Governor-General of Bengal, more especially as it appears to this Court, that according to the last official Dispatches from Bengal, dated the 8th of April, 1782, the Prospect of Peace with the Mahrattas was then propitious, because it seemed to be wished for by all the Mahratta States, because Hostilities with them had ceased for many Months, and that a Peace had actually been concluded with Mahdase Scindia, one of the principal Chiefs of that Confederacy; and, surther, that the Government-General of Bengal were using every Means in their Power to effect a general Pacification; and that the Conduct of the said Government-General, tending to produce a general Pacification, or to unite and support, by powerful Resources, a general Confederacy of the Country Powers to deseat the Combination of Hyder Ally and the French, (supdated the 8th of April, 1782, the Prospect of cause it secmed to be wished for by all the Mahratta States, because Hostilities with them had ceased for many Months, and that a Peace had and, further, that the Government-General of Bengal were using every Means in their Power to effect a general Pacification; and that the Conduct of the faid Government-General, tending to produce a general Pacification, or to unite and fup-
