**T**HE following Letter has been written, pursuant to His Majesty's express Command, by the Right Honourable Thomas Townshend, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department:

*Whitehall, October 22, 1782.*

To the Chairman of the Sessions of the Peace for the County of Middlesex.

S I R,

**H**IS Majesty being very much concerned at the frequent Robberies and Disorders of late committed in the Streets of London and Westminster, and Parts adjacent, and being informed that they are greatly to be imputed to the Encouragement given to Rogues and their Accomplices, by Persons who keep Night-houses and Cellars, which are resorted to by great Numbers of loose and disorderly Persons; and that the Gaming-houses, as also the Places where Strong liquors are drunk to Excess, contribute much to the Corruption of the Morals of those of an inferior Rank, and to the leading them into these wicked Courses, has commanded me to recommend it, in His Name, in the strongest Manner, to the Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlesex, to employ their utmost Care and Vigilance in preventing and suppressing these Disorders, by holding frequent Petty Sessions for this Purpose in their several Parishes, or other Divisions, by calling before them the High Constables and other proper Officers under their Direction, and giving them the strictest Orders and Warrants, from Time to Time, as there shall be Occasion, to search for and apprehend Rogues, Vagabonds, idle and disorderly Persons, in order to their being dealt with according to Law; and likewise to proceed with Rigour as well against all Persons harbouring such Offenders, as against those who keep the said Night-houses or Cellars, Tippling or common Gaming-houses, or who practice or encourage unlawful Gaming.

And His Majesty having very much at Heart the Performance of this Service, wherein the Honor of His Government, the Preservation of the Peace, and the Safety of His Subjects are so much concerned, does further require the said Justices in their respective Sessions to draw up in Writing, from Time to Time, an Account of their Proceedings herein, inserting the Names of the Justices attending such Meetings, and of the Peace Officers whom they shall employ, taking particular Notice of the Zeal and Diligence of each of them in the Performance of his Duty; which Accounts are to be transmitted from the said several Sessions to One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to be laid before His Majesty; who being informed of their Behaviour may reward such of them as shall distinguish themselves in the faithful and diligent Execution of their Office; His Majesty not doubting but the Justices, on their Part, will take Care to punish with Rigour, as by Law they may,

those who shall appear to have been guilty of Corruption or Negligence therein.

You will be pleased to acquaint the Justices of the Peace for the said County, and all others whom it may concern, with His Majesty's Pleasure, that the same may be duly and punctually complied with.

*London, November 9.*

Yesterday Nathaniel Newnham, Esq; Lord-Mayor Elect for the Year ensuing, was sworn at Guildhall; when the Chair and other Ensigns of Mayoralty were surrendered to him in the accustomed Manner.

This Day the new Lord Mayor, accompanied by many of the Aldermen, and the Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went in their Coaches to the Water-side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending; and from thence proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges, adorned with Streamers and Pennants, to Westminster; and having walked round the Hall, and solemnly saluted all the Courts, they went to the Exchequer Bar, and the new Lord Mayor did there take the Oaths appointed; and having recorded Warrants of Attorney in the proper Courts, returned by Water to Black Fryars, and from thence in Coaches with the usual Solemnity to Guildhall, where a magnificent Entertainment was provided; at which were present the Great Officers of State, divers of the Nobility, Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, the Judges, and many other Persons of Quality and Distinction.

*Petersburgh, October 4.* Yesterday being the Anniversary of her Imperial Majesty's Coronation, there was a very brilliant Court both in the Morning and Evening. Immediately after Divine Service, Monsieur Belberodko, her Imperial Majesty's Secretary, read the Statutes of a New Order called St. Woldemir, and her Imperial Majesty invested herself with them. This new Institution is created in Favour of those who serve in Civil Employments; and it is nearly on the same Footing as that of St. George, with Respect to the Salaries annexed to the different Classes. There are to be Ten Great Crosses, Twenty of the Second Class, Thirty of the Third, and Sixty of the Fourth, besides a Fifth for those who have served Thirty-five Years, which gives them a Right to wear it.

Pounds to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid (except as before is excepted) to be paid by the Lord's Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any One or more of the Offenders.
