IS Majesty having been pleased to appoint John Parr, Esquire, to be Captain-General and Governor in Chief of His Majesty's Province of Nova Scotia, and the Islands and Perritories thereto belonging, in America, he this Day in Council took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Governors of His Majesty's Plantations.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 16th of August,

PRESENT,

'The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majefty's Order in Council of the 17th of May laft, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coaftwife, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 236 Day of this inflant August: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benesit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of Gac ber, 1777, of the 17th of June, the 7th and 26th of August, and the 10th of September, 1778, and of the 17th of May, 1780, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions menuioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosever (except the Masser-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of this instant August, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order

to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coasswife, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon l'ain of incurring and suffering the respective Forseitures and Penalties institled by an Ast passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Ast "to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the "Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwife of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of His Majesty is secured to gunpowder, or any Sort of His Majesty is secured to gunpowder, or any Sort of His Maje

Extract of a Letter from Captain Melcombe, Commander of His Majesty's Sloop Cormorant, to Mr. Stephens, dated off Cape Clear, July 30, 1782.

H I S Morning, Cape Clear bearing E. N. E. 8 or 9 Leagues, we fell in with and took Le Temeraire, a French Sloop of War of 10 Six Pounders, and 50 Men, commanded by Monsfeur Le Fer, Lieutenant le Frigate, out of Brest Nine Days, with Dispatches for the Combined Fleets, which were thrown over Board, with his Papers; Log Book, and 8 Guns.
