The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**T**HIS Day the Right Honourable William Eden was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

*Whitehall, April 8.*

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Admiral Lord Viscount Keppel, Admiral Hugh Pigot, the Right Honourable William Ponsonby, commonly called Lord Viscount Duncannon, the Honourable John Townshend, Sir John Lindsay, Knight of the Bath, William Jolliffe and Whithed Keene, Esquires, to be Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Dominions, Islands and Territories thereunto respectively belonging.

The King has been pleased to grant to the Right Honourable Edmund Burke, the Office of Receiver and Paymaster General of His Majesty's Guards, Garrisons, and Land Forces.

dially unite in their sincere Endeavours for the Public Good, and in the faithful Discharge of their respective Duties; and that the Continuance of your Majesty's mild and beneficent Reign may be long and happy.

Impressed with an unalterable Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, we sincerely wish that Unanimity and Concord may prevail in every Part of your Dominions; that all Orders of Men may unite in cultivating and extending the Maritime Trade and Commerce of these Realms; and that your Majesty may long continue the Enjoyment of these Blessings, with every other Felicity that can attend your Majesty's Royal Person and Illustrious Family.
