RESENT.

'The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 16th of February last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this King-dom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire this Day: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Desence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October, 1777, of the 19th of June, the 7th and 26th of August, and the 10th of September, 1778, and of the 17th of May, 1780, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in tage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the faid 23d of Day this inftant May, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coast-wise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties instituted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Extra portation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise

of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." — And the Lords Commifsioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Custom-House, London, May 26, 1781. WHEREAS, on Saturday the 3d Day of March last, the Crew of the Swift Cutter, being out upon a Cruize in the Wallet on the Coast of Essex, gave Chace to a small Vessel, supposed to be a Smug-gler, which they came up with and brought-to upon a Sand called Knock John, within the Limits of the Port of London; that they then boarded the faid Vef-fel, and finding sundry small Casks called Half Anhers, supposed to contain Spirituous Liquors, they took Possession of the said Vessel alongside, and took out of the Hold Thirty sive Half Ankers, which they conveyed on board the Swift; that soon afterwards, upon a Signal being given by William Knight, the Commander of the said Smuggling Vessel, Sixteen Men, armed with Possels and Cullasses, who head Men, armed with Pistols and Cullasses, who had been concealed, boarded and took Possession of the Swift, which they carried away with them, forcing the Crew into the Hold, and confining them under the Hotches, as appears by the Oaths of William Harlow, Mate of the Swift, and Two of the Mariners, who were on board at the Time of this Transaction: And whereas some of the Parties are known, and Prosecutions ordered to be commenced against them for this Offence:—The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to discover and bring to Justice Such other of the Offenders who were concerned in the feloniously taking away this Vessel, (being the Property of the Crown) and are yet unknown, do hereby offer a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons making such Discovery, to be paid by the Receiver-General and Cashier of the Customs, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the faid Of-Edw. WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intitled, "An Act for the better Management of the Duties upon Male Servants, granted by an Act made in the 17th Year of the Reign of His present Majesty," the Collection

of the said Duty is put under the Management of the Commissioners of Excise: The said Commissioners have thought sit, for the Information of all Persons concerned, to publish the following Clauses of the said Ast, containing Directions as to the Mode of making Entry of, and paying Duty sor, such Male Servants:

"And be it enacted, That every Master or Mistress, who, on the Twenty-first Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-one, shall retain or employ any Male Serwant, in the Capacity of Maitre d'Hotel, House Steward, Master of the Horse, Groem of the Chamber, Valet de Chamber, Butler, Under Butler, Clerk of the Kitchen, Confectioner, Cook, House Porter, Footman, Running Footman, Coachman, Groom, Postillion, Stable Boy, and the respective Helpers in the Stables of such Coachman, Groom, or Postillion, or in the Capacity of Gardener, (not being a Day Labourer) Park Keeper, Game Keeper, Huntsman, or Whipperin, respectively chargeable by the said Act, whether such Serwants shall then be retained or employed in one or more of the said Capacities of a Serwant, shall, within Forty Days after the said Twenty-first Day of May, One thousand sever hundred and eighty-one, deliver, or cause to be delivered, at the Office of Excise next to the Place where any such Master or Mistress respectively shall then be resident, a correct List signed by him or her, (or by his or her known Steward or Agent) in whith List shall be inserted and specified the true Number of Male Servants by him or her at that Time retained or employed, the Christian and Surname of each such Servant, the Office or Capacity in or for which each Servant is retained or employed; and every such Master or Mistress shall respectively, at the Time of delivering in such List, pay down the Duties by the said Act imposed, for every Male Servant so retained and employed.

"And be it further enacted, That every Master or Mistress respectively, who, after the Twenty-sirst Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and eightyone, shall begin to retain or employ any such Male Servant as aforesaid in any of the said Capacities, shall, within Twenty Days after he or she respectively shall begin to retain or employ any such Male Servant or Male Servants, deliver or cause to be delivered, at the Office of Excise next to the Place where he or she shall then be resident, a like List, signed as asoresaid; in which List shall be inserted and specified the true Number of Male Servants by him or her at that Time retained or employed, the Christian and Surname of each fuch Servant, the Office and Capacity in or for which each fuch Servant is retained or employed; and every fuch Master or Mistress respectively shall, at the Time of delivering in the said Lists, pay down the Duties by the said Act imposed for every Servant. So retained or employed; and if, at any Time within Twelve Calendar Months after such Master or Mistress and the said delivered in such tress shall have or ought to have delivered in such Lists as aforesaid, he or she shall increase the Number of his or her Male Servants, in any of the Capacities before mentioned, then, and in every such Case, every such Master or Mistress respectively shall, within Twenty Days after he or she shall have made such Increase, deliver, or cause to be delivered, at the Office of Excise next to the Place where he or she shall at that Time reside, a like correct List, signed as as aforesaid, and shall specify therein the true Number of Male Servants so increased, the Christian and Surname of each such Servant, the Office and Capacity in or for which such Servant is retained or employed; and such Master or Mistress respectively shall, at the same Time, pay down the Duties payable for

each Servant Jo increased beyond the Number specified

in their former Lists.

"And be it further enacted, That each and every Master and Mistress who shall have delivered, or who is obliged to deliver in such List or Lists as aforesaid, is and are hereby required, at or within Twenty Days after the Expiration of Twelve Calendar Months respectively, after the Times of delivering or being obliged to deliver such Lists, to deliver a fresh List in Manner aforesaid, and pay down the Duties according to the true Number of Male Servants by him or her respectively at that Time retained or employed in any of the Capacities before mentioned, and for which the said Duty is by the said sirst recited Ast imposed, and in the same Manner to renew such List, and make such Payment, from Year to Year, as long as he or she shall respectively retain or employ any such Servant or Servants.

"And be it further enacted, First in all Cases where any Master or Mistress shall have divers Houses or Places of Residence, and shall retain or employ in each such House or Place of Residence any Servant or Servants chargeable with the Duty by the said Ast imposed; and in all Cases where any Master or Mistress shall retain or employ any such Servant or Servants chargeable as aforesaid, at any Place not being the House or Place of Residence of any such Master or Mistress, every such Master or Mistress respectively shall, and they are hereby required, within the Space of One Month after the Delivery of such Lists respectively, and Payment of the said Duties, as herein before required, to deliver, or cause to be delivered, at the Office of Excise next to each and every such Place, and to each and every such House or Place of Residence, a Duplicate or Duplicates of every such List or Lists so delivered by such Masters or Mistresse, such Duplicates to be signed as aforesaid, and mentioning at the Foot of every such Duplicate the Place where such original List or Lists shall have been delivered, and the Duties paid as aforesaid, upon Pain that every such Master or Mistress neglecting to deliver such Duplicates shall, for every such Offence, forseit the Sum of Twenty Pounds.
