*W*HEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that, in the Night between Monday the 21st and Tuesday the 22d of October last, some Person or Persons unknown maliciously set on Fire a Barn, situated on a Farm in the Parish of Melbury Osmond in the County of Dorset, the Property of the Countess Dowager of Ilchester, in the Occupation of Mrs. Susanna Stone, by which the said Barn, together with a considerable Quantity of Corn therein, and also Two Ricks of Corn near adjoining thereto, were entirely consumed; and that in the same Night Two Hay-Ricks on a distant Part of the said Farm were also set on Fire and burnt: And whereas it has been also represented, that, in the Night between Monday the 18th and Tuesday the 19th of this instant November, another Barn, on Melbury Sampford Farm in the said County, also the Property of the said Countess Dowager of Ilchester, and in the Occupation of Farmer John Gill, was likewise maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown, and, together with a considerable Quantity of Corn therein, was also entirely consumed: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Offences above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

*W*HEREAS on Monday the 28th Day of October last, a Ship called the Jacinto, John Petrona Master, from Venice, Zant, and Malaga, arrived at Spithead, and being liable to Quarantine, the Master of the said Ship had Notice given him by the proper Officer appointed to superintend the Quarantine Service, that he must proceed with his said Ship to the Motherbank and perform Quarantine; with which the Master immediately complied, and proceeded accordingly: And whereas several Persons having had Communication with and been actually on Board the said Ship whilst under Quarantine, and having had Notice that they were liable to Quarantine (and

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring to Justice the Persons guilty of so alarming an Offence, by which the Public Health might be endangered, do hereby promise a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, the said Joseph Wild, or any other of the Persons who were actually on Board the said Ship whilst under Quarantine, and quitted the same without any Licence or Authority for so doing, so that he or they may be taken before a Magistrate and prosecuted for the said Offence.—To be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs on Conviction.
