Whitehall, July 13, 1782.

**W**HEREAS, by an Act of Parliament passed in the last Session, intitled, "An Act for compelling John Whitehill, Esquire, to return into this Kingdom; and for restraining him, in case of his Return, from going out of this Kingdom for a limited Time; and for discovering his Estate and Effects, and preventing the transporting or alienating of the same;" reciting that John Whitehill, Esquire, heretofore Governor and President of the Settlement of Fort Saint George, on the Coast of Coromandel in the East Indies; and also heretofore Member of the Council and of the Select Committee of the Settlement aforesaid, appeared; from various Papers and Records of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, by reason of his Conduct as Governor, and One of the Council and of the Select Committee of the Settlement aforesaid, to be a fit Object of Justice in Parliament; and also reciting that the said John Whitehill, Esquire, was then out of this Kingdom; therefore, and to the End that the Person, and Estates Real and Personal, of the said John Whitehill might be forthcoming, and secured so as to be liable to Justice in Parliament; it was among other Things enacted, That if the said John Whitehill, Esquire, should, within the Space of Forty-two Days next after Three several Notices should have been given in The London Gazette for that Purpose, return into this Kingdom, which Notices One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State is thereby required to insert in the said Gazette within Fourteen Days next after the passing of the said Act, he, the said John Whitehill, Esquire, should not go or depart out of the Kingdom before the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three; and that the said John Whitehill, Esquire, should, within the Space of Twenty-eight Days next after his Return into this Kingdom, in due Form of Law, enter into one or more Recognizance or Recognizances to His Majesty, with Two or more sufficient Sureties, before the Lord Chief Baron, or Two other of the Barons of His Majesty's Court of Exchequer at Westminster, in the Penalty of Fifty Thousand Pounds for the said John Whitehill, Esquire, and in the Penalty of Twenty Thousand Pounds for his Sureties, no One of such Sureties being in a less Penalty than Five Thousand Pounds: Which said several Recognizances should be made upon this Condition; That if the said John Whitehill, Esquire, who should enter into such Recognizance, should not go or depart out of this Kingdom before the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, then such Recognizances should be void, otherwise the same should remain in Force: And in case the said John Whitehill, Esquire, should neglect to enter into such Recognizance within the Space of Twenty-eight Days next after his Return into this Kingdom, he should, by the said Lord Chief Baron or Barons, or any Two or more of them, be committed to the Prison of the Fleet,

there to remain, without Bail or Mainprize, until the said First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, or until he should enter into such Recognizance with Sureties as aforesaid; and the said Chief Baron or Barons, or any Two or more of them, were thereby respectively authorized and required to issue his or their Warrant or Warrants for that Purpose: And if the said John Whitehill, Esquire, should, before the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, go or depart out of this Kingdom, he, and all and every Person or Persons who should willingly be aiding and assisting to such Departure, should forfeit to the King, His Heirs and Successors, all and singular his, her, or their Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, and all and singular his, her, or their Personal Estate and Effects, of what Nature or Kind soever.

And by the said Act it was also recited, that, in case the said John Whitehill, Esquire, should not return into this Kingdom, and enter into Recognizance in the Manner before-mentioned, within the Space of Forty-two Days next after such Notices should be inserted in the London Gazette as aforesaid, he the said John Whitehill, Esquire, ought to be considered as wilfully absenting himself out of this Kingdom for the Purpose of avoiding Justice; it was thereby further enacted, that if the said John Whitehill, Esquire, should not, within the Space of Twenty Days after the Expiration of the Forty-two Days therein before-mentioned, return into this Kingdom, so as to be liable to Justice in Parliament, but should wilfully continue to absent himself from the same, then, and in such Case, he the said John Whitehill, Esquire, should forfeit to His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, all and singular his Lands, Tenements, and Hereditaments, Goods, Chattels, Debts, and Personal Estate, of what Kind or Nature soever: Now in pursuance of the said Act, Notice is hereby given to the said John Whitehill, Esquire, and he is hereby required to return into this Kingdom within the Space of Forty-two Days next after the Publication hereof Three several Times in the London Gazette, to do and perform the several Things in the said recited Act mentioned, and thereby directed to be done and performed by him.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Meath, thus humbly approach your Throne, to express our hearty Concurrence in those general Sentiments of Joy, Gratitude, and Admiration, which, in this auspicious Period, have been diffused throughout your whole Empire, by your Majesty's gracious Attention to the Wishes of your People, and by the Vigour, Purity and Magnanimity of your present Councils.

We acknowledge and revere, as a signal Instance of your Majesty's Paternal Care for the Happiness of your loyal People of Ireland, and for the Harmony of your whole Empire, the benignant Disposition which you have lately manifested to forward the Restoration of our Rights. We repose the utmost Confidence in the gracious Intentions of your Majesty, and in the Wisdom of the British Parliament; and we remain in perfect Assurance that Justice will be done to the Claims of Ireland, and that we shall be speedily restored to that Constitution, which is the Glory of Great Britain, and our Birth-right.

Happy in this firm and joyful Expectation, we

assure your Majesty that the first Principle of our Hearts is our Affection for the British Nation; an Affection which stands on the same Basis with our Liberty, and which will grow and be strengthened with our Constitution.

Thus inseparably attached to the Fortunes of Great Britain, and embarked in one Cause with her, we have seen with Exultation the late splendid Successes of your Majesty's Fleets, and we have the firmest Hopes, under God, that henceforth Conquest will attend your Majesty's Arms throughout the Globe; persuaded as we are, that Union at Home must ever lead to Victory Abroad.

We trust that this great Object will be effectually promoted, by the Grant which our Legislature has made of Twenty Thousand Men for the Use of the British Navy: We rejoice in that Grant, as a Present worthy of the Liberality of Ireland, and of the grateful Acceptation of Great Britain; and we assure your Majesty that no Exertion shall be omitted on our Parts, within this District, to accelerate the raising of the Men for that important Purpose.

We return our hearty Thanks to your Majesty, for your judicious Appointment of his Grace the Duke of Portland to the Government of this Kingdom; we consider him as one of the first Ornaments of that truly Constitutional Ministry, which your Majesty has been pleased to call to your Confidence, to the universal Contentment of your Subjects: And we doubt not, that as the Outset of his Grace's Administration has been adorned by the Re-establishment of our Freedom, so will the Progress of it exhibit such a System of Frugality and Reform, as shall coincide with that already adopted under your Majesty's Auspices in Great Britain.

We conclude this humble Address with praying that your Majesty may long reign in the Hearts of your Subjects, and that the British Empire may long be exalted in Glory, and united in Affection, under the propitious Direction of a Patriot King, and a Patriot Administration.

**T**HE Kite Sloop arrived this Morning from the Texel, and brought in with her Le Fantastique, a French Privateer Cutter belonging to Dunkirk, of 12 Guns, with 30 Men on Board.

*Extract of a Letter from Captain Dyson, Commander of His Majesty's Sloop Helena, to Mr. Stephens, dated Lowestoffe Road, July 14, 1782.*

**P**LEASE to acquaint their Lordships, that Yesterday, being in Yarmouth Roads, I received Information from the Mayor of Yarmouth, that there had been seen a Lugger off Dunwich, at Five o'Clock the same Morning: Weighed and stood to the North Westward through the Cockle, Wind being Southwardly, thinking she might be gone that Way: At Day-light, not seeing any Thing off Cromer, proceeded with the Tide to the Southward, and found the said Lugger chased into these Roads; at Noon took Possession of her: She is called L'Escroe Privateer, about 30 Tons Burthen

then, from Dunkirk, left that Place 2 Week ago, has taken one Vessel from London to Gainborough, which is since said to be retaken. The Master and Three Boys have put a-shore at Yarmouth, with Twenty-one Prisoners, being the Equipage of the said Privateer.
