ESTERDAY being the Anniversary of the King's Accession to the Throne, when His Majesty entered into the Twenty-third Year of His Reign, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty upon the Occasion. At One o'Clock the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Illuminations, and other public Demonstrations of Joy, in London and Westminster.

#### Whitehall, October 26.

Extracts of Letters from the Right Honourall. Ge, neeal Edicit, Governor of Gibraliar, dated Gibraliar, September 11 and 12, 1782, and received at the Office of the Right Honourable Thomas Townshind, His Mejelly's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, October 24.

September 11 N Attempt to try the Effect of a heavy Fire from our Batteries with Carcasses, hot Shot, and Shells, upon the Enemy's First established Advanced-Works and Batteries, seemed so very practicable, that the Commanding Officer of Artillery was immediately directed to take the Lieutenant-General's Orders for that Purpole. In consequence the Arrangement was very judiciously made, and completely executed by the Artillery Officers. The Firing having commenced on the 8th Instant, at Seven o'clock in the Morning, by Ten o'Clock their Mahon Battery, consisting of Six Pieces of Ordnance, and One adjoining of Two Guns, were set on Fire, and by Five o'Clock P. M. were entirely consumed, with Gun Carriages, Platforms, and Magazines, Bomb Proof. Part of the Communication to the Eastern Parallel, and the Trenches and Parapet for Musquetry in Front of the Battery, were also destroyed. The Thirteen Gun Battery, next the Bay, was so much damaged, being on Fire in several Places, that the Enemy were put to the Necessity of taking down One Half of it, which they have now begun to re-establish. The Success not only much exceeded my Expectations, but hed the happiest Effects in other Respects, as it provoked the Enemy to open their new Mortar Batteries, and recommence a Fire from their Forts and Lines, for which they seemed by no Means pre-pared. The Enemy's Loss in our Sight was very considerable, as their Endeavours to stop the Progress of the Flames laid them open to a very severe and well directed Fire. Notwithflanding the great Number of the Enemy's Shot and Shells, we fuffered no material Loss.

The next Morning by Day break the Enemy opened their new Sixty four Gun Battery upon us, with all their Mortars, and continued to fire without Intermission from thence, as well as from their Lines, (their whole Artillery amounting to about 100 Pieces of Cannon, and 60 Mortars) seemingly by Way of Retaliation, it being the general Opinion

their Preparations were not sufficiently compleat to begin this powerful Attack, which, however formidable in Appearance, I will venture to affure, that the Impression upon our Works as yet is scarcely perceptible.

On the same Day the Enemy's Squadron, confisting of Seven Sail of the Line Spanish, and Two French, with a large Frigate and a Xebeque, taking the Advantage of a Levant Wind, got under Sail from the Orange Grove, and one of them pussing very slowly within Random Shot fired many Guns upon the South Ballion and Ragged Staff, continuing his Cannonade until he got beyond Europa. The Squadron then went to the Eastward of the Rock, and formed in a Line, (the Admiral leading) came before the Batteries of Europa, and under a very flow Sail commenced a Fire from all their Guns, until the last Ship had passed. They repeated this Manœuvre at Two o'Clock the following Morning, and again in the Forenoon of the same Day. These successive Cannonades did not any Ways damage the Works. Some of the leading Ships came pretty near the Point the first Attack, but having been frequently struck by our Shot they afterwards kept at a greater Dislance. Two of the Spanish Ships went early in that Morning to Algaziras, to repair, as we imagine. All the Batteries at Europa were manned by the Marine Brigade, (incamped there) with a small Proportion of Artilleriss. The Guns were extremely well laid and pointed; the Whole under the immediate Command of Brigadier Curtis.

About Five in the Afternoon of the fame Day Sixteen of the Enemy's Gun Boats came over from Algaziras, formed in a Line, and fired upon the Garrison. Our Batteries obliged them to retire in less than Half an Hour, not without some of them having suffered, as there is Reason to Suppose.

September i 2.

The Enemy continues his heavy Fire from the Ishmus; last Night the Gun and Mortar Boats repeated their Attack. Nobody hurt by their Fire.

The Wind having come to the Westward, there is all Probability the Enemy will determine upon his final Attack by Sea in a very short Time.

The Enemy has made no further Approach in his Land Attack fince Yesterday.

H I.S Majesty being very much concerned at the frequent Robberies and Disorders of late committed in the Streets of London and Westminster, and

and Parts adjacent, and being informed that they are greatly to be imputed to the Encouragement given to Rogues and their Accomplices, by Persons who keep Night-houses and Cellars, which are re-forted to by great Numbers of loose and disorderly Persons; and that the Gaming-houses, as also the Places where Strong Liquors are drunk to Excess, contribute much to the Corruption of the Morals of those of an inferior Rank, and to the leading them into these wicked Courses, has commanded me to recommend it, in His Name, in the strongest Manner, to the Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlefex, to employ their utmost Care and Vigilance in preventing and suppressing these Disorders, by holding frequent Petty Sessions for this Purpose in their several Parishes, or other Divisions, by calling be. fore them the High Constables and other proper Ossicers under their Direction, and giving them the strictest Orders and Warrants, from Time to Time, as there shall be Occasion, to search for and appre-hend Rogues, Vagabonds, idle and disorderly Perfons, in order to their being dealt with according to Law; and likewise to proceed with Rigour as well against all Persons harbouring such Offenders, as against those who keep the said Night-houses or Cellars, Tippling or common Gaming-houses, or who practice or encourage unlawful Gaming.

And His Majesty having very much at Heart the Performance of this Service, wherein the Heart nor of His Government, the Performance of the

nor of His Government, the Preservation of the Peace, and the Sasety of His Subjects are so much concerned, does further require the faid Justices in their respective Sessions to draw up in Writing, from Time to Time, an Account of their Proceedings herein, inferting the Names of the Justices attending fuch Meetings, and of the Peace Officers whom they shall employ, taking particular No tice of the Zeal and Diligence of each of them in the Performance of his Duty; which Accounts are to be transmitted from the said several Sessions to One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to be laid before His Majesty; who being informed of their Behaviour may reward such of them as shall distinguish themselves in the faithful and diligent Execution of their Office; His Majesty not doubting but the Justices, on their Part, will take Care to punish with Rigour, as by Law they may, those who shall appear to have been guilty of Corruption or Negligence therein.
You will be pleafed to acquaint the Justices of the

Peace for the faid County, and all others whom it may concern, with His Majesty's Pleasure, that the fame may be duly and punctually complied with.

That it appears to this Court from incontestible ' Evidence, drawn from the Records of the Company, and supported by the unanimous Opinion of the House of Commons, that the War in which we are now engaged with the Marattas, "was evidently founded on the Sentiments of the Court of Directors, conveying Demands on the "Maratta Administration, greatly exceeding the Conditions of the Treaty of Poorunder, which "Sentiments of the Court of Directors opened the " first Design of sending a Detachment from Bengal to the Malabar Coast;" and that consequently it would be the Height of Injustice to lay the Blame of that War, or the Evils which have flowed from it, upon Mr. Hastings; when it appears, That the Dissatissaction of the Court of Directors, expressed at the Treaty of Poorunder, in "their Letters to Bengal of the 5th of February,
and to Bombay of the 16th of April, 1777, gave
the strongest Encouragement to both Presidencies " to feize the flightest Pretence of Provocation from the Ministers of the Maratta States, to renew their Engagements with Ragoba;" neither have the Measures adopted by Mr. Hastings, in Confequence of fuch Instructions, ever received the flightest Censure from the said Court of Directors. In Confideration whereof, it is now recommended to the Court of Directors to rescind their late Re-solution respecting the Removal of Warren Hastings, Esq. Governor-General of Bengal, more especially as it appears to this Court, that according to the last official Dispatches from Bengal, dated the 8th of April, 1782, the Prospect of Peace with the Marattas was then propitious, bescause it seemed to be wished for by all the Ma · ratta States, because Hostilities with them had ceased for many Months, and that a Peace had actually been concluded with Mahdajee Scindia, one of the principal Chiefs of that Confederacy; and, further, that the Government General of Bengal were using every Means in their Power to teffect a general Pacification; and that the Conduct of the faid Government-General, tending to produce a general Pacification, or to unite and support, by powerful Resources; a general Confe-deracy of the Country Powers to deseat the Com-bination of Hyder Ally and the French, (suppoing the faid Hyder Ally shall not accept of the reasonable Terms of Accommodation, which have been offered to him in Confequence of his Propofals for Peace,) merits the warmest Approbation of this Court; and that therefore it would be evidently injurious to the Interests of the Company, and the Nation, to remove any of those principal Servants of the Company, now discharging their Duty with such uncommon Exertions, Ability, and Unanimity, or to shake the Authority reposed in them by the Legislature and the Company, at a Period fo critical, when the Prosperity of the British Interests in India will depend, in a great Measure, on the Considence which the native Princes of the Country may place in the Government-General of Bengal.'
