St. Vincent's the next Morning; but the Currents baffling us, we did not make that Island till the 15th in the Evening, and then at such a Distance to Windward as not to be discovered by the Enemy. We anchored about Two in the Afternoon in War- rawou Bay. All the Troops and Marines were landed; and before the Day closed, General Vaughan

Vaughan had put the Whole in Motion, and at their Head advanced towards the Enemy's Citadel.

I could easily perceive, on my approaching the Island, and viewing the Enemy's Works which they had erected upon the Mountain that commands Kingston Bay and that of Warrarou, that the Whole appeared in perfect Repair; with a numerous and strong Garrison. However, such was the Spirit of General Vaughan, that he marched to the Foot of the Works (having dispersed every Impediment in his Way) and reconnoitred them in every Part, in Hopes to find some Place vulnerable, where he might make the Attack with a Probability of Success; but finding they were in every Part complete, I concurred with him in Opinion, that an Attack ought not to be hazarded with the Force which he commanded. The Troops therefore returned to the Beach, and were reembarked, without the Enemy's daring to move from their Entrenchments.

General Post-Office, February 3, 1781.

THE Post-Boy bringing the Bristol Mail on Monday Morning the 29th Day of January last, from Maidenhead, was stop'd between Two and Three of the Clock by a single Highwayman, with a Crape over his Face, between the Eleventh and Twelfth Mile-stone, near to Cranford-bridge, who presented a Pistol to him, and after making him alight, drove away the Horse and Cart, which were found about Seven o'Clock the same Morning the Robbery was committed, in a Meadow Field near Farmer Lott's at Trwyford in Middlesex, when it appeared that the greatest Part of the Letters were taken out of the Bath and Bristol Bags, and the following Bags entirely taken away.

One George Weston is strongly suspected to be concerned in the above Robbery, he having, between Tuesday the 30th of January and Friday the 2d instant, negotiated several Rank-Post Bills and Bank Notes, which had been in the Mail, in Leicestershire, Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, Yorkshire, Northumberland, Lincolnshire, Huntingdonshire, and Hertfordshire, in the Name of James Jackson, and in Character of a Naval Officer, wearing the exact Uniform of a Midshipman, viz: a Blue Coat turned up with White, White Waistcoat, Yellow Buttons with an Anchor upon them, and a plain cocked Hat with a Cockade in it.

He was pursued from Nottinghamshire to London, on the direct North Road through Stevenage, Ware and Endfeld, and got out of a Post-Chaise and Four in Bishopsgate-street, about Half past Ten on Friday Night the 2d Instant, immediately took an Hackney Coach, and was sit down in the first Court in Newgate-street which leads to St. Paul's Church-yard, where he took

a Pair of Pistols and Portmanteau under his Arm, and walked towards the Church-yard.

The said George Weston is described to be about Five Feet Six or Seven Inches high, about Twenty-four or Twenty-five Years of Age, his Hair of a lightish Brown Colour, cut short before, and tied behind, fresh coloured, pitted with the Small Pox, thin made, speaks quick, and when he arrived in London had Boots on, and a light coloured Great Coat. He lodged at the Coventry Cross, in Putters fields, Tooley-street, about Four Months ago, has a Brother named Joseph Weston, and both are reputed to be Highwaymen.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen; or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
