

Venice, Octob. 3. The Letters we receive from *Venezia* sufficiently assure us, that the War is begun between the *Moscovites* and the *Turks*, though the Letters we receive from *Constantinople* make not any mention thereof, but on the contrary say, that People there were entertained with appearances of accommodating the matters in difference between the two Nations. This week arrived here a Vessel from *Sicily*, it brought little News, the *French* not having made any attempt either upon *Catania* or *Siracusa*.

Genova, Octob. 6. The 30 past arrived here the Continuation, *William Betts* Master, from *England*; and the first instant the *Bristol* Frigate, *Henry Greenhill* Commander, from *Barcelona*; and the *John* and *Elizabeth*, *Robert Elfreth* from *Trapany*. The 4th, the *Katherine*, *Daniel Tracy*, from *Palermo*; and yesterday the *Friend*, *Richard Pidgeon* Master, from *Liverpool* in *England*. The four *French* Gallies who Cruise upon these Coasts, returned hither about six days since, and yesterday put to Sea again. Some *Spanish* Barks fitted out at *Trapany*, meeting not far from *Messina* with the *Phoenix*, *Jobs Stallard* Master, bound hither with Corn from *Taranta*, carried her in to *Siracusa*, having used Torments to make the Master and Men say they were bound to *Messina*, though they were past it when the said Barks met the said Vessel, and have made Prize of the Corn. We have advice that the *French* Fleet is returned to *Messina*.

Brisac, Octob. 15. We are told that several Officers of the *Imperial* Army, who were wounded in the *Action* on the 7th instant, are since dead at *Strasburg*, whither they were carried, to be better look'd after than they could be in the Army. We are assured that the *Imperialists* had 900 Men killed or wounded in that Engagement. The Armies continue in the Field, but the Cavalry on both sides begin very much to suffer for want of Forage, so that they will be necessitated to decamp in few days. We are told that the Count de *Rubara* is appointed to command a Flying Body of 6000 Men, composed of the Troops of the *Electors* *Palatine*, the *Electors* of *Menix*, and the *Landgrave* of *Hesse*, and of a detachment of the *Imperial* Army. We are told that the *Imperialists* pretend to defend *Sarbruck*, and the other Castles they have upon the *Saar*, and to fortify themselves there.

Paris, Octob. 20. The last Letters we received from *Alsace*, gave us account that the Duke of *Lorraine* began to retire, in order to the putting his Troops into Winter-quarters, the Cavalry suffering very much for want of Forage; the *Mareschal* de *Crequi*, we hear, is likewise preparing to go into Winter-quarters, and he himself is expected here ere long. In *Flanders* the Kings Musketeers, and some other Companies of the Kings Household, are gone to their Winter-quarters, which makes us believe the Armies in those Parts will very suddenly separate. Yesterday was beheaded on the *Greue* a Gentleman of *Normandy*, for having counterfeited Letters, which seemed to discover a Correspondence between the Governor of *Manmudy*, and the Enemy, with design not only to have deprived that Gentleman of his Government, but of his Life likewise. The King has this week disposed of several Bishopricks, and among others that of *St. Omer*, which is given to the *Abbot* de *Saxe*.

Ditto, Octob. 23. The King has appointed the Winter-quarters for his Troops, and the Officers that are to command thereof. The *Marquis de la Trouffe* Lieutenant General, will command those that are at *Dunkirk*, *Bergue*, *Graveline*, *Calais*, *Bombourg*, and other places on the Sea Coast. The Count de *Mynish* likewise Lieutenant General and Governor of *Charle-roy*, is to command the Troops that winter between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*. The *Marquis d'Uzelles* Brigadier, will command five Battalions that are to remain at *Cassel*. The *Marquis de Camille* Lieutenant General, who is at present in the Army in *Germany*, and the *Sieur de Saintandoux* Marechal de Camp,

and Governor of *Torway*, are to serve, during the Winter, under the *Marechal d'Humieres*, who is to command in chief of the Forces which winter in the French Territories in *Flanders* and Parts adjoining. The *Marquis de Chastillon* Lieutenant General is to command on the *Meuse*. The Count de *Buff* will command in *Lorraine*, and the *Earon de Monclair* in *Alsace*. The Duke de *Navailles* having under him the *Sieur Gassion* Lieutenant General, and the *Sieur de l'abbaye* Marechal de Camp, will remain in *Rosellum*. Our Letters from *Alsace* are of the 15 instant, the Armies then continued in their former quarters, each striving to remain the last in the Field; which however they would not be able to do much longer, for want of Forage. From *Sicily* we have advice, that the design which the Duke de *Vivonne* had formed upon *Siracusa*, had not succeeded, by reason of the contrary winds.
