Conflantinople, July 24. Our Apprehenfions with regard to the Plague are fully confirmed by many Accidents which have happened in different Parts of this Refidence, and in two Greek Villages fituated on the Canal. It is probable the Diforder was brought hither from Ceres, nigh Salonica, (where it has broken out with Violence) as it was at firlt confined to the People who trade in those Parts. At present it begins to spread, and, as the Weather is very moist and unsettled, there is great Reason to fear it will become general.

Yesterday Evening, about Six o'Clock, a Fire broke out at Conftantinople, in a Quarter called Ba-latta, moftly inhabited by Jews. As the Wind was rather high, the Flames fpread with fuch Rapidity, that, notwithstanding every Effort, in about Three Hours the whole City was threatened with Defiruc-It is impossible to paint the horrid Scene extion. tion. It is imponible to paint the normal scene ex-hibited by this alarming Conflagration, which ra-ged with equal Violence for about Fifteen Hours, and fpread through one of the moft inhabited Parts of the Town. The Number of Houfes defiroyed is computed at Ten Thoufand, befides Mofquer, Churches, and other Public Edifices.

At this Inflant, (Three o'Clock P. M.) the Fire, which had appeared nearly extinguished, broke out anew in Three distinct Places, and pro-ceeds in different Directions. The Wind, which had fallen, is again pretty high, and the greatest Apprehensions are now entertained for the Fate of the City. The Grand Signior, Vizir, and all the Grandees, have attended these Seventeen Hours, to encourage the Exertions of the People to check the Progress of the Flames.
