WHEREAS William Smith, of Tey in the County of Essex, Labourer, was, upon the Twenty-seventh Day of December last, charged by Information of Two credible Persons, upon Oath by them subscribed, before George Drury, Clerk, One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Suffolk, with having been guilty, on the Nineteenth Day of September then last past, of being, together with other Persons, armed with offensive Weapons, to wit, loaded Pistols, and so armed, being assembled in the Parish of Somersham in the said County of Suffolk, in order to assist in running and carrying away Uncustomed Goods; which Information was afterwards by the said George Drury certified under his Hand and Seal, and returned to One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, in that Case made and provided:—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, that the said William Smith do surrender himself within the Space of Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or one other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.
