

Most Gracious Sowereign, W E, your Majesty's ever dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Planters and Merchants of your Majesty's West India Islands, whose Names are hereunto subscribed, humbly beg Leave to approach your Royal Presence with Hearts no less faithfully devoted to your Majesty's Person and Government, than deeply filled and impressed with Sentiments of the warmest and most perfect Gratitude for those returning Bleffings of Peace, to-which, by your Majesty's paternal Goodness, we are now reflored.
