[TRANSLATION.]

CAPITULATION of the Island of Tobago, between the Count de Graffe, commanding the Naval Forces of his Most Christian Majesty, and the Marquis de Bouille, Commandant General of the French Windward Islands in America on the one Part, and the Honourable George Ferguson, Esq. Commander in Chief, of the Island of Tobago, and the Honourable Major Stanhope, commanding His Britanian Chief, and the Chief of the Chief o tannic Majesty's Forces in the said Island, on the wother Part.

Article I.

HE Governor, Staff and other Officers of the Troops, and Soldiers of the Garrison of the Island of Tobago, shall march out of the Redoubt and Forts with the Honors of War, and shall afterwards lay down their Arms, the Officers excepted.

II. The Officers and Troops shall be afterwards fent to France, except such Officers as shall have Permission from the French General to remain in the Windward Islands of America upon their Pa-

The Wives and Children of the Troops shall follow the same Destination.

III. The Inhabitants of the Island shall preserve their Civil Government, Laws, Cultoms, and Ordinances; and the same Persons who now administer Justice shall be continued in their Functions until the Peace, as long as they conduct themselves pro-

The Court of Chancery shall be held by the Members of the Council, in the Form established the Island is governed, until the Peace; but the Appeals from the faid Court shall be made to the Council of his Most Christian Majesty.

IV. The Inhabitants in general of the faid Island, and the Clergy, shall be protected in the Enjoyment of their liftates, and of every Thing in their Pos-fession, of whatsoever Nature it may be, as well as of their Brivileges, Rights, Honors, and Exemptions. They shall have the free Exercise of their Religion, and the Clergy shall enjoy their Bene-

The free Negroes and Mulattoes shall be maintained in their Liberty, but no Slave shall be franchiled in future without Permission from the Governor General, conformable to the Customs esta-blished in the French Colonies.

V. The Whisbitains shall pay no other Taxes to his Most Christian Majesty than they paid to His Britannic Majesty.

The Expences attending the Administration of Justice, the Allowances to the Clergy, and other ordinary Charges, to be defrayed by the Colony.

Merchandizes exported from the Colony shall pay the same Duties to the Revenue as are paid in

the French Colonies. The Duties on Entry had be the same.

The Inhabitants shall enjoy all the Commercial Privileges granted to the Subjects of his Most Christian Majesty in his Windward Mands in America.

VI. The Inhabitants, shall not be liable to pay the Contribution of 1200 Half Joannes required and agreed to by the Provisional Capitulation; but the Colony shall be at the Expence of reconstructing the Buildings which were burnt during the Siege, fo that the Inhabitants to whom they belonged will only contribute their Quota of the faid Re-construction, so that the whole Amount do not exceed 1200 Half Joes.

VII. The Effects, and particularly the Slaves, belonging to the Inhabitants of this Colony, which may have been taken during the Siege, and which can be recovered, shall be restored. Those which have been carried on board any of the Ships belonging to the French Squadron shall be kanded and delivered into the Hands of the Provost Marshal.

N. B. The Vessels and Effects on board of them, which were taken before the Island furrendered, or after, not comprehended in this Article.

VIII. The Ships, Vessels, and Droghers belonging to the Inhabitants of this Island, shall remain their private Property; but English Vessels, owned by Persons in Europe, or in the English Hands. shall be faithfully given ap, and furrendered to the French Governor.

IX. The Inhabitants who are absent, even those in the Service of His Britannic Majesty, shall be maintained in the Possession and Enjoyment of their Property, which may be managed by their Attor-

X. The Inhabitants shall be obliged to provide: Lodgings for the Troops, only in Cases of indifpensable Necessity, as is the Custom in the French Islands, the King lodging them in general at his own Expence, or in Buildings that belong to him.

XI. They shall be obliged to furnish Negroes to work upon the Fortifications, or in any other Work relative to the King's Service, to the Amount of 400; and the faid Negroes shall be maintained at the King's Expence, while they are so employed.

XII. The Inhabitants shall take the Oath of Fidelity to His Most Christian Majesty, before the French Governor of the Island, of Tobago, within the Space of Two Days, under the Penalty of forfeiting their Property.

But those Inhabitants, and particularly Widows, who, on Account of Sickness, Absence, or any other Impediment, cannot do so within the Time limited, shall have a Delay allowed them, which shall be fignified to them.

XIII. The Inhabitants shall observe a strict Neutrality, and shall not be forced to take up Arms against His Britannic Majesty, nor against any other Power.

In consequence of which, they shall carry all-their Arms to the chief Residence, where they shall be deposited in the King's Magazines, except such as the Judices of the Peace shall think necessary on each Estate to preserve Order among the Negroes; but the Justices of the Peace shall answer in Person for any improper Use that may be made of them,

contrary to the Tenor of this Capitulation; and they shall transmit to the French Governor within a certain Time which shall be prescribed to them, a List, under their own Signatures, of the Arms which shall have been left with the Inhabitants in their respective Diffriels.

XIV. The Inhabitants of the Island which were not actually, by their Employments, in the Service of His Britannic Majetty, shall not be separed Prifoners of War.

XV. Merchant ships coming from England, or from any other State whatfoever, belonging to the Inhabitants or Merchants of the Island of Tobago, shall be received into the Ports of the said Colony, during the Space of Six Months, without being conficated, and shall be reputed the Property of the faid Inhabitants or Merchants.

Referving after that Time to the French Gover-nor the Right of judging of the Property of the fand Vessels, in Consideration of the distant Places from whence they shall have come. But the said Inhabitants or Merchants shall make a Declaration to the Director of the Revenue of the Vessels which may be or are configned to them, either fingly or in Pastnership, within the Space of One Month.

N. B. Extended to Two Months.

XVI. The Inhabitants in general shall be allowed to dispose freely of their Estates Personal or Real, in the Enjoyment of which they are maintained, and confequently to fell or alienate them," as they shall think fit.

They may dispose equally of their Revenues, and may fend their Children to England, of elsewhere, to be educated, and receive them back again.

XVII. All the Artillery, the Implements, and Things thereto belonging, all the Artis in general, Gunpowder, Provisions, and generally all Effects whatfoever, Buildings, Moveables, and Immoveable, belonging to the King of England, shall be given up to the General of the Troops of his Most Christian Majesty : Inventories Rall be taken thereof and the Delivery shall be made with as little Delay

Individuals, who shall withhold any of the Effeels shove-mentioned, or any Part thereof, or who thall not give in an Account of them within the Space of Fifteen Days, shall be proceeded against

with Sevenity.

English Soldiers or Sailors in their Houses, shall be obliged to give Information of them in the Space of Four Days, under the Penalty of One Hundred Half Joannnes; and those who shall favour their Escape shall be proceeded against with Severity:

St. James's, August 28. AS Several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjetts of Great Britain, bave from Time to Time gone into Foreign Gountries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to pregent such Practices, are putlished for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Pinalties they may incur by Dijobedience to them .- And it will be abjerved, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or in-Arumencal in the Sending or Entiring Artificials or Ma-nufacturers out of those Kingdoms, and in the Export-ation of the Fools and Informents used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufasturers themfelves.

Santue & Goorge I. Chap. 27.

I Pany Berlin shall copyract with entire, or solicit, any Actification Wook, drong Sweet Brain, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch maker, & any

other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and hall be convicted thereof open Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Wellininster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he hall be fined any Sam nor executing ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and fhall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any terfon havingsbeen once convict, shall offend again, he "thall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine-be-paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any outney out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the taid Trades to foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the faid Trades, shall not return into, this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Amb Mador, Minuster or Conful of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers that beor by any terion authorized by fuch Amballador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Perion shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, and o taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase; and shall fortest all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to H Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath befor any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavouring to feduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid; fuch Justice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or besore fome other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Sefsions : And if such Person shall resuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convict upon Indictment of any fuch Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purposes aforetaid, he shall give such Security to the King; not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there:

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13. IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at. Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Jufficiary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be commuted in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forseit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impri-sonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewarter wherein such Offender shall be convicted. for Twelve Calendar Moaths, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons to again offending thall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or reduced. ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and

That fuffer In prisonment in the Common Gable of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender affail back with the Two Years, and until fuch

Porfentile be paid. 17 If thy Person in Great Britain or Ireland hall put oth Board any Ship or Boar not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any futh Tools or Utenfils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Schland, or at any of the Pour Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. thall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs In Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue Fin Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Matjeffy's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utenfels pro-Board any Veffel not bound directly to fome Port Om Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be pub-Mickly fold to the best Bidder; and one Mosety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who hall feize and fecure the fame.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Fools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Ossence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vellel belongs to His Majelty, the Captain shall not only forseit ONE HUN-DRED POUNDS, but shall also forseit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment

under His Majesty.
If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping of Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly, suffer the fame to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforelaid, and also Sorfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of this Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.
