the roth of last Month, to permit and allow Copper of the Weight and Dimensions described in the laid Order, to be carried Coastwife or exported, under certain Restrictions and Conditions therein Tpecified : And whereas His Majelty judges it ne-ceffary for the Public Good, at this critical Conjuncture, that the Exportation or Carrying Copper Coaltwife, fhould-continue to be prohibited for fome Time longer, except under the Refirictions and Conditions allowed by the above recited Order of the 10th of May laft. His Majefty is thereupon pleafed, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Prohibition upon the Exportation or Carrying of Copper Coastwife be continued for Six Months, to commence from the zzd Day of this inflant June; but it is His Majefty's Pleafure that the fame shall not be taken to extend to any Sort of Copper to be exported or fent Coastwife by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, or their Officers or Agents, for His Majesty's Service ; or to the carrying Coastwife or exporting of Copper in Sheets, weighing lefs than Twelve and more than Forty Ounces to the Foot I weive and more than Forty Ounces to the Foot fuperficial, to any Parts beyond the Sea, to which the fame may be lawfully exported, upon Con-dition, that all fuch Copper be infpected and exa-mined by an Agent or Agents appointed or to be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and that a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of the faid Agent or Agents shall be first had and obtained, setting forth, that no Part of fuch Copper confifts of Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and less than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial; which Certificate from the faid Agent shall be delivered to the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port in which the faid Copper is intended to be fhipped, and fhall be their Authority for allowing the Quantity of Copper fpecified in the faid Certificate to be put on Board, in order to be carried Coastwife or exported : And His Majefty is hereby further pleafed to permit and allow the Exportation of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and lefs than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot fuperficial, provided that the fame shall confist of Pieces not exceeding Four Pounds Weight in any One Piece; and that a Certificate thereof be obtained in Manner above directed, before fuch Copper be laden or put on Board ; and alfo to permit the carrying Coaffwife of Copper in Sheets weighing more than Twelve Ounces and lefs than Forty Ounces inclusive to the Foot superficial, upon Condition that no more than Five Hundred Weight of fuch Copper shall be shipt by any one Person or Partnership, and that the Quantity put on Board any one Ship or Vessel shall not exceed Ten Hun-dred Weight in the Whole, unless Security by Bond hath first been given to the proper Officers of His Majeity's Customs, in Treble the Value of such Copper, to carry the fame to the Places proposed, and none other; and to produce and deliver a Certificate or Certificates, within Two Months from the Date of the Bond, from the proper Officers of the Cultoms at the Ports for which any fuch Copper shall be entered and cleared out, of the same having been all duly landed at fuch Ports; which Certificate or Certificates fuch Officer is hereby required to give ; and the fame Certificate or Certifi. cates the Commissioners of the Customs are hereby quirsd to transmit to the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treasury, in order to be laid before this Board. And the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treafury, the Commiffioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
