Nº 2. Propofals made to the Non-commissioned Of-

ficers and Soldiers of the Pennfylwania Line at Princeton, January 7, 1781. I S Excellency Jof. Read, Efq; Prefident, and the Honourable Brigadier General Potter, of the Council of Pennfylvania, having heard the Complaints of the Soldiers, as represented by the Ser-Jeants, inform them, that they are fully authorized to redrefs reafonable Grievances, and they have the fulleft Disposition to make them as easy as possible; for which End they propose,

That no Non-commissioned Officer or Soldier shall be detained beyond the Time for which he freely and voluntarily engaged; but where they appear to have been in any respect compelled to enter or fign, fuch Enliftment to be deemed void, and the Soldier difcharged.

2. To fettle who are and who are not bound to flay, Three Perfons to be appointed by the Prefident and the Council, who are to examine into the Terms of Enliftment; where the original Enliftments cannot be found, the Soldier's Oath to be admitted to prove the Time and Terms of Enliftment, and the Soldier to be discharged upon his Oath of the Condition of the Enliftment.

3. Where ever any Soldier has enlifted for Three Years, or during the War, he is to be discharged, unlefs he shall appear afterwards to have re enlisted voluntarily and freely. The Gratuity of 100 Dol-lars given by Congress not to be reckoned as a Bounty, or any Men detained in Confequence of that Gratuity. The Committioners to be appointed by the Prefident and Council to adjust any Difficulties which may arife on this Article alfo.

4. The Auditors to attend as foon as possible to fettle the Depreciation with the Soldiers, and give them Certificates. Their Arrearages of Pay to be made up as foon as Circumflances will admit.

5. A Pair of Shoes, Overalls, and Shirt, will be delivered to each Soldier in a few Days, as they are already purchafed and ready to be fent forward whenever the Line (ball be fettled ... Those who are whenever the Line (ball be fettled. Those who are discharged to receive the above Articles at Trenton, producing the General's Difcharge

all the Soldiers that were enlifted for the Term of Three Years, or during the War, excepting thole whole Terms of Enliftment are not expired, ought to be discharged immediately, with as little Delay as Circumitances will allow, except fuch Soldiers who have voluntarily re-enlifted In Cafe that any Soldier should dispute his Enlistment is to be fettled by a Committee and the Soldier's Oath. The Remainder of his Excellency's and the Honorable Board of Committee's Propolals is founded upon Honor and Juffice ; but in Regard to the Honorable the Board fetting forth, that there will be appointed Three Perfons to fit as a Committee to redrefs, our Grievances; it is therefore the general Demand of the Line and the Board of Serjeants, that we shall appoint as many Members as of the Oppofite, to fit as a Committee to determine jointly upon our unhappy Affairs. As the Path we tread is Juffice, and our Footsteps founded upon Honor, therefore we unani-moufly do agree, that there would be fomething done towards a ipeedy Redrefs of our prefent Circumftances.
