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Secretary of State's-Office, Whitehall, July 9.

**P**URSUANT to an Act of Parliament passed in this present Session, intituled, "An Act for compelling John Whitehill, Esquire, to return into this Kingdom; and for restraining him, in case of his Return, from going out of this Kingdom for a limited Time; and for discovering his Estate and Effects, and preventing the transporting or alienating of the same;" the following Extract from the said Act is here inserted.

**W**HEREAS John Whitehill, Esquire, heretofore Governor and President of the Settlement of Fort Saint George, on the Coast of Coromandel in the East Indies, and also heretofore Member of the Council and of the Select Committee of the Settlement aforesaid, appears, from various Papers and Records of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, by reason of his Conduct as Governor, and One of the Council and of the Select Committee of the Settlement aforesaid, to be a fit Object of Justice in Parliament: And whereas the said John Whitehill, Esquire, is now out of this Kingdom; therefore, and to the End that the Person and Estates, Real and Personal, of the said John Whitehill may be forth-coming, and secured so as to be liable to Justice in Parliament; may it please your Majesty that it may be enacted, and be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That if the said John Whitehill, Esquire, shall, within the Space of Forty-two Days next after Three several Notices shall have been given in The London Gazette for that Purpose, return into this Kingdom, which Notices One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State is hereby required to insert in the said Gazette within Fourteen Days next after the passing of this Act, he, the said John Whitehill, Esquire, shall not go or depart out of the Kingdom before the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three; and that the said John Whitehill, Esquire, shall, within the Space of Twenty-eight Days next after his Return into this Kingdom, in due Form of Law, enter into one or more Recognizance or Recognizances to His Majesty, with Two or more sufficient Sureties, before the Lord Chief Baron, or Two other of the Barons of His Majesty's Court of Exchequer at Westminster, in the Penalty of Fifty Thousand Pounds for the said John Whitehill, Esquire, and in the Penalty of Twenty Thousand Pounds for his Sureties, no One of such Sureties being in a less Penalty than Five Thousand Pounds: Which said several Recognizances shall be made upon this Condition; That if the said John Whitehill, Esquire, who shall enter into such Recognizance, shall not go or depart out of this Kingdom before the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, then such Recognizances shall be void, otherwise the same shall remain in Force; for the taking, entering, and inrolling of which Recognizance or Recognizances, the said Lord Chief Baron or Barons, or other Officer, shall take Ten Shillings, and no more, besides the Stamp-Duty: And in case the said John Whitehill, Esquire, shall neglect to enter into such Recognizance within the Space of Twenty-eight Days next after his Return into this Kingdom, he shall, by the said Lord Chief Baron or Barons, or any Two or more of them, be committed to the Prison of the Fleet,

there to remain, without Bail or Mainprize, until the said First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, or until he shall enter into such Recognizance with Sureties as aforesaid; and the said Chief Baron or Barons, or any Two or more of them, are hereby respectively authorized and required to issue his or their Warrant or Warrants for that Purpose: And if the said John Whitehill, Esquire, shall, before the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, go or depart out of this Kingdom, he, and all and every Person or Persons who shall willingly be aiding and assisting to such Departure, shall forfeit to the King, His Heirs and Successors, all and singular his, her, or their Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, and all and singular his, her, or their Personal Estate and Effects, of what Nature or Kind soever.

The following Addresses from the Volunteers of the Province of Leinster, and the Inhabitants of the Town of Newry, having been transmitted to the Earl of Shelburne, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, have been by him presented to the King: Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

**W**E, your Majesty's faithful Subjects, the Volunteers of the Province of Leinster, humbly beg Leave to approach your Majesty with Sentiments of the most unfeigned Loyalty, Affection, and Respect. Strangers to Adulation, we address our gracious Sovereign in the open Language of Freemen who have asserted their Rights, and uninfluenced speak the genuine Satisfaction of their Hearts at the Attainment of their Object.

Your Majesty's People of Ireland, feeling the same Love of Liberty which has so often displayed itself in the Conduct of their Fellow-Subjects of England, have fought only to be restored to that Constitution, to which by Right and Compact they were intituled. The benign Attention of your Majesty to the Welfare of all your Subjects, and the Wisdom of Great Britain, have, we conceive, acceded to our just Requisitions, and will have, by repealing the Statute of the Sixth of George I. (when that Measure shall be compleated) annihilated every Claim of British Legislation and Jurisdiction over this Country for ever, and as such we hold it satisfactory.

Viewing therefore that Repeal as a total Extinction and Renunciation of a Principle hostile to the Rights of Ireland; relying with the most unbounded Confidence on the National Character, the Sincerity, and the Wisdom of Great Britain, and convinced that it is impossible our Magnanimous Sister Kingdom can ever entertain a Thought of violating the Faith of Nations, by the Revival of a Claim so solemnly relinquished, we are happy to declare, that our Jealousies are at an End; and we cheerfully unite our Voice with that of our Legislature, in assuring your Majesty, that when the Objects contained in the late Addresses of our Parliament shall be finally accomplished, no Constitutional Question between the Two Nations will any longer exist that can interrupt their Harmony.

The natural Current of our Affections, long painfully restrained, now runs with redoubled Force to a Nation whose Interests, next to our own Liberties, are the First Wish of our Hearts: Great Britain shall find that her Power, so far from being diminished,



diminished, has derived new Strength from her Justice; and the Conduct of your Irish Subjects will, we trust, evince to your Majesty, that the firmest Basis of your Throne is the Affection of a Free People.

Animated with these Sentiments, we shall endeavour to supply, by our Exertions, the Absence of those Troops; which our Parliament have offered to your Majesty to be employed against the Common Enemies of the Empire. With the great Charter of Liberty reared upon our Standard, the Cause of Britain becomes the Cause of Ireland; and we are ready to face the Foes of both, determined with her to conquer, or with her to fall.

We cannot conclude this our humble Address, without offering to your Majesty the grateful Tribute of our Acknowledgements, for the late Change which your Majesty has been pleased to adopt in your Councils and Ministers, and for those Measures tending to Public Economy and Diminution of undue Influence, which we have been taught to hope are to be extended to this Kingdom; and we trust the Day is approaching, when Corruption will be no more; when an Administration composed of Constitutional Men, standing on the solid Ground of Public Liberty, actuated by no Object but Public Prosperity, will see a grateful and independent Nation crowd to its Support, and raise it superior to any Arts which would shake, or any Props which would disgrace it.
