*Extract of a Letter from Sir Andrew Snape Hammond, Commissioner of His Majesty's Navy at Halifax, to Mr. Stephens, dated the 10th of September, 1781.*

**B**E pleased to acquaint the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that His Majesty's Ship the Chatham, Captain Andrew Snape Douglas, is arrived here with the Magicienne, a French Frigate of 32 Guns, Twelve Pounders, and 280 Men, commanded by the Chevalier Bouchtierre, which was taken the 2d Instant, within Three Miles of Boston.

The Enemy engaged the Chatham half an Hour, (although close alongside) during which Time he had 32 Men killed and 54 wounded. The Chatham lost only Two Men in the Action, and had Four wounded.

Dublin Castle, November 6, 1781.

Sunday last being the Anniversary of the Birth of the late King William the Third, of glorious Memory, in the Morning the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower; at Noon, there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant; after which his Excellency, attended by the Nobility and Gentry, and escorted by a Squadron of Horse, went in Procession round the Statue of King William; and on his Excellency's Return to the Castle, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in College Green.

And Yesterday being the Anniversary of the horrid Gunpowder Plot, the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks; and the Evening concluded with Illuminations, Bonfires, and other Demonstrations of Joy.
