WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Sheriff, Freeholders, and Inhabitants of the County of Longford, beg Leave, with the Rest of our Fellow-Subjects, humbly and respectfully to approach your Throne.

Attached from Principle to your Illustrious Family, to your Person and Government, we felt the most lively Sensations of Affection and Gratitude, when we behold your Majesty condescending with Parental Tenderness to call upon your faithful Subjects fully and explicitly to declare the Causes of their Discontents and Jealousies, and graciously inviting them to an immediate and final Adjustment. We rejoiced at the Magnanimity with which, in Answer to our consequent Addresses, you expressed your Anxiety to exercise your Royal Prerogative in the Manner the most conducive to the Welfare of your People, and your Readiness to gratify our Wishes in the Manner pointed out by our own Legislature, without any Condition or Stipulation whatever.

With equal Satisfaction we have seen the Parliament of Great Britain wisely and generously seconding these your Majesty's benign Dispositions, and by the compleat and unconditional Repeal of the 6th of George the First, annihilating every Claim of British Legislation and Jurisdiction over this Country, and thereby finally extinguishing and renouncing a Principle inconsistent with our Freedom, and subversive of our Rights.

In this Light we are happy to assure your Majesty we receive this Repeal; as such we shall esteem it satisfactory.

We participate, with the Rest of our Fellow-Subjects of this Kingdom, in the Satisfaction which

the late Change in your Majesty's Councils and Ministers has diffused among all Ranks of Men: We beg Leave to offer to your Majesty the grateful Tribute of our Acknowledgements for the Benefits we have already derived from that Change, by the Appointment of his Grace the Duke of Portland to the Chief Government of this your faithful Kingdom; and, by the rapid Revolution in Favour of our Constitution and Interests, the first Fruits of his Grace's upright Administration, and which we agree with our Legislature in ascribing in a great Degree to the Zeal, Fidelity and Integrity, with which he has represented to your Majesty the Dispositions and Wishes of your faithful People.

We cannot conclude this our loyal and humble Address without offering to your Majesty our joyful Congratulations on the great and signal Successes that have crowned your Arms in the East and West Indies. We shall exert our utmost Efforts to supply your Majesty with the Means of improving those Successes, by augmenting the Number of your Seamen, and carrying into immediate Execution the unanimous Vote of our Representatives to that Effect. Sharers in the Freedom of our Fellow-Subjects of Great Britain, they shall find that we are determined to share their Fate also; they can have no Enemies whom we shall not consider as equally the Enemies of Ireland: We stand and we fall together.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Presbyterian Ministers and Elders of the Province of Ulster, in your Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, assembled in General Synod, beg Leave to approach your Royal Person with the most cordial and unfeigned Sentiments of Affection, Loyalty, and Respect.

We assure your Majesty, that no Part of your Dominions contains Men more attached to those Principles which seated your Majesty and your Illustrious Family on the Throne of these Kingdoms, than the Protestant Dissenters of the North of Ireland. Educated in the Principles of Liberty and a Veneration for the Laws, we trust, that, as we have hitherto been, so shall we ever be found, the foremost in Support of the one and Obedience to the other.

We behold with heartfelt Satisfaction the late Change in your Majesty's Councils. We revere the Magnanimity and Goodness of your Royal Heart in adopting those Maxims of Government which have for their Object the Liberty and Happiness of Mankind. We rejoice in the pleasing Prospect,

now

now opened, of having the Sword sheathed, and that Brother will no more rise against Brother.
