paring to descend into the Ditch, and to Mine under the walls.

Embden, Octob. 1. You have been formerly made acquainted with the misunderstanding arisen between the Princels Regent and the States of this Countrey, concerning their Authorities and Priviledges, and that the Bishop of Munster had furnished the Princess with some Troops, which were put into feveral places; several endeavors have been used by the States, who have made application as well to the Emperor as to the States General, to remove the faid Troops, but hitherto without effect; and so far is the matter from being amicably accommodated, that this last week several Hostilities have been committed, For on Tuesday last a Party of about 50 Munsteriens, commanded by a Captain, Lieutenant and Enfign, came to up, Wolthuysen, and other places, and took away all the Horses and Cautle they found there; whereupon our Magistrates sent out immediately some Troops of this Garison, with Orders to go and seize by way of Reprizal, all the Horses and Cattle they should find in the Farm houses belonging to the Princels of Oost-Frizeland; which they not only executed, bur likewise overtook and made Prisoners the faid Munsteriens that had been at Up, &c. and brought them all hither. In revenge of which, other Mun-Troops have made on incuttion into the Lordship of Bartum, and not only pillaged and ruined the Country, but likewise made themselves Misters of the Town or Bourg of that name. Which Hostility being committed in fight of this City, and almost under our Cannon, our Magistrates thought sit to send out a strong Party, who attacked the faid Bourg with fo much fury, that the Munsteriens were forced to yield themselves Prisoners, who have been brought hither being about 80 in number. And in the mean time another Party is fent out to attack the House of Aldersum, in which are 50 Munsteriens,

Strasburg, Ollob. t. The French continue to destroy all behind them in Brifgow, that the Imperial Troops may not be able to winter there; they have, fince my last, burnt the Town of Lahr, there remaining not one The French Army, under the command of the Mareschal de Crequi, was yesterday encamped at Gravenhausen. The Duke of Lorrain will ere long shew himself to the Enemy. The Mareschal de Crequi has, we are told, fint a detachment to take all the Castles in which are Imperial Garifons on the Saar.

Ditto, Oflob. 4. The first instant the Imperial Army came and encamped near the Fort on the other fide the Rhine which guards our Bridge, whereupon the Marefchal de Crequi immediately repassed the Rhine, and encamped at Gifperheim, about two Leagues from hence; of which the Duke of Lorrain having an account, he likewise resolved to repass the Rhine, and sent to our Magistrates to demand passage over our Bridge, which at first they endeavoured to excuse, because of the ill confequences it might expose their City to, by breaking their Neutrality, which the French had now lately obferved in the Rencounter with the Duke of Saxe-Eylenach,; but at length they were forced to grant it, and accordingly the whole Imperial Army with their Baggage and Artillery passed over our Bridge, and encamped at Hohenheym. The Army consisted in between 20 and 30000 fighting men.

Hagne, Offsh. 12. On Priday, as was faid in our last, the States of Holland mer, when the Raech Pentionary Fagel hawing, by Order of the Prince of Orange, communicated several matters to them, relating, ap is believed, to a Peace, as

which they presently separated, and the Deputies returned home to consult their respective Principals; to morrow they will be here again, and his Highness is expected from so shake, when his Highness will set out from hence. I he io instant four Yachts and two Men of War arrived from E.glan in the Marfe, designed to transport his Highness thither; and this day Sir Gab iel Sylvius, sent over in the said Yachts by His this day Sie Gab tel Sylvins, tent over in the faid Yachts by His Majelly, arrived here, and understanding that his Highnes is at Seeft tike, went directly thither. From Alface our Letters give as an account, that as well the French as Imperial Armies have repassed the Rbine, and are at present in Alface; but the till weather comes on so fast, that nothing of momen: can be expected from them. It is thought the ill weather will begin to incommode the Besiegers at Statin, who me t with so great opposition, that they cannot make any great progres. From Livonia we have Letters which affere as that the Suedes have an Army in the Field on that fide commanded by Count Horne, and that the Countrey people in Iraffin, in apprehenfion of the faid Army, begin to quit their Habitations, an 'to . retire with their Goods and Families into the fertified pla-

ces.

Paris, OHob. 13. We talk here of great preparations that are already making against Spring, and that his Majesty will go into the Field rather earlier than he did this year. Since the account we had from German, of the imperial Aimies having repassed the Rhine at Strasburg, w. have not any thing of moment from that file. Little passes in Flusiers, and we expect every day to hear that the Armies are separated, an gone into Winter-quarters. In Sucily our Troops have taken Caffigions, and another fortified place near (a anea, which by that means will be very much firauned.
