THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord High Chancellor of Great-Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Cloathing of the Militia in that Part of Great Britain called England, for One Year, beginning the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-two.

An Act for granting an additional Bounty on Ships employed in the Greenland and Whale Fishery, for a limited Time.

An Act to revive and further continue an Act made in the Seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to discontinue, for a limited Time, the Duties payable upon the Importation of Tallow, Hogs Lard, and Grease.

An Act for allowing further Time for Inrollment of Deeds and Wills made by Papists, and for Relief of Protestant Purchasers.

An Act for providing Quarters for certain Foreign Troops lately employed in His Majesty's Service, in the Defence of the Island of Minorca, and expected to arrive soon in this Kingdom, for a limited Time.

An Act to extend so much of Two Acts of the Twentieth and Twenty-first Years of His present Majesty's Reign, as relate to the Sale of, and ascertaining the Duties upon, East India Goods, to Tea and all other Goods of the Growth, Product, or Manufacture, of China, or any Country within the Limits of the East India Company's Charter, which have been, or shall during the present Hostilities be, brought into this Kingdom, and condemned as Prize; for equalizing the Duties upon, and regulating the Importation of, Foreign Snuff into this Kingdom; and for preventing the Importation and Running of Foreign Spirituous Liquors, Tea, and other prohibited Goods, into this Kingdom, in Vessels fitted out and armed as Privateers.

An Act to prohibit the Ransoming of Ships or Vessels captured from His Majesty's Subjects, and of the Merchandize or Goods on Board such Ships or Vessels.

An Act for better securing the Duties payable by virtue of an Act of the Fifth Year of the Reign of Queen Anne, on the Importation of Coals, Culm, and Cinders, into the Port of Great Yarmouth, in the County of Norfolk.

An Act for the more easy and speedy Recovery of Small Debts within the City of Rochester, and the Parishes of Strood, Frindsbury, Cobham, Shorne, Higham, Cliffe, Cooling, High Halstow, Chalk, Hoo, Burham, Wouldham, Halling, Cuxstone, Chatham, and Gillingham, and the Ville of Shzerness, in the County of Kent.

An Act for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor of the Parish of Saint John of Wapping in the County of Middlesex, and for providing a proper Workhouse and Burial Ground for the Use of the said Parish, and for opening certain Communications and making certain Streets within the said Parish.

An Act for continuing the Term of an Act, made in the Second Year of His present Majesty, for amending and widening the Road leading from the High Post Road near the Town of Faversham, by Bacon's Water, through Ashford, to the Town and Port of Hythe in the County of Kent, and from Bacon's Water, to a certain Lane called Holy-lane, in Wincheap, near the City of Canterbury.

An Act for reviving and continuing the Term, and enlarging the Powers of an Act of the Thirtieth Year of His late Majesty, intituled, An Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads in and near to the Town of Tenbury, in the Counties of Salop, Worcester, and Hereford; and for amending and keeping in Repair, the Roads leading from the Knowle Gate to the Turnpike Road on the Clee Hill, leading from Ludlow to Cleobury Mortimer, and from Kyre Mill to the Turnpike Road leading from Bromyard to Tenbury, in the said Counties.

An Act to continue and enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act, made in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Roads from Haleworthy in the Parish of Davidstow, in the County of Cornwall, to the East End of Wadebridge in the said County, and from the West End of Wadebridge aforesaid, into and through the Borough of Mitchell, in the said County.

An Act for amending and keeping in Repair the Roads leading from the Willersley Turnpike Road, near Parton, to Monkland Mill; and from the Turnpike Road on Fair Mile Field, to the Turnpike Road at Broad Heath; and from the Turnpike Road at or near the Fords Bridge, to the Turnpike Road near Stockton, and from Kyre Common to the Turnpike Road at Grendon Green in the Counties of Hereford and Worcester.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act, made in the First Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening several Roads leading to and through the Towns of Weymouth and Melcombe Regis, and Dorchester, in the County of Dorset; and for repairing the Road leading from the Parish of Warmwell, through the Parishes of Foxwell and Osmington, to the Church in the said Parish of Osmington, in the said County of Dorset.

WHEREAS divers Persons have been guilty of the illegal Practices of clandestine importing and running of prohibited and uncustomed Goods, and thereby subjected themselves to great Penalties, for which some have been already convicted, some are in Execution for the same, and others are under Prosecution, and many more liable to such Penalties, in Consequence of which they abscond, or are gone into Foreign Parts, which has or may prove the Ruin of themselves and their Families: And whereas they may yet be of Use to Us and their Country, in the present Conjuncture of Affairs, by serving Us in Our Navy, in case they are rendered capable thereof by Our Gracious Pardon: We, being desirous of giving them an Opportunity of entering into Our Service, and of rendering themselves of Service to the Publick, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Proclamation; and We do hereby promise and declare, that in case any fit and able Person or Persons, who has or have incurred any Penalties, in, by, or for the clandestine importing, running, landing, relanding, unshipping, concealing, or receiving, or being assisting in such running, landing, relanding, or unshipping, any prohibited Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, or any Goods liable to the Payment of the Duties under the Management of the Commissioners of Customs, Excise, or Salt, or either of them, or who have beat, abused, obstructed or hindered, any Officer or Officers of the said Revenues, in the due Execution of their Duty, or by Reason or Means or on Account of any such Offences as aforesaid, or who are under any Prosecutions, judgement, Outlawry, in Prison, or under or subject to any Execution for any of the said Offences, or gone beyond Sea to avoid the same, shall, on or before the First Day of July next, voluntarily enter themselves as Sailors into Our Service, either with the Officers of Our Ships or Vessels of Our Royal Navy, or other Officers of Our Navy empowered to enter Men to serve on Board Our said Ships or Vessels, or shall procure One fit and able Seaman, and One fit and able Landman, for the Service of Our Navy, as Substitutes to serve for him, her, or them, such as shall be approved by such Officer or Officers in Our Sea Service empowered to receive the same; provided the Penalty to which such Person or Persons is or are liable, does not exceed the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds; and such Person or Persons who hath or have incurred a Penalty of more than Five Hundred Pounds, and less than Two Thousand Pounds, finding Two fit and able Seamen, and Two fit and able Landmen, for the Service of Our Navy as aforesaid; and such Person or Persons who hath or have incurred a Penalty of more than Two Thousand Pounds finding Three fit and able Seamen, and Three fit and able Landmen, for the Service of Our Navy as aforesaid, such as shall be approved by such Officer or Officers in Our Sea Ser-

vice empowered to receive the same; all and every such Person or Persons, so serving, or providing Substitutes to serve for him, her, or them, as aforesaid, shall have Our gracious Pardon of and for all and every such Offence and Offences, and Penalties, and all Indictments, Informations, Prosecutions, Convictions, Judgements, Imprisonments, Executions, and Outlawries, sued, incurred, had or given, or that may arise or accrue for or by Reason or Means of any of the said Offences, or other Matters or Things aforesaid, on all such Person or Persons so entering or finding Substitutes, producing to such Person or Persons at Our Admiralty Office as shall be there appointed, to be registered by him or them at the Expence of such Person or Persons so entering themselves or finding Substitutes, a Certificate or Certificates by the Officer or Officers with whom such Person or Persons, Seaman or Seamen, Landman or Landmen, shall be entered, of their having conformed as aforesaid within the Time aforesaid, and which Registration, or a Copy thereof duly authenticated, shall be deemed and taken as Evidence in all Cases of such Conformity, and shall be a sufficient Warrant for the Discharge of all such Persons in actual Custody for any such Offence: And We do hereby further promise and declare, that in all Cases where the Party or Parties wishing to take the Benefit of this Our Proclamation, who shall not have been prosecuted, or being prosecuted shall not have been convicted, he, she, or they, shall or may intitle themselves thereto, by procuring Two fit and able Seamen, and two fit and able Landmen, for the Service of Our Navy, to be approved and registered as aforesaid.

Extract of a Letter from the Honourable Captain Frederick Maitland, of His Majesty's Ship the Queen, to Mr. Stephens, dated off the Start, April 28.

IBEG you will communicate to their Lordships; that on Sunday Morning the 21st Instant, Commodore Elliot made our Signal, about Ten o'Clock, to assist the Foudroyant and her Prize, as it then blowed very hard. So soon as the Weather permitted, I took every expeditious Method to shift the Prisoners, and to rehit her, and by Nine o'Clock next Morning we had taken out above 300 Prisoners, and sent an Officer and 40 Men. In Addition to the Officer and 50 Men put on Board by Captain Jervis; about which Time we discovered a large Ship to the Southward, standing to the S. W. upon a Wind. I could soon perceive she was not an English Man of War, and the French Officers assured me she was the Protecteur, of 74 Guns. I immediately ordered the Pegasus, together with one of the Cutters that was in Company, to make the best of their Way for the first convenient Port in England, and made Sail towards the strange Ship, which after a Chace of Fourteen Hours we came up with in the Night, and took, upon firing one Broadside, (still supposing her to be the Protecteur) and he only fired his Guns, and struck his Colours. On sending a Boat on Board I found her to be the Actionnaire, of 64 Guns, armée en Flute, commanded by Mons. de Querengal, Knight of the Order of St. Louis, with 250 Seamen, and 550 Soldiers on Board, of which 9 were killed and 25 wounded, bound from Brest to the Isle of France. We find she has a great Quantity of Naval and Ordnance Stores on Board, besides Provisions, Wine, and Rum, together with Eleven Chests of Money. When we were in Chace, the Latona Frigate appeared to Windward, and made the private Signal, but being disabled in her Masts, it was next Morning before she joined us. I now had 1100 Prisoners to manage, and therefore took the Liberty to detain her Twenty-four Hours, to assist in shifting the Prisoners, and to take on Board 150 of them. Captain Conway then parted Company.

In Justice to my Officers and Ship's Company, I cannot omit saying, that they discovered a very high Degree of Ardour and Spirit in coming up with the Enemy, and, during the Whole of this Affair, behaved

haved in such a Manner as merits my Esteem and Approbation.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, That there are at this Time many DESERTERS from the Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's Gracious PARDON; and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence on their future Behaviour: His Majesty is pleased to grant His Free PARDON to all DESERTERS from His Regular Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves before the 17th Day of June next, either to the Regiments to which they belong, or to some other Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, or to any Additional Company or Recruiting Party thereof in Great-Britain or Ireland.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be attested in the Corps to which they surrender; and not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the said Deserters have enlisted in other Corps, and are now serving therein; His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon, and to direct that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, not being Militia; and they shall not be liable to be claimed by that in which they formerly served.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended, and are now in Goal, or in Regimental Custody; His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant them His Free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival at their respective Regiments, or upon their being attested in some other Regular Corps or Recruiting Party.

Any Soldier who may desert, after these His Majesty's most Gracious Intentions are made Public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

HIS Majesty has been pleased to order, that over and above the usual Bounty Money of THREE GUINEAS allowed to Recruits at the Time of Enlisting, every Man who, on or after the 13th Day of May next, shall enlist with any Regular Corps of Infantry, shall receive, on his Arrival at the Quarters of the Regiment, and on being approved by the Commanding Officer thereof, the further Sum of THREE GUINEAS; And each Soldier, so hereafter enlisted and approved, shall receive another GUINEA at the End of Twelve Months from
