**W**HEREAS many Seamen have, from Time to Time, inconsiderately deserted His Majesty's Service, by leaving the Ships they belonged to, as they could find Opportunity for so doing, or, having been put on Shore Sick from His Majesty's Ships, either into Hospitals or Sick Quarters, have made so ill a Return to the Care taken for their Healths as to desert from His Majesty's Service, when so far recovered as to be able to withdraw themselves from the said Hospitals or Sick Quarters; for which Crimes they have incurred the Loss of their Wages, and are punishable with Death by a Court Martial: But my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty being willing to impute such Desertion to a Rashness which most of them soon repent of, and believing that they would return to their Ships, were it not from Apprehensions of Punishment; in order therefore to remove such Apprehensions, and encourage them to return to their Duty, their Lordships do hereby declare, That if any Persons who have deserted as aforesaid shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next, return to the Ships to which they did belong, or, in case those Ships are gone Abroad, enter themselves on Board some other of His Majesty's Ships, they shall not be punished in any Manner whatsoever, on Account of the Crimes they have committed in withdrawing themselves from His Majesty's Service as aforesaid, *excepting such as have been guilty of Mutiny, or any other notorious Crimes:* And, as a further Encouragement, their Lordships are pleased

to declare, that such as shall so return shall have their R<sup>s</sup> taken off, and be paid their Wages for the Ships from which they respectively deserted; but their Lordships do also think fit to declare, that all Persons under the above-mentioned Circumstances, who do not make a proper Use of the Indulgence hereby offered them, will be strictly sought after, and, (in case they are apprehended) brought to a Court Martial, and treated as the Law directs.

**W**HEREAS it has been represented to the King, That there are at this Time many DESERTERS from the Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's Gracious PARDON; and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence on their future Behaviour: His Majesty is pleased to grant His Free PARDON to all DESERTERS from His Regular Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves before the 17th Day of June next, either to the Regiments to which they belong, or to some other Regular Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, or to any Additional Company or Recruiting Party thereof in Great-Britain or Ireland.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be attested in the Corps to which they surrender; and not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

And whereas many of the said Deserters have enlisted in other Corps, and are now serving therein; His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon, and to direct that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, not being Militia; and they shall not be liable to be claimed by that in which they formerly served.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended, and are now in Goal, or in Regimental Custody; His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant them His Free Pardon, of which they

they are to have the Benefit upon their Arrival at their respective Regiments, or upon their being attested in some other Regular Corps or Recruiting Party.

Any Soldier who may desert, after these His Majesty's most Gracious Intentions are made Public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

### A P R O C L A M A T I O N . G E O R G E R .

**W**HEREAS divers Persons have been guilty of the illegal Practices of clandestine importing and running of prohibited and uncustomed Goods, and thereby subjected themselves to great Penalties, for which some have been already convicted, some are in Execution for the same, and others are under Prosecution, and many more liable to such Penalties, in Consequence of which they abscond, or are gone into Foreign Parts, which has or may prove the Ruin of themselves and their Families: And whereas they may yet be of Use to Us and their Country, in the present Conjunction of Affairs, by serving Us in Our Navy, in case they are rendered capable thereof by Our Gracious Pardon: We, being desirous of giving them an Opportunity of entering into Our Service, and of rendering themselves of Service to the Publick, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Proclamation; and We do hereby promise and declare, that in case any fit and able Person or Persons, who has or have incurred any Penalties, in, by, or for the clandestine importing, running, landing, relanding, unship-

ping, concealing, or receiving, or being assisting in such running, landing, relanding, or unshipping, any prohibited Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, or any Goods liable to the Payment of the Duties under the Management of the Commissioners of Customs, Excise, or Salt, or either of them, or who have beat, abused, obstructed or hindered, any Officer or Officers of the said Revenues, in the due Execution of their Duty, or by Reason or Means or on Account of any such Offences as aforesaid, or who are under any Prosecutions, Judgement, Outlawry, in Prison, or under or subject to any Execution for any of the said Offences, or gone beyond Sea to avoid the same, shall, on or before the First Day of July next, voluntarily enter themselves as Sailors into Our Service, either with the Officers of Our Ships or Vessels of Our Royal Navy, or other Officers of Our Navy empowered to enter Men to serve on Board Our said Ships or Vessels, or shall procure One fit and able Seaman, and One fit and able Landman, for the Service of Our Navy, as Substitutes to serve for him, her, or them, such as shall be approved by such Officer or Officers in Our Sea Service empowered to receive the same; provided the Penalty to which such Person or Persons is or are liable, does not exceed the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds; and such Person or Persons who hath or have incurred a Penalty of more than Five Hundred Pounds, and less than Two Thousand Pounds, finding Two fit and able Seamen, and Two fit and able Landmen, for the Service of Our Navy as aforesaid; and such Person or Persons who hath or have incurred a Penalty of more than Two Thousand Pounds, finding Three fit and able Seamen, and Three fit and able Landmen, for the Service of Our Navy as aforesaid, such as shall be approved by such Officer or Officers in Our Sea Service empowered to receive the same; all and every such Person or Persons, so serving, or providing Substitutes to serve for him, her, or them, as aforesaid, shall have Our gracious Pardon of and for all and every such Offence and Offences, and Penalties, and all Indictments, Informations, Prosecutions, Convictions, Judgements, Imprisonments, Executions, and Outlawries, sued, incurred, had or given, or that may arise or accrue for or by Reason or Means of any of the said Offences, or other Matters or Things aforesaid, on all such Person or Persons so entering or finding Substitutes, producing to such Person or Persons at Our Admiralty Office as shall be there appointed, to be registered by him or them at the Expence of such Person or Persons so entering themselves or finding Substitutes, a Certificate or Certificates by the Officer or Officers with whom such Person or Persons, Seaman or Seamen, Landman or Landmen, shall be entered, of their having conformed as aforesaid within the Time aforesaid, and which Registration, or a Copy thereof duly authenticated, shall be deemed and taken as Evidence in all Cases of such Conformity, and shall be a sufficient Warrant for the Discharge of all such Persons in actual Custody for any such Offence: And We do hereby further promise and declare, that in all Cases where the Party or Parties wishing to take the Benefit of this Our Proclamation, who shall not have been prosecuted, or being prosecuted shall not have been convicted, he, she, or they, shall or may intitle themselves thereto, by procuring Two fit and able Seamen, and two fit and able Landmen, for the Service of Our Navy, to be approved and registered as aforesaid.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 14th of December last, to order, that the Prohibition at that Time subsisting upon the Exportation, or carrying of Copper Coastwise, should be continued for Six Months, to commence from the 22d Day of December last: And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board, on Behalf of the several Companies of Copper Smelters within the Kingdom in Great Britain, that the Prohibition of the Export of Sheet Copper, as directed by the said Order, has been very detrimental to the Petitioners and to the Trade of this Kingdom in general: His Majesty taking the same into Consideration, and being ever desirous to remove all Obstructions upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with sound Policy, is hereby pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to permit and allow Copper in Sheets, weighing less than Twelve and more than Forty Ounces to the Foot superficial, to be carried Coastwise or exported to any Parts beyond the Sea, to which the same may be lawfully exported, upon Condition, that all such Copper be inspected and examined by an Agent or Agents appointed or to be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and that a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of the said Agent or Agents shall be first had and obtained, setting forth, that no Part of such Copper consists of Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial; which Certificate from the said Agent shall be delivered to the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port in which the said Copper is intended to be shipped, and shall be their Authority for allowing the Quantity of Copper specified in the said Certificate to be put on Board, in order to be carried Coastwise or exported: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to permit and allow the Exportation as aforesaid of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial; provided that the same shall consist of Pieces not exceeding Four Pounds-Weight in any one Piece; and that a Certificate thereof be obtained in Manner above directed, before such Copper be laden or put on Board; and also to permit the carrying Coastwise of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial; upon Condition that no more than Five Hundred Weight of such Copper shall be shipped by any one Person or Partnership, and that the Quantity put on Board any one Ship or Vessel shall not exceed Ten Hundred Weight in the Whole, unless Security by Bond hath first been given to the proper Officers of His Majesty's Customs, in Treble the Value of such Copper, to carry the same to the Places proposed, and none other; and to produce and deliver a Certificate or Certificates, within Two Months from the Date of the Bond, from the proper Officers of the Customs at the Ports for which any such Copper shall be entered and cleared out, of the same having been all duly landed at such Ports; which Certificate or Certificates such Officer is hereby required to give; and the same Certificate or Certificates the Commissioners of the Customs are hereby required to transmit to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in order to be laid before this Board. And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain,

and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

An Act to remove certain Doubts which have been conceived concerning the Construction of three several Acts of Parliament passed in this Kingdom in the Reign of His present Majesty, for granting Annuities to such Persons as should voluntarily subscribe the Sums therein respectively mentioned.

An Act for the further Relief of His Majesty's Subjects of this Kingdom, professing the Popish Religion.
