The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, upon the Commencement of Hostilities against the States General of the United Provinces, His Majesty thought fit, by His Order in Council of the 22d of December last, to declare His Royal Intention to allow all Ships belonging to the Subjects of the States General, then in any of His Majesty's Ports, to depart with their Cargoes, (except such Part thereof as shall consist of Salted Provisions of any Kind, or of Naval or Warlike Stores) and to grant Passes for the said Ships and Cargoes, except as before excepted, to protect them from Capture by any Ships of His Majesty, or His Subjects, in their Return to some Port of the United Provinces: But inasmuch as His Majesty was intitled to expect and demand the same Treatment from the States General of the United Provinces, for the Ships and Cargoes belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects, His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, was pleased to order, and it was thereby ordered, that all Ships and Merchandize belonging to the States General of the United Provinces, or their Subjects, then in any Port of His Majesty's Dominions, should remain and be detained secure and unmolested within the same, until it should appear that the States General of the United Provinces were disposed and intended to proceed upon the same Ideas of good Faith with respect to the Ships and Cargoes of any of His Majesty's Subjects remaining in any Port belonging to the States General of the United Provinces. And whereas His Majesty's has received certain Advice, that the States General of the United Provinces have declared and concluded, by their Placart dated at the Hague the 26th of January last, that, as soon as the Dutch Ships shall be permitted to depart from England, the English Ships shall be no longer detained in their Ports, but immediately be permitted to depart, and be provided with Passports as therein mentioned; His Majesty, taking the same into His Royal Consideration, hath therefore ordered, as it is hereby ordered in Council, That all Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of the States General of the United Provinces, together with the Persons and Cargoes on Board them, (other than and except Salted Provisions of any Kind, or Naval or Warlike Stores) which are now detained, by Virtue of the aforementioned Order in Council of the 22d of December last, in the Ports of Great Britain, Ireland, or other Ports of His Majesty's Dominions, or which had been seized and brought into any of the said Ports by any of the Ships of His Majesty or His Subjects, before the Order for General Reprials against the States was issued, and have been already declared, -or shall hereafter be declared,

by Sentence of the Court of Admiralty, to be the Property of Subjects of the States General, be forthwith, or as soon as such Sentence of the Court of Admiralty hath been pronounced, released and discharged, with free Liberty to return to their respective Ports, and that proper Passes be granted them for that Purpose. And His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, and the Governors and Commanders in Chief, or other proper Officers, at the said several Ports of His Majesty's Dominions, are to take Notice of His Majesty's Pleasure hereby signified, and to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS upon Information received that the Plague had manifested itself in many Places of the Ukraine and Wolhynia, His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 15th of December last, to direct, that all Ships then arrived or that should thereafter arrive from Dantzick, or any other Port or Place in Royal or Ducal Prussia or Pomerania, or from any Port or Place in Courland, Samogitia, or Livonia, should make their Quarantine for Forty Days: And whereas there was this Day read at the Board several Advices that have been lately received from His Majesty's Consul at Dantzick, whereby it appears, that the Physicians and Surgeons employed in examining into the real Nature of the Distemper have declared, that the same was no ways the Plague, as it had been represented, but a Malignant Fever, easily cured by proper Medicines; and it having been further represented, that in consequence of proper Measures taken, the said Calamity hath now entirely subsided:—His Majesty taking the same into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Restraints upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine at present subsisting upon Ships and Vessels coming from Dantzick, or any other Port or Place in Royal or Ducal Prussia or Pomerania, or from any Port or Place in Courland, Samogitia, or Livonia, be taken off; and that all Ships and Vessels already arrived, or that may hereafter arrive from those Places, be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without unpacking, opening and airing, and without performing any Quarantine; provided they shall have no Goods or Merchandize on Board the Produce of Turkey, or the Levant, which may subject them to the Rules of Quarantine, under the Directions contained in His Majesty's Order in Council

At, bearing Date the 20th of September last; that they bring with them clean Bills of Health; and that the Master or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel do first make Oath before the Custom house Officer or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that the Crews are free from all Infection. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS, by an Act of Parliament passed in the last Session of Parliament, His Majesty is empowered, by Proclamation or Order in Council, for such Time as shall be therein expressed, to prohibit the Exporting, or Attempting to Export, out of this Kingdom, or the Carrying Coastwise in this Kingdom, any Sort of Copper in Sheets, or Copper in Bars, therein described, in such Manner, and under such Restraints, as His Majesty shall think fit: And whereas the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 18th of August last, for prohibiting the Exportation or Carrying of Copper Coastwise (except under the Rules and Regulations therein expressed) will expire on the 24th of this instant February; and His Majesty judging it necessary for the Publick Good, at this Critical Conjunction, to prohibit the Exporting of Copper out of this Kingdom, or Carrying the same Coastwise; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whatsoever do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date hereof, presume to Export, or attempt to Export, out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Copper in Sheets, or under the Weight of Two Pounds and an Half to the Foot Superficial, unless under the Restraints herein after contained; or any other Copper, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that the said Prohibition, shall not be taken to extend to any Sort of Copper to be Exported or sent Coastwise for His Majesty's Service, by Order and under the Directions or Licence of the Commissioners of the Navy, nor to prevent the transporting or carrying Coastwise of any Sort of Copper (except Sheets of Copper of and under the Weight of Two and an Half Pounds to the Foot Superficial) without any Security being required; nor to the Exporting the same to any Parts beyond the Sea, to which it may lawfully be exported (except to any of the Ports belonging to France or Spain, or to the States General of the United Provinces) upon Condition that all such Copper as is intended for Exportation shall be inspected and examined by an Agent or Agents, appointed or to be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and that a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of the said Agent or Agents, shall be first had and obtained, setting forth, that no Part of the same consists of Plates of Copper, or Sheets of Copper (except as hereinafter excepted) or

Nails made in Whole or in Part of Copper, which can be made Use of for the Purpose of sheathing and coppering Ships or Vessels; which Certificate from the said Agent shall be delivered to the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port in which the said Copper is intended to be shipped, and shall be their Authority for allowing the Quantity of Copper specified in the said Certificate to be put on Board and exported.—And as touching Sheets of Copper of and under the Weight of Two Pounds and an Half to the Foot Superficial, His Majesty is further pleased to permit and allow the same to be carried Coastwise without any Restriction, provided that no greater Quantity than Ten Hundred Weight shall be laden on Board any one Ship, unless Security by Bond hath first been given to the proper Officers of the Customs, in Treble the Value of the Copper intended to be sent Coastwise, to carry the same to the Place proposed, and none other; and to produce and deliver a Certificate or Certificates, within Four Months from the Date of the Bond, from the proper Officers of the Customs at the Ports for which such Copper shall be entered and cleared out, of the same having been all duly landed at such Ports; which Certificate or Certificates such Officer is required to give, and the Commissioners of the Customs to transmit to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in order to be laid before this Board: And His Majesty is likewise pleased to permit and allow the Exportation of Sheets of Copper of and under the Weight of Two Pounds and an Half to the Foot Superficial to any Parts beyond the Seas, to which the same may be lawfully exported (except to any of the Ports belonging to France or Spain, or to the States General of the United Provinces) upon Condition that no more than Ten Hundred Weight of such Copper shall be exported by any one Person or Partnership, and that the Quantity laden or put on Board any one Ship or Vessel, shall not exceed Three Tons in the Whole; and also upon Condition that such Sheets of Copper shall be first inspected and examined by the Agent or Agents appointed or to be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and that a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of such Agent or Agents shall be first had and obtained, setting forth, that such Sheets of Copper are of and under the Weight above described.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 15th of November last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this instant February: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d

of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October, 1777, of the 19th of June, the 7th and 26th of August, and the 10th of September, 1778, and of the 17th of May, 1780, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d of Day this Instant February, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

BY the Antelope Packet, which sailed from Charles Town the 18th of January, Dispatches have been received from the Earl Cornwallis, Major-General Leslie, and Lieutenant-Colonel Balfour, of which the following are Extracts and Copy.

Extract of a Letter from the Earl Cornwallis to Lord George Germain, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, dated Wynneshorough, December 18, 1780.

AS your Lordship will doubtless be glad to hear, by every safe Opportunity, the State of Affairs in the Southern District, I have the Honor of transmitting to you Copy of my Letter to the Commander in Chief on the 3d of this Month. As this Letter explains fully our past Operations, and present Situation, I have only to add, that Major-General Leslie is safely arrived, with his whole Fleet, at Charles Town.

Extract of a Letter from the Earl Cornwallis to Sir Henry Clinton, dated Camp, at Wynneshorough, December 3, 1780.

IHAD the Honor to inform your Excellency, that Major Ferguson had taken infinite Pains with some of the Militia of Ninety-six. He ob-

tained my Permission to make an Incursion into Tryon County, whilst the Sickness of my Army prevented my moving. As he had only Militia and the small Remains of his own Corps, without Baggage or Artillery, and as he promised to come back if he heard of any superior Force, I thought he could do no Harm, and might help to keep alive the Spirits of our Friends in North Carolina, which might be damped by the Slowness of our Motions: The Event proved unfortunate without any Fault of Major Ferguson's. A numerous and unexpected Enemy came from the Mountains; as they had good Horses their Movements were rapid: Major Ferguson was tempted to stay near the Mountains longer than he intended, in Hopes of cutting off Colonel Clarke on his Return from Georgia. He was not aware that the Enemy was so near him; and in endeavouring to execute my Orders of passing the Catawba, and joining me at Charlotte Town, he was attacked by a very superior Force, and totally defeated on King's Mountain.

Wynneshorough, my present Position, is an healthy Spot, well situated to protect the greatest Part of the Northern Frontier, and to assist Camden and Ninety-six.

Sumpter having passed the Broad River, and joined Branan, Clarke, &c. I detached Major M^r Arthur with the 1st Battalion of the 7th, and the 63d Regiment, after having sent my Aid de Camp, Lieutenant Money, to take the Command of it, to Brierly's Ferry on Broad River, in order to cover our Mills, and to give some Check to the Enemy's March to Ninety-six. At the same Time I recalled Lieutenant-Colonel Tarleton from the Low Country. Tarleton was so fortunate as to pass not only the Wateree, but the Broad River, without General Sumpter's being apprized of it, who having increased his Corps to One Thousand, had passed the Ennoree, and was on the Point of attacking our Hundred Militia at Williams's House, Fifteen Miles from Ninety-six, and where I believe he would not have met with much Resistance. Lieutenant Colonel Tarleton would have surprised him on the South of Ennoree, had not a Deserter of the 63d given Notice of his March: He however cut to Pieces his Rear Guard in passing that River, and pursued his Main Body with such Rapidity, that he could not safely pass the Tyger, and was obliged to halt on a very strong Position, at a Place called Black Stocks, close to it. Tarleton had with him only his Cavalry, and the 63d mounted, his Infantry and a Three-pounder being several Miles behind. The Enemy not being able to retreat with Safety, and being informed of Tarleton's Approach and Want of Infantry by a Woman who passed him on the March, and contrived by a nearer Road to get to them, were encouraged by their great Superiority of Numbers, and began to fire on the 63d, who were dismounted. Lieutenant-Colonel Tarleton, to save them from considerable Loss, was obliged to attack, although at some Hazard, and drove the Enemy with Loss over the River: Sumpter was dangerously wounded, Three of their Colonels killed, and about 120 Men killed, wounded, or taken. On our Side about 50 were killed and wounded. Lieutenants Gibson and Cope of the 63d were amongst the former, and my Aid de Camp Lieutenant Money, who was a most promising Officer, died of his Wounds a few Days after. Lieutenant-Colonel Tarleton, as soon as he had taken Care of his Wounded, pursued and dispersed the remaining Part of Sumpter's Corps; and then, having assembled some Militia under Mr. Cunningham, whom I appointed Brigadier-General of the Militia of that District, and who has by far the greatest Influence in that Country, he returned to the Broad River, where he at present remains; as well as Major M^r Arthur in the Neighbourhood of Brierly's Ferry.

It is not easy for Lieutenant-Colonel Tarleton to add to the Reputation he has acquired in this Province; but the defeating 1000 Men, posted on very strong Ground, and occupying Log Houses, with 190 Cavalry and 80 Infantry, is a Proof of that Spirit and those Talents, which must render the most essential Services to his Country. Lieutenant Colonel Tarleton commends much the good Behaviour of the Officers and Men under his Command; and he particularly mentions Lieutenant Skinner, of the 16th Regiment of Infantry, who does Duty with the Legion, as having distinguished himself.

Extract of a Letter from Major-General Leslie to Lord George Germain, dated Charles Town, December 19, 1780.

I Did myself the Honor of writing to your Lordship, at Sea, on Board His Majesty's Ship the Romulus, the 27th Ult. From hard Gales, and contrary Winds, we did not get here before the 13th Instant. The Troops are all arrived in great Health: We met with no Loss except our Horses. Commodore Gayton paid the greatest Attention in keeping his Fleet together, and disposing of his Light Armed Vessels for the Protection of the Transports. I found Orders here to march up the Country, with about 1530 Men, to join Lord Cornwallis as soon as possible: The Want of Horses and Waggons prevented me proceeding on my March until this Day.

Copy of a Letter from Lieutenant-Colonel Balfour, Commandant at Charles Town, to Lord George Germain, dated Charles Town, January 16, 1781.

MY LORD,

I Am honored with Lord Cornwallis's Directions to address myself to your Lordship during his Absence from this Province, and to have the Honor of informing your Lordship, from Time to Time, of the State of the Army, and the Situation of Affairs here.

By the last Dispatches from Lord Cornwallis, which were dated the 11th Instant, the Army was then in Motion, and advancing towards North Carolina, so that his Lordship would reach Bullock Creek, between the Catawba and Broad Rivers, by the 16th; to which I am happy to add, that the Troops under his Command were, at that Time, in the highest Health.

The latest Accounts of the Enemy inform us, that General Green, with his Army, is at Hayly's Ferry, on the Eastern Banks of the Pedee.

In order to co-operate with Lord Cornwallis's Views on Cape Fear River, and to afford Provisions and other Supplies for his Army, a small Force of about 300 Men, under Major Craig of the 82d Regiment, will sail from hence with the Packet. Captain Barkley in the Blonde, with the Delight and Otter Sloops of War, convoy this Corps; and will co-operate with the Troops on this Expedition, which, I trust, will be successful, and give us Possession of Willmington, and of this very essential Communication.

It is with Pleasure I inform your Lordship, that many of the principal Inhabitants of the Province, and some who held the chief Offices under the late Rebel Powers, have reverted to their Loyalty, and declared their Allegiance to His Majesty's Government.

I have also the Satisfaction to acquaint your Lordship, that Major Ross and Captain Broderick are arrived with the Dispatches; and as the former Gentleman has mentioned to me your Lordship's great Anxiety to receive frequent Informations from hence, and as there has of late been no eligible Conveyance, I have, from these Motives, taken upon me to change the Course of the Packet, by sending her directly Home; to which I have been the rather induced, as a Ship of War shortly is to sail for New-

York, and will take with her the Commander in Chief's Dispatches, and the Mail for that Place.

Captain Mallom, of the 63d Regiment, an Officer of Merit, and who is returning to Europe for the Recovery of his Health, has Lord Cornwallis's Directions to deliver this Dispatch to your Lordship.
