IRISH LIFE ANNUITIES,

With Benefit of Survivorship.

THE Subscribers to the Life Annuities, granted by a Resolution of the House of Commons, Session 1777, and provided for by an Act of Parliament, Session 1779, who have usually been paid at the House of Mess.
