Tuesday last, being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Birth-day, the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower; the Great Guns at the Salute Battery, in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks: At Noon there was a very numerous Assembly of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, of both Sexes, at the Castle, who appeared in great Splendor, to compliment his Grace the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode, set to Musick, was performed: In the Evening a Play was given by his Grace to the Ladies; and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy, throughout this City.

Berlin, May 25. The great annual Review of the Prussian Troops in the District of Berlin took Place this Week as usual.

The King of Prussia came on the 19th Instant from Potsdam to Charlottenburg, by Way of Spandau, where he reviewed Prince Henry and Prince Ferdinand's Regiments of Infantry. Next Morning his Majesty reviewed the several Regiments that had marched into Berlin from the Towns in the Neighbourhood;

bourhood; and on the 21st, 22d, and 23d, the general Manœuvres were performed on the Plains of Templehof, adjoining to this City. The 20th and 23d the King had a Levee at the Palace, where the principal Military Officers, the Foreign Ministers, and the Nobility were present; and on the 23d, immediately after the Review, he returned to Potzdam. His Majesty seemed to be in perfect Health, and expressed particular Satisfaction with the Manner in which the Troops performed their Evolutions. He made a considerable Promotion of Officers on this Occasion: Four Major-Generals were raised to the Rank of Lieutenant-Generals; Ten Colonels were appointed Major-Generals; and a proportionable Advancement took Place in the inferior Ranks.
