The Diligence and Ardour, with which you have entered upon the Confideration of the British Interefts in the Eaft Indies, are worthy of your Wifdom, Justice, and Humanity.—To protect the Per-fons and Fortunes of Millions in those distant Regions, and to combine Our Profperity with their Happinels, are Objects which amply repay the ut-mole Labour and Exertion.

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons,

I return you My particular Thanks for the very liberal Supplies which you have granted with fo much Chearfulnefs and Zeal for the Service of the current Year. I reflect with extreme Regret upon the heavy Expence which the Circumstances of Publick Affairs unavoidably call for. But if, for Want of a corresponding Disposition in Our Enemies, I should be disappointed in the Hope I entertain of a speedy Termination of the Calamities of War, I rely on the Spirit, Affection, and Unanimity of My Parliament and People, to fupport the Honour of My Crown, and the Interests of My Kingdoms; not doubting that the Bleffing. of Heaven, which I devoutly implore upon Our Arms, employed as they are in Our just and necelfary Defence, will enable Me to obtain fair and reasonable Terms of Pacification. The most tri-umphant Career of Victory would not excite me to aim at more ; and I have the Satisfaction to be able

to add, that I fee no Reafon which should induce | Me to think of accepting lefs.

of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, the 11th Inftant.

MY LORD,

HE large Army under the Command of the Governor of the Havanna, confifting of Three Frigates, Sixty Sail of Transports, Forty of which were Topfail Voffels, having Two Thou-fand Five Hundred Troops on Board, invested me the 6th Instant, at Day Break, and fummoned me to furrender, upon honourable Terms, at Nine o'Clock. I called my Council together, who were unanimous in their Opinion, that as the Strength of the Country was then out in Privateers, and an Invalid Garrifon of One Hundred and Sevency, fit for Duty (on the Ramparts only) and juft ar-tived, they advifed me to propose Terms honourable.

Not fatisfied it was doing Justice to my Character, I called the Officers of the Garrison prefent, the Militia Officers, and the principal Inhabitants, who were unanimous in their Opinion, that to make a Defence of a few Hours would not entitle them from the Governor but to Terms of Difcretion.

"HE Spanish Troops under the Command of Don Juan Mailuel Cagigal were the Second Division going to the Cape, in order to join their First under the Command of Don Galvez; but as they had no Transports of their own, they wifely laid an Embargo, by which Means they p.ocur. d a fufficient Number from the Americans, who readily hired their Vessels to go against Providence at their own Rifk. However, the Spanish General dilappointed them exceedingly in not including them in the Capitulation, and now compels them to proceed further, paying them as Transports. Jamaica was the original Object, and we might have escaped a Vifit, had not the Winds, and the Affurances given them by feveral of our own Inhabitants, who were employed by Government in Flags of Truce, of the Facility of reducing this Place, joined to the Confideration of the Rifk of the Vessels being on the American Account, induced them to make the Attempt, in which they have been too fuccefsful, but I am certain they adhere to their first Intention of attempting Jamaica.

Immediately on my Arrival I gave your Lordfh'p my Opinion of the Inhabitants, and the Strength requifite to keep the Ifland in Order. In the Council of War, confifting of the Militia Officers and Principal Inhabitants, there were Thirty three unanimoufly of Opinion to capitulate.

Inclosed is a Return of their Strength, and of the Number of Veffels employed by them. I beg your Lordship will sufpend any unravourable Opision of my Conduct, until it is properly invelli-gated, which I have in my Power to accelerate, in virtue of the laft Article of the Capitulation, which, though I did not expect, yet as it had been granted at St Kitt's, the General handlomely inferted it.

Articles of Capitulation agreed on ut Naffau in New Providence, this 8th Day of May, 1782, be-tween his Excellency Don Juan Manuel de Cagi-gal, Captain General and Commander in Chief over the Island of Cubu, Governor of Havanna, and Lieutenant General of his Catholick Majesty's Arms: And his Excellency John Max well, Ejo; Captain-General, Governor and Commander in Chief of the Bahama Islands, Chancestor, Vice-Admiral and Ordinary of the fame, and a Lieu-tenant-Colonel in His Majefty's Army.

Article I.

*HE Poffeffion of the Iflands of New Providence, Elenthera, and Harbour Island, as also of all other the Bahama Islands, together with the Artillery, Powder, Arms, Ammunition and Stores, as also all the Forts and Polts in the fame, now in Possession of the Troops of His Britannic Majesty, shall be delivered up to the Troops of his Catholic Majelty, together with an Inventory thereof. The British Garrison to march out with all the Honours of War, Arms thouldered, Drums beating, Colours flying, Two Field Pieces, with Six Rounds of Aminunition, and the fame Number of Rounds to each Soluier, and then deliver up their Arms; and that all Officers, Military and Civil, retain their Side Arms: After which the Troops shall be embarked as speedily fas possible on board of Vessels, sufficiently provided and vic-tualled, at the Expence of his Catholic Majetty, to be fent without any unneceffary Delay to any Port in Great Britain or America, in the l'offession of His Britannic Majelly, at the Option of Governor Maxwell. The Proops to be under the immediate Direction of their own respective Officers, and not to ferve against Spain. or her Allies, until an equal Number of Frifoners belonging to Spain, or her Allies, shall be given by Great Britain in Exchange, according to the established Custom of Equality.

Article I. Granted; and the Troops are to be fent to any Port in Great B itain, or to Bernuda, or to any of His Britannic Majelty's Iflands in the Welt Indies, excep: Jamaica; and not to ferve against any of the Powers at War against Great Britain, until duly exchanged.

Article II All Officers Civil and Military, and other Inhabitants who thall chufe to leave thefe Iffaceds, thall have Liberty to depart with their Fa-milies, Negroes, and other Effaces of all and every Kind whatfoever, and fi Il have Eight en Monthe allowed them to fittl, their offairs, eau fell their Effects,

Article II. Granted; and fuch of the Inhabitants as thall chuie to relide in these Islands, after he Expiration of Eighteen Months, shail be obliged to take the Oath of Allegiance to his Catholic Majelly.

Article III. The Inhabitants within all the Islands within this Government, both Secular and Clergy, thall be maintained in the Poffestion of their real and perional Effates and Property, of what Nature foever, as well as in the Enjoyments of their Kights and Privileges, Honour- and Emolu-ments; and the free Negroes and Mulattoes in their Freedom, Immunities and Properties.

Article III. Granted in the General, provided that those Privileges, Rights, Honours and Emolu- , ments do not interfere with or impede the ellablifhed Rule of the Police, and the Military Orders of the Place.

Article IV. The Inhabitants fhall pay no other Duty than they paid to His Britannic Majelly, without any other Tax o: Import. Article IV. Granted, during the War. Article V. The Ships, Velicits a d Drough rs.

belonging to the Inhabitants of thefe Iflands, fnall remain the Property of the faid Inhabitants.

Article V. All Ships, Veffels and Droughers, and Boats, that are now within the Bahama Mands, and actually the Property of any of the Inhabitants thereof, shall be deemed the Property of the faid inhabitants; and all other Veffels, except Neutral Veffels, now within these Islands, the Property whercof shall be proved to be in any Perfon or Perfons not lubabitants of these Islands, shall belong to his Catholic Majefty, as shall also all Artiliery and Military Stores on board of any of the faid Veffels; and none of them shall be juid to the Enc-mies of his Catholic Majesty.

Article VI. The Inhabitants shall observe a strict Neutrality, and thall not be forced to take up Arms againtt His Britannic Majelty.

Article VI. Anfwered in Article the Second. Article VII. The Inhabitants shall enjoy a free Exercife of their Religion, and their Miniflers their Curacies

Article VII. Granted, during the War; and the Minillers to be fubject to the Authority of the Governor.

Article VIII A Safeguard shall be appointed for all Papers at the Government-house ; and those Thall not be liable to any Infpection, but Liberty thall be granted to him to embark them.

Article VIII. Granted, except Plans of the Islands and Geographical Papers. Article 1X. The Sick shall be taken Care of

at his Catholic Majesty's Expence, and fent to Charleftown when recovered.

Article IX. Granted; to be fent to Bermuda,

and be treated and nourifhed as Prifoners. Article X. The Inhabitants fhall enjoy, until the Peace, their Laws, Cufloms and Ordinances; Juffice shall be administered by the same Persons who are actually in Office ; all Éxpences attending the Administration of Justice shall be defrayed by the Colony.

Article X. Granted ; and it is to be understood, that the faid Tribunal shall be subject to the superior Authority of the Governor.

Article XI. If there be any doubtful Expressions in any of the foregoing Articles, they are to be interpreted according to the common Meaning and Acceptation of the Words.

Article XI. Granted. Article XII. The Governor shall be permitted to fend a Flag of Truce to New York with the Capitulation, Quarters shall be provided for the Gar-rison, and the Women and Children victualled as formenly.

Article XII. Granted ; the Flag to be fent at the fame 'l ime the Troops fail.

1782. N Sunday June 30, running down the Coaff On my Way to Dublin, at Noon, the Old Head N. by E. diffant 14 Leagues, faw a Cruizer in the South-Eaft Quarter, to which I inftantly gave Chace: At Five she housted French Colours, and, after firing a few Stern Chaces, finding we were nearly almost along-fide, the ftruck, and proved to be the Prince de Robecq, mounting 22 Twelve and Nine Pounders, fitted by the Admiral of Dunkirk, and commanded by a Lieutenant de Frigate, Monf. Pierre Vanstable, with 173 Men, had been Twelve Days from Dunkirk, but taken nothing. She is almost new, and the most complete Privateer I ever faw.
