THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great-Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for raising a certain Sum of Money by Loans or Exchequer Bills, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-three.

An Act to amend an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, intituled, An Act for the more effectual securing the Duties upon Tobacco; to prohibit the Importation of Currants into Great Britain in small Packages; to repeal such Part of the Proviso in an Act of the Eighteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty as permits Portugal and Spanish Wines, and other Wines (except French Wines) to be imported in small Casks for private Use; and for taking off the Inland Duty payable upon the Importation of Cocoa Nuts into this Kingdom, upon the Exportation thereof as Merchandize.

An Act to continue several Laws, relating to the regulating the Fees of Officers of the Customs and Naval Officers in America; to the allowing the Exportation of certain Quantities of Wheat, and other Articles, to His Majesty's Sugar Colonies in America; to the permitting the Exportation of Tobacco Pipe Clay from this Kingdom to the British Sugar Colonies or Plantations in the West Indies; and to the repealing the Duties upon Pot and Pearl Ashes, Wood and Weed Ashes, imported into Great Britain; and for granting other Duties in Lieu thereof.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces, while on Shore.

An Act for further continuing an Act made in the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for allowing the Importation of Fine Organzined Italian Thrown Silk in any Ships or Vessels, for a limited Time.

An Act for continuing several Acts passed for the better Regulation of Lestage and Ballastage in the River Thames.

An Act for allowing the Importation of Rice, Paddy, Indian Corn, Indian Meal, and Maize, free from Duty, for a limited Time.

An Act for continuing an Act passed in the Twenty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for restraining Sir Thomas Rumbold, Baronet, and Peter Perring, Esq; from going out of

this Kingdom for a limited Time, and for discovering their Estates and Effects, and preventing the transporting or alienating the same.

An Act for more effectually draining and preserving certain Lands and Grounds within the Level of Hatfield Chase, and Parts adjacent, in the Counties of York, Lincoln, and Nottingham.

An Act for continuing and amending Two Acts of the Ninth and Twenty-seventh Years of His late Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road leading from St. Dunstan's Cross, near the City of Canterbury, to the Water Side at Whitstable, in the County of Kent.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act, passed in the Second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for amending, widening, altering, and keeping in Repair, the Road from the South End of Sparrow's Herne, on Bushy Heath, through the Market Towns of Watford, Berkhamsted Saint Peter's, and Tring, in the County of Hertford, by Pettipher's Elms, to the Turnpike Road at Walton, near Aylesbury, in the County of Bucks.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers, of several Acts of Parliament, therein mentioned, so far as the same relate to the repairing and amending of the Roads leading from Leeds through Bradford and Horton, and through Bowling and Wibsey, to Halifax, and also the Roads called Bowling-Lane, and Little Horton Lane, in the West Riding of the County of York.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of Two Acts, made in the Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth Years of the Reign of King George the Second, for repairing the Roads from Doncaster through Ferrybridge, to the South Side of Tadcaster Cross, and also from Ferrybridge to Wetherby, and from thence to Boroughbridge, in the County of York, so far as the same relate to the Road between Ferrybridge and Wetherby, and from thence to Boroughbridge.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act passed in the First Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from Dyed Way to Somerton, and from Gawbridge to Tintinhull Fords, and from a Stream of Water called Ford to Cartgate, in Martock, in the County of Somerset.

An Act for continuing and amending an Act of the Third Year of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road leading from the Town of Stafford, to Standon, in the County of Stafford, and several other Roads in two Counties of Salop and Stafford.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of an Act of the Second Year of His present Majesty, for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading from Cleobury Mortimer, The Cross-Houses, Glazely, and the Turnpike Gate on Abberley Hill, in the Counties of Salop and Worcester.

The humble Address of the Planters of His Majesty's West India Islands residing in Great Britain, and of the Merchants trading to the said Islands, whose Names are hereunto subscribed.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's ever dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Planters and Merchants of your Majesty's West India Islands, whose Names are hereunto subscribed, humbly beg Leave to approach your Royal Presence with Hearts no less faithfully devoted to your Majesty's Person and Government, than deeply filled and impressed with Sentiments of the warmest and most perfect Gratitude for those returning Blessings of Peace, to which, by your Majesty's paternal Goodness, we are now restored.

That the Calamities of War (and more especially of one so complicated in its Nature, and so unfortunate in its Events) are put an End to, are Considerations as pleasing as the Benefits derived therefrom are universal: But it is not in this general Light that we are led to view this Subject: It is to our own Situation that we are to look: And here happy are we, Great Sire, to see the British Empire, on the Brink, as it were, of total Annihilation and of absolute Extinction in the Western World, once again erecting its Standard there, and so nearly too on the broad Basis of its former Establishments. Happy are we again to embrace our Fellow-Subjects in that Part of the World, lost as they have been to us in Captivity, but now Partakers of the same Allegiance with ourselves. Happier still had we been if this Allegiance could have been extended to all, and had been in Exclusion of none: But this we say in the Warmth and Benevolence only of our own Hearts, and without even the Shadow of an Idea to suggest Imputation It is ours to be content.

These, Sire, are the Feelings by which we are induced thus to lay ourselves in all Humility at your Royal Feet: Nor do we mean to embitter these Feelings by any retrospective View of our Condition; and yet perhaps the Means the most convincing to shew the Sincerity of our Gratitude for the Blessings of Peace, would be to point out to your Majesty the dire Necessity that with us existed for it; but this we purposely omit.

May your Majesty long, long continue to yourself the entire Enjoyment of those domestic Comforts, which the most amiable of Comforts, and an illustrious Progeny can afford, and be and remain to your People the great Preserver and Defender of those Rights, which, in the Line of Brunswick, have been and are, as we are made to know, confirmed and entailed upon them.

Whitehall, March 13, 1783.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, in consequence of an Information of Fifteen Hundred Casks of smuggled Spirits being harboured in certain Warehouses at Deal, some Officers of Excise proceeded to that Place, attended by a Detachment of about Forty-seven of His Majesty's Troops, under the Command of Captain Pennyman: That, on their Arrival at Deal, about Nine o'Clock in the Evening of the Eighth Day of February last, they found Intelligence had been previously given of their Approach, the Smuglers being prepared to receive them; and they had not been there many Minutes before they were fired upon, apparently by a Body of Persons in one Place, and afterwards from Windows and behind Walls; and that the Troops were prevented from advancing by Ropes drawn across the Street: That, having opened the Door of One Storehouse, a Quantity of Brandy, Geneva, and Raw Coffee was seized; the Smuglers continuing to fire on the Revenue Officers and Troops, they retired with what they had seized.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Outrage, is hereby pleased to promise His Most Gracious Pardon to any Person or Persons (except those who actually

fired upon His Majesty's Troops, or the Revenue Officers) who shall discover any one or more of his or their Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

 " Stand fast brave Boys fiahch not one Pin from Luthart or blind Cleminson.
