Venice, Ostob. 3. The Letters we receive from Vienna sufficiently assure us, that the War is begun between the Moscovites and the Turks, though the Letters we receive from Constantinople make not any mention thereof, but an the contrary say, that People there were entertained with appearances of accommodating the matters in difference between the two Nations. This week arrived here a Vessel from Sicily, it brought little News, the French not having made any attempt either upon Catanga or Siracusa.

Genoua, Octob. 6. The 30 past arrived here the Continuation, William Betts Mafter, from Puglit; and the first instant the Briftol Frigat, Henry Greenhil Commander, from Barcelona; and the John and Elizabeth, Robert Elfreih from Trapany. The 4th, the Katherike, Daniel Tracy, from Palermo; and yesterday the Friend, Richard Pidgeon Master, from Leverpool in England. The four French Gallies who Cruise upon thele Coafts, returned hither about fix dayes fince, and yesterday put to Sea again. Some Spanish Barks fitted out at Trapany, meeting not far from Meffina with the Phenix, Jobs Stallard Master, bound hither with Corn from Taranta, carried her in to Siracufas having used Torments to make the Master and Men say they were bound to Messina, though they were past it when the faid Barks met the faid Veffel, and have made Prize of the Corn. We have advice that the French Fleet is returned to Melfina.

Brific, Offob. 15. We are told that several Officers of the Imperial Army, who were wounded in the Action on the 7th initiant, are fince dead at Strasburg, whither they were carried, to be better look'd after than they could be in the Army. We are affored that the Imperialifts had 900 Men killed or wounded in that Engagement. The Armies continue in the Field, but the Cavalry on both fides begin very much to fuffer for want of Forage, to that they will be necessitated to decamp in few dayes. We are told that the Count de Rabata is appointed to command a Flying Body of 6000 Men, composed of the Troops of the Elector Palacine, the Elector of Menia, and the Landgrave of Heffe, and of a detachment of the Imperial Army. We are told that the Imperialiffs pretend to defend sarbruck, and the other Caffles they have upon the Saar, and to fortifie, themfelves there.

Paril, Offib. 20. The last Letters we received from Alface, gave an account that the Duke of Lorrain began to retire, in order to the putting his Troops into Winter-quarters, the Cavelry, suffeting very much for want of Forage; the Mareichill de Crequi, we hear, is likewise preparing to go into Winter-quarters, and he himself is expected here ere long. In Flanders the Kings Musketters, and some other Companies of the Kings Houshold, are gone to their Winter-quarters, which makes us believe the Annies in those Parts will very suddenly separate. Yesterday was beheaded on the Grene a Gentle-wishan of Normandy, for having counterfeited Letters, which seamethe discover a Correspondence between the Governor of Mannedy, and the Enemy, with design not only to have deprived that Gentleman of his Government, but of his Life likewise. The King has this week disposed of several Bishopricks, and among others that of &s. Omer, which is given to the Abbetiak Guze.

Ditto, Ottob. 23. The King has appointed the Winter-quarters for his Troops, and the Officers that are to command there. The Count de Manish likewish Lieutenau General and Governor of Charle-vy, is Ag command the Troops that winter between the Sambre and the Meuse. The Marquis d'Uxelles Brigadier, will command that Battalions that are to remain at Castlell, The Marquis dikannes Lieutenaut General, who is at present in the Army th Osemans, and the Steur de Sainfandows Marcichas de Camp,

and Governor of Turnusy, aret) serve, during the Winter, winder the Mareschal d'Humeres, who is to command in chief of the Forces which winter in the French Territories in Flanders and Parts adjoining. The Marquis de Chaseon Lieutenant General is to compand on the Meuse. The Count de B. ff will command in Lorrain, and the Earon de Moulds in Misce. The Duké de Navarlles having under him the Steur Gassion Lieutenant General, and the Steur de a subserve Mareschal de Camp, will remain in Roysillm. Our Letters from Assect are of the 15 instant, the Armies then continued in their former quarters, each staying to remain the last in the Field; which however they would not able to do much longer, so want of Forage. From Sicily we have advice, that the design which the Duke de Vivolume had formed upon Siracusa, had not succe-dud, by reason of the contrary winds.
