A PROCLAMATION,

For recalling and prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States; for giving Encouragement to Seamen and Able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves in Board His Majesty's Ships of War; and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves.

GEORGE R.

Whereas We are informed that great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom: And whereas Our Service doth at this Time require a speedy Supply of Seamen and Seafaring Men to man such of Our Ships as are now ready to be commissioned: We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever, (being Our natural-born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return home to their native Countries: And farther, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever, (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them and every of them from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, That if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men, (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Great Britain. And whereas it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen, Seafaring Men, and Able-bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service, We do hereby promise and declare, that all such Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of September next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or the Chief Officers on board such Tenders as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Five Pounds each Man; and all such Ordinary Seamen, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds Ten Shillings each Man as Our Royal Bounty; and that every Able-bodied

Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall voluntarily enter themselves as aforesaid to serve on board any of Our Ships, shall receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man; such respective Sums to be paid by the respective Clerks of the Cheque residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships into which they shall be entered shall be immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen. And We do declare, that the Qualification of the Seamen so entering themselves as aforesaid shall be certified by the Captain, Master and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on board any other Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty Money, We do hereby declare and command, that such Seamen or Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits. And We do hereby further promise and declare, that a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, shall be paid any Person who shall discover any Seaman or Seamen who may secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the 30th Day of September next; the said Rewards to be paid for any Seaman or Seamen, so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, and, at the Out-Ports, by the Naval Officers, (where there are any) and, where there are no Naval Officers, by the Collectors of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names and Number of Seamen procured in consequence of his Discovery; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

WH E R E A S the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 14th of December last, for continuing the Prohibition on the Exportation or Carrying of Copper Coastwise, (except as therein mentioned) will expire on the 22d of this instant June: And whereas, upon the Application of the several Companies of Copper Smelters

Smelters within the Kingdom of Great Britain, His Majesty (in order to remove all Obstructions upon Trade, so far as might be consistent with sound Policy) was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 10th of last Month, to permit and allow Copper of the Weight and Dimensions described in the said Order, to be carried Coastwise or exported, under certain Restrictions and Conditions therein specified: And whereas His Majesty judges it necessary for the Public Good, at this critical Conjunction, that the Exportation or Carrying Copper Coastwise, should continue to be prohibited for some Time longer, except under the Restrictions and Conditions allowed by the above-recited Order of the 10th of May last. His Majesty is thereupon pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Prohibition upon the Exportation or Carrying of Copper Coastwise be continued for Six Months, to commence from the 22d Day of this instant June; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure that the same shall not be taken to extend to any Sort of Copper to be exported or sent Coastwise by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, or their Officers or Agents, for His Majesty's Service; or to the carrying Coastwise or exporting of Copper in Sheets, weighing less than Twelve and more than Forty Ounces to the Foot superficial, to any Parts beyond the Sea, to which the same may be lawfully exported, upon Condition, that all such Copper be inspected and examined by an Agent or Agents appointed or to be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and that a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of the said Agent or Agents shall be first had and obtained, setting forth, that no Part of such Copper consists of Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial; which Certificate from the said Agent shall be delivered to the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port in which the said Copper is intended to be shipped, and shall be their Authority for allowing the Quantity of Copper specified in the said Certificate to be put on Board, in order to be carried Coastwise or exported: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to permit and allow the Exportation of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial, provided that the same shall consist of Pieces not exceeding Four Pounds Weight in any One Piece; and that a Certificate thereof be obtained in Manner above directed, before such Copper be laden or put on Board; and also to permit the carrying Coastwise of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial, upon Condition that no more than Five Hundred Weight of such Copper shall be shipped by any one Person or Partnership, and that the Quantity put on Board any one Ship or Vessel shall not exceed Ten Hundred Weight in the Whole, unless Security by Bond hath first been given to the proper Officers of His Majesty's Customs, in Treble the Value of such Copper, to carry the same to the Places proposed, and none other; and to produce and deliver a Certificate or Certificates, within Two Months from the Date of the Bond, from the proper Officers of the Customs at the Ports for which any such Copper shall be entered and cleared out, of the same having been all duly landed at such Ports; which Certificate or Certificates such Officer is hereby required to give; and the same Certificate or Certificates the Commissioners of the Customs are hereby required to transmit to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in order to be laid before this Board. And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Copy of a Letter from Lieutenant Cadman, commanding the Despatch, an Armed Ship in His Majesty's Service, to Mr. Stephens. Dated at Exmouth the 21st of June, 1782.

S I R,

IBEG you will inform their Lordships, that Yesterday at Five P. M. Portland bearing E. by S. Six Leagues, I observed an Armed Brig standing out of West Bay; I immediately cleared for Action, and stood towards her: On coming within Hail she

The hoisted Dutch Colours, and began to engage us. The Conflict lasted about Two Hours, when she struck to the Defiance, and proved to be too Weak, commanded by Pierre de Ture, belonging to England, of 16 Long Six Pounders, and 1 Eighteen-Pounder, 113 Men, had been out only Four Days, Three Weeks off the Stocks, and had One Ransomer on board for One Hundred Guineas. I am happy to inform you, in this Action I only lost One Man, and One wounded, though much shattered in our Sails and Rigging: The Boat stove, Jib Boom and Cap damaged, and several Shot through our Sides. The Loss on the Enemy's Part was Twenty-one killed and Seventeen wounded; among the latter were the Two Captains; and the greatest Part dangerous. I beg Leave to recommend to their Lordships the good Conduct, Spirit and Zeal of Mr. Williams, Master, the Officers, and Ship's Company, which at that Time consisted only of 68 Men, (the Remainder of our Complement being sick on Shore) and the Guns of the Defiance only Four-Pounders.

Petersburgh, May 28. Yesterday at Noon a Fire broke out in that Part of the Town where the General Market is situated, and in less than Four Hours a Square of near a Mile was burnt to the Ground. All the Shops where the different Articles of Provisions are sold, the Butchery, Fish-market, &c. were consumed, and the Flames unfortunately reached the Buildings in the opposite Street. The great Attention of the Military and Firemen, who were animated by the Presence of her Imperial Majesty, prevented them from extending still further; and, by their unremitting Activity, a large Square of Stone Shops, containing the most valuable Effects, and indeed the whole District of the Town where the Fire began, were fortunately saved.

And any Marine who may desert after this Public Notice of His Majesty's most gracious Intentions, will not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

WHEREAS many Seamen have, from Time to Time, inconsiderately deserted His Majesty's Service, by leaving the Ships they belonged to, as they could find Opportunity for so doing, or, having been put on Shore Sick from His Majesty's Ships, either into Hospitals or Sick Quarters, have made so ill a Return to the Care taken for their Healths as to desert from His Majesty's Service, when so far recovered as to be able to withdraw themselves from the said Hospitals or Sick Quarters; for which Crimes they have incurred the Loss of their Wages, and are punishable with Death by a Court Martial: But my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty being willing to impute such Desertion into a Rashness which most of them soon repent of, and believing that they would return to their Ships, were it not from Apprehensions of Punishment; in order therefore to remove such Apprehensions, and encourage them to return to their Duty, their Lordships do hereby declare, That if any Persons who have deserted as aforesaid shall, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next, return to the Ships to which they did belong, or, in case those Ships are gone Abroad, enter themselves on Board some other of His Majesty's Ships, they shall not be punished in any Manner whatsoever, on Account of the Crimes they have committed in withdrawing themselves from His Majesty's Service as aforesaid, *excepting such as have been guilty of Mutiny, or any other notorious Crimes:* And, as a further Encouragement, their Lordships are pleased to declare, that such as shall so return shall have their R^s taken off, and be paid their Wages for the Ships from which they respectively deserted; but their Lordships do also think fit to declare, that all Persons under the above-mentioned Circumstances, who do not make a proper Use of the Indulgence hereby offered them, will be strictly sought after, and, (in case they are apprehended) brought to a Court Martial, and treated as the Law directs.
