AT the Court at St. James's, the 22d of June, 1781,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W Hereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation, and to restrain the carrying Coastwise, of Copper in Bars or Copper in Sheets, for a limited Time," His Majesty is empowered, by Proclamation or Order in Council, when he shall see Cause, and for such Time as shall be therein expressed, to prohibit the Exporting, or attempting to Export, out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise in this Kingdom, any Sort of Copper in Sheets, or Copper in Bars, therein to be described, in such Manner and under such Restraints, as His Majesty shall think fit; and His Majesty judging it necessary for the Publick Good, at this Critical Conjunction, to prohibit the Exporting of Copper out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise the same; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosoever (except the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, or their Officers or Agents, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months from the Date hereof, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise in this Kingdom any Sort of Copper in Sheets or Copper in Bars, or ship or lade any Copper in Sheets or Copper in Bars, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by the Act of Parliament herein before recited.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
