HAVE dispatched Captain Hunt to inform your Excellency 1 am attacked by Two American Frigates, One large one, some Row Galleys, and Forty Sail of Transports from the Havanna, with Troops on Board. Three British Frigates would relieve me. I am, in Hafte,

Articles of Capitulation agreed on ut Naffau in New Providence, this 8th Day of May, 1782, be-tween his Excellency Don Juan Manuel de Cagi-gal, Captain General and Commander in Chief over the Island of Cubu, Governor of Havanna, and Lieutenant General of his Catholick Majesty's Arms: And his Excellency John Max well, Ejo; Captain-General, Governor and Commander in Chief of the Bahama Islands, Chancestor, Vice-Admiral and Ordinary of the fame, and a Lieu-tenant-Colonel in His Majefty's Army.

Article I.

*HE Poffeffion of the Iflands of New Providence, Elenthera, and Harbour Island, as also of all other the Bahama Islands, together with the Artillery, Powder, Arms, Ammunition and Stores, as also all the Forts and Polts in the fame, now in Possession of the Troops of His Britannic Majesty, shall be delivered up to the Troops of his Catholic Majelty, together with an Inventory thereof. The British Garrison to march out with all the Honours of War, Arms thouldered, Drums beating, Colours flying, Two Field Pieces, with Six Rounds of Aminunition, and the fame Number of Rounds to each Soluier, and then deliver up their Arms; and that all Officers, Military and Civil, retain their Side Arms: After which the Troops shall be embarked as speedily fas possible on board of Vessels, sufficiently provided and vic-tualled, at the Expence of his Catholic Majetty, to be fent without any unneceffary Delay to any Port in Great Britain or America, in the l'offession of His Britannic Majelly, at the Option of Governor Maxwell. The Proops to be under the immediate Direction of their own respective Officers, and not to ferve against Spain. or her Allies, until an equal Number of Frifoners belonging to Spain, or her Allies, shall be given by Great Britain in Exchange, according to the established Custom of Equality.

Article I. Granted; and the Troops are to be fent to any Port in Great B itain, or to Bernuda, or to any of His Britannic Majelty's Iflands in the Welt Indies, excep: Jamaica; and not to ferve against any of the Powers at War against Great Britain, until duly exchanged.

Article II All Officers Civil and Military, and other Inhabitants who thall chufe to leave thefe Iffaceds, thall have Liberty to depart with their Fa-milies, Negroes, and other Effaces of all and every Kind whatfoever, and fi Il have Eight en Monthe allowed them to fittl, their offairs, eau fell their Effects,

Article II. Granted; and fuch of the Inhabitants as thall chuie to relide in these Islands, after he Expiration of Eighteen Months, shail be obliged to take the Oath of Allegiance to his Catholic Majelly.

Article III. The Inhabitants within all the Islands within this Government, both Secular and Clergy, thall be maintained in the Poffestion of their real and perional Effates and Property, of what Nature foever, as well as in the Enjoyments of their Kights and Privileges, Honour- and Emolu-ments; and the free Negroes and Mulattoes in their Freedom, Immunities and Properties.

Article III. Granted in the General, provided that those Privileges, Rights, Honours and Emolu- , ments do not interfere with or impede the ellablifhed Rule of the Police, and the Military Orders of the Place.

Article IV. The Inhabitants fhall pay no other Duty than they paid to His Britannic Majelly, without any other Tax o: Import. Article IV. Granted, during the War. Article V. The Ships, Velicits a d Drough rs.

belonging to the Inhabitants of thefe Iflands, fnall remain the Property of the faid Inhabitants.

Article V. All Ships, Veffels and Droughers, and Boats, that are now within the Bahama Mands, and actually the Property of any of the Inhabitants thereof, shall be deemed the Property of the faid inhabitants; and all other Veffels, except Neutral Veffels, now within these Islands, the Property whercof shall be proved to be in any Perfon or Perfons not lubabitants of these Islands, shall belong to his Catholic Majefty, as shall also all Artiliery and Military Stores on board of any of the faid Veffels; and none of them shall be juid to the Enc-mies of his Catholic Majesty.

Article VI. The Inhabitants shall observe a strict Neutrality, and thall not be forced to take up Arms againtt His Britannic Majelty.

Article VI. Answered in Article the Second. Article VII. The Inhabitants shall enjoy a free Exercife of their Religion, and their Miniflers their Curacies

Article VII. Granted, during the War; and the Minillers to be fubject to the Authority of the Governor.

Article VIII A Safeguard shall be appointed for all Papers at the Government-house ; and those Thall not be liable to any Infpection, but Liberty thall be granted to him to embark them.

Article VIII. Granted, except Plans of the Islands and Geographical Papers. Article 1X. The Sick shall be taken Care of

at his Catholic Majesty's Expence, and fent to Charleftown when recovered.

Article IX. Granted; to be fent to Bermuda,

and be treated and nourifhed as Prifoners. Article X. The Inhabitants fhall enjoy, until the Peace, their Laws, Cufloms and Ordinances; Juffice shall be administered by the same Persons who are actually in Office ; all Éxpences attending the Administration of Justice shall be defrayed by the Colony.

Article X. Granted ; and it is to be understood, that the faid Tribunal shall be subject to the superior Authority of the Governor.

Article XI. If there be any doubtful Expressions in any of the foregoing Articles, they are to be interpreted according to the common Meaning and Acceptation of the Words.

Article XI. Granted. Article XII. The Governor shall be permitted to fend a Flag of Truce to New York with the Capitulation, Quarters shall be provided for the Gar-rison, and the Women and Children victualled as formenly.

Article XII. Granted ; the Flag to be fent at the fame 'l ime the Troops fail.
