He made a confiderable Promotion of Officers on this Occasion: Four Major-Generals were raised to the Rank of Lieutenant-Generals; Ten Colonels were appointed Major-Generals; and a proportionable Advancement took Place in the inferior Ranks.

the Admiralty being willing to impute such Defertion into a Rashness which most of them soon repent of, and believing that they would return to their Ships, were it not from Apprehensions of Punishment; in order therefore to remove such Apprehensions, and encourage them to return to their Duty, their Lordships do he eby declare, That if any Persons who have deserted as aforesaid shall, ou on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next, return to the Ships to which they did belong, or, in case those Ships are gone Abroad, enter themselves on Board some other of His Majetly's Ships, they shall not be punished in any Manner whatsoever, on Account of the Crimes they have committed in withdrawing themselves from His Majetty's Service as aforesaid, excepting such as have been guilty of Muting, or any other notorious Crimes: And, as a further Encouragement, their Lordships are pleased to declare, that such as shall so return shall have their Rs taken off, and be paid their Wages for the Ships from which they respectively deserted; but their Lordships do also think fit to declare, that all Persons under the above mentioned Circumstances, who do not make a proper Use of the Indulgence hereby offered them, will be firictly fought after, and, (in case they are apprehended) brought to a Court Martial, and treated as the Law directs.
