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Swannes Poins in Virginia, June 11: AHE 29 paft, being the day of His Majeflies Birth and happy Restauration, was celebrated, besides the Solemnities used on that occasion, with the Signing of the Indian Peace, which was performed in this manner: The feveral Indian Kings and Queens being come to the place affigued, were kindly received by the Commissioners and Council; and silence being pro-claimed, the Overtures of the Peace were publickly read, and each Article of it expounded by Interpreters, After which, the Queen of Pamunekey, being invited to come within the Bar of the Court, to Sign this Treasy in the behalf of her felf, and those Nations, now #gain united under her subjection, performed the same with all cheerfulness, and delivered the Instrument thereof to our Governor, and the like being done by him, the Field-pieces were all discharged several rounds, with Volleys of small shot. And the next day the Indians returned to their several homes.

- Madrin, July 15. Last week an Edick was publishted here forbidding any person to hold two Offices, either Civil or Military; and that whofoever refuses to acgept of any Government offered him, though the fame be inferiour to what he had before, shall thereby be rendred incapable of taking or exerciting any other. Since his Majellies return from Arragon, he has made eleven new G ntlemen of his Bedchamber, viz. the Dukes of Medina, Sidonia, Hixar, and Uzeda, the Marquistes of Guevarra, Leganez, Villamanrique, and Samurassa; the Condes of Alterria, Villaverde and Palma, and Don Antonio de Toledo eldest Son to the Duke of Alva; the Prince of stiglians hath incurred his Majesties displeasure so far, for having presumed to come from Granada (the place to which he was banished) without feave, that what Offices he had are taken from him, and among the rest, that of President of the Council of Flanders, for which several Competitors Already appear. His Majesty has made the Marquis de Liche, his Ambaffador at Reme, and Councellor of State; and as is faid, has appointed the Constable of Cassile to be Viceroy of Sicily, in the place of Cardi-

nal Porto-Garrero.

Copenhagen, July 29. All the discourse here, is of the late Fight in Schonen; the particular circumflances whereof, as we receive them by Letters from the Army, areas follow; The 23 inflant his Majesty parted from his quarters at Hotterousk, and encamped that night near Rennebourg, where he received advice, that the Enemy was likewise decamped, and having reinforced their Army with fresh men out of their Garisons, had pas-Led the Holsung, and so continued their march towards his Majefly. The 24, in the morning, his Majefly fent out several parties to observe their mution; about 8, we discovered them marching in Battalia towards us about 10 the Armies encamped within Cannon shor of each other, and by noon were wholly engaged. Our right Wing was commanded by his Majesty in person, and the Lest by Lieutenant-General Arensdorf. Our lest Wing was first engaged by the right Wing of the Suedes, the dispute lasted some time, when General Major

Watter being killed, and General Major Rumos advancing too far, being taken prifoner, the whole Wing began to tall into confusion, and gave ground, in to much diforder, that they could never be railed again, leaving the Infantry to be destroyed by the Enemy, who made a great flughter among them, and took 18 or 10 pieces of Cannon. In the mean time our right Wing commanded by the King in person, advancing; charged the left Wing of the Suedes with so much vigor, that after a long and stout opposition; they so ded them to give way 5 and preparing to charge a fecond time; to revenge the distribute and loss of their Companions, the King reflecting upon the hard and continual fervice they had been put to all the day (being alone forced to bear the shock of the Enemies whole force) commanded them to retrest, which accordingly they did in good order about 6 in the afternoon. The number of men Cain on both fides is very confiderable. On our fide, the Food fulfered most, having been early, and for a long time ap-posed to the fury of the Enemy, by the disorder which besel the Cavalry of our lest Wing. General Major Walter, Count d' Ortingen (Gaptain of the Kings Guards) and several other Officers of Note were killed upon the place; General Major Rumor, Colonel Ramfieds, and Colonel Redrigo are taken prifoners. On the fide of the Suedes, Velt Marefchal Helmfelds, who commanded the left Wing, and Baron Wachmeefters (late Governor of Staden) were flain; and General Major Schouleben, Colonel Roch, and several other Officers, are carried Prifoners to Landferbon. have fost several Colours and Standards, and taken some from the Enemy, into whose hands a part of the Bag-gage of our lest. Wing unhappily fell, through their disorderly retreat. The Battel being ended, a Council of War was immediately appointed to be held, and feveral Officers, to whole HI conduct of cowardife the defeat of our left Wing is principally ateri-buted, were called in question, and will in a store time receive the punishment they deferve! Our King is strongly retrenched with his Army near Landforcon, where they will consinue still the Troops that are on their march from hence have joined them. His Majethy was often engaged in person in the horrest pare of the ection, and charged feveral times at the head of his own Regiment of Guards, and is faid to have killed leveral of the Enemy with his own hand. The Sieur Grapvilliers, General Major of the Munfler Troops, and the Sieur Walls, Colonel of an Imperial Regiment of Foot, Behaved themselves all day extremely well.

Elfinure, July 19. On Saturday last theirno Armies in Schouen engaged. The Fight was flarp and obstinare, and many Prisoners, Artillery and Colours have been taken on both sides. The lest Wing of the Danes, and the Right of the Suedes, have fuffered excremely. Major-General Gosse had his Morse killed under him, and mounted a second. Passenger's come hither from the Army report, that General Aschemberg is taken prisoner, and that Mareschal Helmselds. who commanded the left Wing of the Suedes Army, is flain.
