“dont put your Dependance in Mosses
“Burch Joffes Bird nor my Lord Church for nither
“of than shall hope the Reams and god dam your
“Ingeners whilt you are att Play att one Pleas we
“will be at the other and god dam you all together
“you want to take the Pores Wright away but
“god dam you yet shal coe you dere.”

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Person concerned in writing the said Letter, and placing the same under the Door of the Workshop above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so as he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Inhabitants of the Town of Hungerford do hereby offer a Reward of

ONE HUNDRED GUINEAS to any Person making such Discovery as afor. said (except as before excepted) to be paid by Mr. Seymour Mundy, Attorney at Law, in Hungerford, upon the Conviction of any One or more of the said Offenders.
