In the Accomplishment of this Event, we sincerely wish that every Circumstance will be found to ensure the Prosperity of your Majesty's Dominions; that a cordial Reconciliation and lasting Friendship will be established with America, that the Commerce of this Country will revive, and that by a prudent Management of its Resources, the heavy Burthens incurred in the late expensive War, will be relieved.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty of our unalterable Attachment to your Person and Government; and that it will be our constant Prayer, that your Majesty, pursuing the Principle which your illustrious Family was called to the Throne of these Realms, may long reign in the Hearts of a free and united People.
